

Leeds quiet as anger spreads

As thousands of students all over the country went into occupation of their college adminstrations this week in protest against the Government's proposals to raise tuition fees next session, Leeds remained relatively quite.

The main action in Leeds this week has centred around the Polytechnic Union. Yesterday, a special general meeting was due to be held to discuss how the Union should oppose the increases.

But at the University the fees issue has remained almost dormant.

Around the country, there were a total of 24 student unions involved in sit-ins when we went to print but many more were expected to follow by the end of the week.

The main impetus for them has emanated from the London School of Economics. Although the LSE occupation ended when students were removed by police on Saturday, it is their action which prompted NUS to call for the sit-ins.

Speaking in Leeds this week NUS National Secretary Sue Slipman said: "The fee increases are the biggest attack on educational opportunity since the war. They will deny education to anyone who

hasn't come through the traditional A-level system and to thousands of overseas students."

Explaining why Leeds University had not taken part in this week's campaign, General Secretary Steve Burns said that students at the University did not seem interested. Last term, a fees strike organised by the Union had involved only 30 students, he said.

Mr Burns added that the Union was concentrating its efforts into next Wednesday's day of action against education cuts in general.

Record demo expected

Over 5,000 students and Trade Unionists are to march to Leeds Civic Hall next Wednesday in protest against education cuts.

It is expected to be the biggest education demonstration ever staged in Leeds.

The demonstrators, who will converge on Leeds from all parts of Yorkshire, aim to publicise the drastic consequences that cuts in public spending will have on jobs and courses in Higher and Further education.

The march organisers say that the Government's plans to raise tuition fees, cut back on discretionary awards, and reduce education spending will cause the closure of many small colleges and will mean that many students will no longer be able to continue their education because they cannot afford it.

In Leeds, Jacob Kramer college, Park Lane college and Airdale and Wharfdale college will be closed while staff and students demonstrate.

At Kitson college there will be a picket which is to be supported by cleaners, teachers and students.

At Leeds Polytechnic, lectures will be cancelled after 11 a.m.

Leeds Area NUS secretary Sarah Ward said: "We intend to motivate the mass of people against the Government's plans. The day of action marks the beginnings of a mass movement."

Almost all students in Leeds would agree that the Government's education cuts should be fought — almost all are doing nothing about it.

Whilst the rest of the country's students are taking positive steps this week to get, for example, the fees rises reduced, we, in Leeds, especially at the University, have hardly discussed the matter.

If next Wednesday's march is as big as is being predicted, it is likely to be more through the efforts of trade unionists than student unionists.

The students who do attend are likely to be the same ones who have attended march after march. Every student in Leeds is effected by the cuts, but the vast majority of them will remain absent.

In Leeds we have a potentially powerful weapon — a body of 30,000 students in a concentrated area.

Let's use that weapon on Wednesday.

The week's news in brief

University Union Bar Manager Les Taylor (pictured right) sustained rib injuries when he was hit with a chair as he asked people to drink-up last Thursday night.

It was the second attack in two weeks on a Union employee. The week before, card-checker Peter Gray suffered a dislocated collar-bone after he was thrown down a flight of stairs.

hospital.

He has a serious blood infection in which parasites are feeding off his heart. This is a recurrance of an old illness, and not a rare sheep virus contracted after giving a sheep the kiss of life on his farm.

Tory Richard Hawkes became the newest member of the University Union executive this week when he was elected as NUS Secretary. He beat his rival, Carol Wilkinson, by 452 votes to 427.

In the election for Publicity Officer, Kevin Joss beat Wyatt Ramsdale by 480 votes to 384.

Mr Joss, who has already held the post for a term says he will resign in three months in order to take over the Deputy Presidency next session.

CHILDREN IN CAMPUS CRIME

Organised gangs of schoolchildren are making regular thieving raids on property belonging to students at the University.

Three boys, aged from 12 to 15, were caught in the act of stealing at Charles Morris Hall last week, during Leeds schools' half-term holiday.

Mr Duncan Mercer, sub-warden of the hall, said that two of the children were keeping watch while the other got through an open window on the ground floor.

Apparently this is not an isolated incident.

Mr Mercer said: "Kids have been

operating in gangs for some time, trying doors in obvious attempts to steal".

At James Baillie Flats young children are interfering with the mail, while at Garstang and Astbury Flats students have had food stolen from refrigerators.

Lupton Flats resident, Simon Bullock said "Kids are always wandering round. You can't even hang washing out with safety."

