

Vote for rent strike

There will be rent strikes, catering boycotts, possible occupations and demonstrations at the University next term in support of the Grants Campaign.

Motions to this effect were passed by overwhelming majorities at yesterday's University Union Special General Meeting.

An attempt was made at the SGM to change a Union byelaw and enable Union Council meetings to be quorate in the event of the Union Executive being unable to attend if half of UC's membership is present.

Although passed at the SGM the motion proposing this change was later ruled out of order by a solicitor

EIGHT EXEC MEMBERS THROWN OUT

The University Union is facing the most serious constitutional crisis in its history.

The President and all of the Executive officers except Cultural Affairs Secretary, Waxum Daswani have been sacked from office.

to no-confidence Executive: "This is a very serious crisis, nothing like it has ever happen before. Unless the Executive are returned to office on Wednesday, management of the Union might have to be taken over by the University."

Trouble began at the OGM when Union House Secretary Carol Jelley proposed a motion of no confidence in Mr Daswani on the grounds of his incompetence and failure to discharge his responsibilities as Cultural Affairs Secretary. An amendment was immediately proposed by ex-Union President Abdul Hai expressing confidence in Mr Daswani and noting his creative activities and attemps to involve societies and ordinary members in the Arts Festival. A second amendment resolving to no-confidence every elected member of the Executive except Mr Daswani and demanding their resignation within seven days was then proposed by Jeff Ball, a second year Computer Science student.

Jelley and did not represent Executive feeling as a whole". The former Executive have called for an S.G.M. to be held at 1.15 pm today in the Refectory to rediscuss the matter and reverse the decision of no confidence in them.

Intolerable

Mr. Jarosz continued "If the S.G.M. does not ratify our reappointment the Union will continue with one Executive Officer for 2 month until new elections can be held in February. If this happens the burden on him will be intolerable." There is the added ques-tion of whether the Union's 90 permanent members of staff will be prepared to work under such conditions. Normally they are responsible to the University Bursar through the President. A member of the perma-nent staff said: "At the moment we are continuing as normal. Our loyalties are to the students as a whole but

All but one of the University

This year's Exec may not be an outstanding one, but it is not guilty of the highsounding charges which were bandied around in a mood of euphoric hysteria on Monday.



Proposing his motion Mr Ball spoke of the 'secrecy and elitism of the Executive and their failure to involve ordinary student members in Union decision-making. The first amendment was

The first amendment was passed after which the amended motion was carried by 111 votes to 91.

During chaotic scenes following the decision, Mr Daswani commented that he was too overcome to say anything. "I cannot find words to express my feelings," he said.

Ex-Union President Andy Jarosz said: 'It was passed in a fit of pique by a lot of people who believed Exec. was trying to no-confidence Mr Daswani. In fact it was a private motion by Carol archists said: 'We are determined to kick Executive out. Their failure to get through to ordinary students is reflected in, amongst other things, the low attendance at most OGM's."

During a spate of emergency meetings to discuss the sacking, the Union's Communist Party has come out on Executive's side while the Black and Red Group and International Marxist Group are against them being reinstated. The International Socialists are split. the real motive which was a politically opportunist move by Revolutionary Anarchists and International Socialists to manipulate more gullable students in undermining the structure of the Union.





£100 RISE IN GRANTS

Substantial increases in student grants and a reduction in parental contributions are expected to be announced by the Government next year.

It is thought that grants will be increased by about 22 per cent. The National Union of Students is demanding 35 per cent.

Last week the Committee of University Vice-Chancellors called for an increase of 30 per cent. However because of the present economic situation the Government may find it difficult to raise grants by as much as it would like.

It is believed that Norman St John Stevas, before leaving his post as under-secretary for higher education at the Department of Education and Science, recommended increases which will allow students to keep pace with the rising cost of living.

Socialist student killed

Michael William Hodder, 20 year old University Chemistry finalist, was killed in a road crash on Saturday when the motor-cycle he was riding collided with a car near Bolton Abbey.

Mr Hodder was President of the Union Motor Cycle Club and Chairman of the Young Socialists Students Society. Last year he was an unsuccessful candidate for the post of Union Secretary.

He has also suggested additions to the grants of married women students and further tax allowances for

parents contributing to their children's grants. But any major reduction on parental contributions will mean that there is less in the kitty for an increase in the mandatory grant which now stands at £485.

Parental contributions will not be abolished completely but the will be progressively reduced over the next two years and are eventually expected to be abolished altogether.

Parents will probably not have to start contributing towards grants until their income exceeds £1,800. The present limit is £1,400.

Are the French cinephiles correct in their adulation of the 'Carry On' genre? Is Gerald Thomas, director ordinaire, a hitherto unkonwn auteur? Does Sid James' laugh form part of our national heritages?? Is Barbara Windsor really 103?

And what about those gorgeous girls! Those women really are a handful! Feeling hungry? — have a pair! Yes, tits really are the funniest thing since the Three Stooges. This film is the stuff family entertainment is made of. N.T. Titter titter.

Although, with certain notable exceptions, the films at the Plaza are noted more for their heavy-handed atempts at sexual humour than for their subtlety and wit, there are occasions when the sex film reaches areas more sophisticated than normal. In this category is "All the Loving Couples."

It is not one for the dirty mackintosh brigade as the sex scenes do not go into any explicit detail; it may be, since

the film is only 72 minutes long, that any such detail has been lost. However the merit of the film is not in any sexual understatement, but in the frequently highly amusing American attitude to wife-swapping. Especially in the early part of the film, the

humour has a lightness of touch which is refreshing and attractive.

It is unfortunate that this deftness should be sacrificed for a moral statement laid on with an extremely large trowel to show that there is honour even among wifeswappers: it's all right so long as you don't talk about business.

Fresh Renaissance

RENAISSANCE: "Ashes for Burning" 'American Graffiti' SOVEREIGN

Renaissance was originally formed by Keith Relf, of the Yardbirds, who, with his sister Jane, Yardbird drummer Jim McCarty, and pianist John Hawken, managed to produce a group with a remarkably fresh sound for the time.

The new Renaissance has an entirely different line-up to the original but the freshness remains. In these times of 'Belt it out' bands, it's good to know that there are people that don't rely on decibels to move their audiences.

The flowing keyboard style of John Trout provides most of the warmth of this recording, yet it's never over-lush or sentimental, Annie Haslam's crystal vocals provide the drive to make this album worthy

of note. The musicians in Renaissance may have changed since the band's inception but the spirit is still there. Don't miss 'Ashes are Burning'.

Another enjoyable album obtainable from your friendly store is 'American Graffiti', the sound track to the movie. The film relates an evening in the life of some 'Fifties kids, and the album is the predictable selection of old classics. A good deal of care has gone into the compilation, though, and such gems as 'Green Onions' 'Rock around the Clock,' and 'Barbra Anne', are included. (You thought the Beachboys made the original?) The programming of the LP is intelleigently done, and it's almost worth the price to hear good old tracks in stereo.