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

an OGM, when Phillip Sands got his motion inviting strippers passed by five votes.

The strippers unveiled in front of 83 people, while outside the picket of 60 told students entering the show why they should not support striptease.

The picket convinced about 20 people. Those who braved the picket-line and went to the show were called 'wankers'.

Picket leader Linda Linley said: "Women will never achieve equality while they are treated as sex objects".

"Strip shows are morally unviable and are the ultimate in the subordination of women".

Now Ms Linley is collecting a petition as part of the campaign to ban stripping from the union.

It is believed that an attempt to reverse the decision to entertain strippers will arise at the next OGM.

The Polytechnic Union paid £75 for the three strippers and a film, and the evening is expected to have lost the Union about £30.

The Executive decision meant that a leaflet submitted by the Palestinian Students Society could not be printed by the Unions Duplicating service.

The leaflet was written by the British Anti Zionist Movement and the executive claimed it was "too emotive".

At Tuesday's OGM International Socialist Charlie Hore said that the leaflet was not racist. His motion that anything should be printed by the duplicating service, unless "the content is blatantly racist", was clearly carried.

One of the country's leading teacher unions has been accused of using "high pressure tactics" in trying to recruit new members of the Polytechnic.

The accusation, which was levelled at the NAS/UWT, The Career Teachers' Organisation, was made by the Poly Union Executive at their meeting this week. They say that the organisation has "pestered" students in halls of residence.

Now the Union has recommended to the Polytechnic administration that college facilities be withdrawn.

Today's Politics Society talk by Sir Keith Joseph will only open to University staff members and holders of University Union cards. The decision, made at Tuesday's University Union OGM, comes after rumours of Special Branch infiltration.

The University Rugby Club hope to go on a tour of America in the summer. It is expected to cost them around £5000.

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Row after debate is disrupted

Demonstrators who disrupted last week's Great Education Debate in Bradford have hit back at the people who slammed their behaviour as irresponsible.

The students were protesting about the elitist nature of the debate on education at Bradford College where only eight students were invited to attend out of a total of 250 delegates.

About 30 chanting students broke through a locked door and burst into the foyer of the college. Later there were claims that Gordon Oakes, Minister of State for Education, was jostled as he left the meeting.

The demonstrators' action was condemned by NUS Deputy President Pete Ashby who said that they had got students alot of adverse publicity which will do the fight against education cuts no good.

Leeds Poly President Chris Pratt, a delegate at the debate, said: "Although I agreed with the aims of



Too few of the products of higher education are primarily producers of wealth, it was claimed by Dr Patrick Nuttgens, director of Leeds Polytechnic in a weekend speech.

But Dr Nuttgens (pictured above) said that "the situation is being changed by an educational revolution.

"The fact is that, at the moment, for every person trained as an engineer we train 15 sociologists. Now we are saying it is as important to learn to do something well as to be virtually useless but estimable."

Defending the picket, Poly Exec member Ian Peart said that the action brought more attention to education cuts than the debate it-

Bingley College President, Dave Barton, said: "Education is in a state of chaos, and when farces like

the Great Debate take place behind closed doors, effectively denying students the right to contribute, I would suggest that protests of this nature are inevitable.'

Bingley students deny that the Minister of State was attacked and that his car was obstructed.

Mr Barton said: "The relations between police and demonstrators were excellent. The broken window was a complete accident which occurred when someone's elbow went through it".

University halts plan for area handbook

Plans for an area handbook for all freshers in Leeds next year have been flatly rejected by the University Union.

Putting forward the proposal at Tuesday's University OGM, Leeds Area NUS Secretary Sarah Ward said that if the Union backed it, it would be a way of helping out the less well-off unions in the area.

She said: "The University Union gets over £33 a year for each of its students. Some of the smaller colleges are only allowed 25p. We must show our dis-approval for the binary divide by our own action."

Opposing the motion, Union General Secretary Steve Burns said that if the Union accepted the proposal it would be signing a blank cheque. The financial costings were unsound, he said, and it was the University Union that would "end up paying all the losses".

Mr Burns also said that it was too late to start producing an area handbook. He advised that a similar motion should be introduced earlier on in next year's session.

Ms Ward's motion was defeated by 214-180.

Low increase in hall fees

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Sincerely,

asking students to take up cases of Chilean political prisoners who have disappeared without trace, or who have applied for a British visa to go into exile, but remain in prison due to Home Office delays in considering their cases.

A number of Chilean refugees are already studying in Leeds. One way in which students can help those still in Chilean jails is by writing to the Home Secretary Merlyn Rees at the House of Commons, asking that he gets his Home Office officials to speed-up the processing of urgent visa applications from Latin Americans in danger or in prison. And if anyone would like to know more about the Chile Solidarity Campaign and its work, there is always someone on the bookstall, Thursday lunchtimes in the University Union, who is ready to talk to them.


This brings me on to the Union building itself. There is enormous room here for improvement.

WHY AM I STANDING?

(1) Because we have apathy not only among the students as a whole, but also among some of the 'Hacks'. For example several Union Officers have been no-confidenced for not performing their duties. Clearly the attitude of some of our Union 'activists' is not everything it could, and should, be. (2) Because we need a Union which will serve the ordinary student. At present we have a vast complex of Councils, Committees, Boards, etc. with the same old faces on them all. How can such a small group represent and serve all students? 

Back on the road again

John Martyn is back on the road again and judging by the rapturous reception he received last Tuesday in the University refectory everyone is delighted.

Playing live music is what John Martyn is all about and it's what he enjoys doing most:

"This tour's been fantastic, I've really enjoyed doing it. I didn't enjoy the London gig very much the nearest people were 40 feet away and it's very difficult to talk to people in those conditions

Because he's a solo performer, the relationship with the audience is of paramount importance:

"If you don't have the right relationship, you can't play properly and you end up just going on and doing a job. You've got to feel that you're communicating with some-one.'

However, being on the road does have its drawbacks. From 1969 to the end of 1975, Martyn had been working continuously touring and recording. On December 31 1975 he stopped and has only done ten gigs since then.

Shit-scared

As he says: "After six years on the road, I was very ill, not so much physically but mentally. I was shit-scared every time I went on stage. It's the idea of being a stranger in every town you go to, night after night after night. It's a real strain. So I retired to Jamaica and raved my nuts off."

Whilst out there, he became very involved with the local music scene. He played with a lot of reggae musicians and sat in on sessions with Max Romeo and Burning Spear.

He also wrote some new songs: "One of them - "Ain't you Scared" - was about how everyone is really scared of spades. In Jamaica they all seem terrified of negros.....

Although most of his work is serious, Martyn thinks that British audiences "take the whole thing far too seriously": "I like to play serious music but I don't agree with all the business of banging gongs on stage and spiritual vibes and heavy concentration. People say I'm loopy but I don't agree.

Martyn enjoys playing in America because the audiences are much more appreciative vocally. But that does not mean that he prefers playing in America, however. With British audiences, "once you've done the first couple of songs your ass is on the water and you're either going to have a good

gig or a bad gig." At heart, John Martyn is a romantic. Songs like "Head And Heart" and "May You Never" are

love songs at their best. When does he write songs?

"I write in various places and at various times. I write different songs in different situations. 3 o'clock in your own house is a very good time for writing gentle love

"I'm not concerned with physical song-writing – documentary or didactic - I'd rather write about emotions and moods than people and places. I don't like writing about dear old ladies starving to death - it's very trite. Also I don't like this idea of chucking place-names into songs, like "Streets of San Francisco" or "I was walking down to Tupelo" and

Although Roger Greenwood of the Calendar team was referring to the way in which he constructs a new story, it is also perhaps a fair description of the way in which each edition of YTV's daily news

"Newspaper reporting is the only activity I know where the

programme is produced. The atmosphere in the office at 10 o'clock in the morning is business like and efficient but hears little resemblance to the frenetic activity in the studio eight hours later as the programme goes out live to three million people.

Perhaps the most striking feature about the Calendar office is the normality of the proceedings. If working in television is supposed to be glamorous, then the glamour is not to be found in a News office.

It is perhaps this fact alone that explains why the programme is one of the most consistently popular of it's type in the country.

It is concerned more than anything else with people - not just the politicians and the faceless administrators who make decisions, but more especially with the ordinary people who will be affected by a new motorway or the closure of a local training college.

It is this close contact with the public that several members of the Calendar team find is one of the most appealing aspects of the work. Reporter Marilyn Webb, who like most of the staff started her career in newspapers, told me: "There is

far more contact with the public in this kind of journalism than in newspapers. Very often I will be out filming on location for most of the day and only come into the studio for the programme itself."

Evan Hughes Green one of the three news editors who work on the programme, summed up the most fundamental differences between newspapers and television: "TV has the advantage of speed. Newspapers are 500 years out of date when it comes to news gathering. In TV, not only can you report a story more quickly but you can achieve a greater impact with pictures."

Make or break

Sometimes the availability of pictures can make or break a story. Earlier on in the morning there had been what appeared to be a particularly interesting piece about a Salvation Army major selling his beard for charity. Unfortunately the film did not come through to the studio in time and without it the story was unusable.

On the other hand a story about a lorry crashing near Matlock had initially seemed fairly inconsequential, but with film of the scene of the crash this story subsequently became the lead story in the evening news bulletin.

It is this uncertainty about the value of news stories that can often make working on Calendar an exasperating experience. As the dead-

Making a television programme like Yorkshire's Calendar is not as easy as it looks. Nigel Roberts reports

line for the early news approached, one of the editorial staff was heard to mutter: "I hope to God that the police haven't caught the man and made a balls of the story."

As Grahame Ironside said: "The big problem with this kind of programme is that it is often very hard to evaluate how good a story is going to be. The situation can change so rapidly, and you may suddenly find that three or four of your most promising stories fall down. Fortunately this doesn't happen too often.'

Calendar have the advantage over most other regional news programmes because, in addition to a fleet of radio-controlled camera units they also have their own helicopter. This can be used to cover stories that would be impossible for a conventional camera crew because of the time factor

Last summer, for example, they managed to fly up to Wimbledon umpire for an interview immediately after a match. On another

occasion it was used to 'rescue' film from a crew that was stranded in thick snow on the Yorkshire moors. The crew was stuck there for several more hours but the film got Getting the news is only part of

Although a news item has never actually been put in whilst the programme has been on the air, it has been fairly close on several

At the end of the Poulson case at Leeds Crown Court, there was a camera crew outside the court. Less than two minutes after the judge had finished talking a live report was slotted into the opening news

Only the day before my visit a particularly important news item had been inserted 20 seconds before the programme went on the

The pace at which the Calendar team work can vary enormously. On a relatively quiet day, producing the programme is comparatively

easy. When there is a lot of news the pace in the office and the studio can best be described as frenetic.

The tension mounts. With minutes to go before transmission, the Calendar newsreaders look over their scripts.

the problem facing the Calendar team. There are also numerous technical constraints to be taken into account. Timing is perhaps the most im-

portant aspect of producing this kind of TV programme. Each item is allocated a specific length of time and the script must be written to fit into this exactly.

At the same time, film and video tape must be cut in such a way that it fits in with the commentary.

When the news editors and presenters are preparing copy for a programme they work to a precise formula to ensure that each item is the right length. It is reckoned that most presenters speak at the rate of three words per second so each story must be written in such a way that it fits in with the required timing.

Autocue

When you see the presenters reading the news or introducing an tem they may appear to be doing it all from memory. In actual fact every word spoken (apart from interviews) is read from an ingenious device called an autocue.

This consists of a small television monitor mounted below the camera which throws a picture of the script onto a two way mirror mounted in front of the lens.

So next time you think that Marilyn Webb is looking straight at you with those hazel eyes - she is in fact reading her script.

Roger Greenwood has two news--reading speeds. One for news stories (three words per second) and a slightly faster speed of four words per second for sports reports. Austin Mitchell has an even wider range of speeds, and has been known to be able to fit in an extra news story during a news bulletin when he is on form.

There have been occasions when the timing has been miscalculated and there is not enough copy to fill out the time. It is at moments like this that the presenter proves his worth. As Fred Dineage of "Calendar Sport" explained:

"A good link man doesn't just earn his money by standing in front of a camera and reading from an autocue. A good presenter will come into his own when things go

Despite the fact that Calendar goes out live five nights per week usually without a rehearsal - there are surprisingly few slip-ups. Indeed when you see the apparent calm on screen, it is hard to imagine that the presenters are anything but cool and collected.

But as Fred Dineage said: "At the beginning of a programme, it's like being faced with a bloody great mountain to climb. You know that you've got to be faultless otherwise you get complaints."

It is perhaps some measure of the expertise and professionalism of the whole Calendar team that the programmes run so smoothly. But then again, as Grahame Ironside

Why clean up the Union?

It's spring, and a young student person's fancy turns to thoughts of Union Council elections.

Pardon the twisted cliche. It is merely the expression of a rather sardonic disenchantment with the manner in which those 25 upright souls who are to represent us fumble their way to power.

Anyone who has had the time or indeed the fortitude of constitution - to read the fifty or so 'manifestos' currently decorating the Union notice-boards and filling out the pages of this newspaper, may have experienced a similar disenchantment. There, in all their slightly tarnished glory, are the usual promises, the usual denials of political affiliation, the usual alleged concern for the welfare of the "ordinary student" (so the patronising phrase goes).

But this year, one topic is more pronounced than ever. I refer, as if you hadn't already guessed it, to the 'state of the Union building'.

So apparently sincere is the attachment that many of this year's crop of candidates in the UC sweepstakes seem to feel for that rambling piece of architecture, that they have constantly emphasised the need to "brighten it up".

Why does the Union need bright-

ening up? Are we not possessed of one of the largest unions in the country, with a range of facilities that could put any community centre in Britain to shame? Apparently not.

Restaurants, numerous shops, a bank, bars, coffee lounges, a billiards room, a concert hall, TV rooms, subsidised food and drink, and countless other amenities, we have them all at our disposal 9am to midnight, seven days a week. I wonder if any of Park Lane College's 6,000 students - where the total facilities amount to a small union office and a common room no larger than the stage of our own Riley Smith Hall - would agree with the complaints of our budding representatives?

Perhaps the inner walls of our Union could stand a lick of paint. Perhaps the carpets on the stairs aren't so pleasing to the eye. Perhaps the toilets are a little unaesthetic, the state of the Mouat Jones lounge is less than salubrious. Does it matter? The University Union is a functional building. It's there to provide services, not to win prizes for neatness.

What the clean-up brigade seem to forget is that it takes an army of cleaners working round the clock to restore the building to a tidy state after thousands of students have abused it during the day. Students, perhaps more so than any other social group, are untidy sods.

There was a time when the Union was being raided almost every night by the police, hunting for drug-pushers. When it was the haunt of every freak, tramp, and shyster in Leeds and the surrounding area. That is no longer the case, yet some of the UC candidates can still ignorantly state they have seen the building "go down" in recent

Is it that they feel they can cull a few votes by picking on something as emotive as "facilities", and promising to do something about the alleged lack of them? It seems so. Surely it is the worst kind of naivety to imagine that redecoration of the Union will bring back those wayward persons who no longer find its apparance palatable. The old Bierkeller bar was refurnished at the start of last session, at a cost of £5,500. Do any of these

idealists who want to transmogrify the building feel that money was well-spent? All it did was to give the perennial wreckers some expensive mock-leather seat covers to rip up, instead of the old wooden benches. I have to say my friend, lan Coxon, was totally correct when he wrote in "Leeds Student" on October 10, 1975:

"Pleasant as the new blue and red decor is, I doubt it will withstand for long the boisterous pounding that has been inflicted on the place in the past....."

The fate of any other attempt to "brighten up" our Union would, I fear, be exactly the same. The total amount of cash we

spend annually on maintaining the services that many of us now seem to take so much for granted, is almost £¾ million. Can we really sit back and mutter in our privileged position about such trivia?

Or should we not be turning our attention to more important issues? The extent to which Government policy on expenditure is imperilling not only our own education, but that of our sons and daughters, for example. Personally, I like the Union building as it is. It will always remain one of my fondest memories of Leeds, warts and all.

75% of students on the main rate grant don't get the full amount of parental contribution. This is a direct result of the parental means test, and this is the greatest unfairness in the grants system for University students. But other anomalies exist. Such as the divisive discretionary awards system, where students on courses such as OND HNC 'O' and 'A' levels do not get the full grant, or in many cases, do not get anything like it. We must work for the ending of such unfairness, so that all students get a full grant.

My knowledge of students unions and NUS at a local, area and national level is probably unrivalled outside Exec. 





"Silent Movie" is a silent movie about the making of a silent movie. Mel Brooks and Marty Feldman team up in this hilarious spoof on the film industry and prove that the art of slapstick is alive and literally kicking.

What "Blazing Saddles" did for the Wild West, "Silent Movie" does for Hollywood. Mel Funn, hasbeen film director, determines to rescue the Big Picture Studios from the threat of takeover by Engulf and Devour, an evil-minded organisation dedicated to power. ("Our toilets are better than other people's homes.")

Funn, and his associates Marty Egg and Bell, zip around Hollywood in their yellow sports car, rounding up famous stars by various devious methods, persuading them to appear in his silent film. Silent Movie

Maximum comedy

Sandy Wilson's musical, if treated wrongly, can either come across as trite, boring rubbish, or degenerate into high-camp (compare Ken Russell's horrendous screen version). If taken as it was written, "The Boy Friend" emerges as a frothy pastiche of twenties' style, with tongue always in cheek. There is no content — just style, and a lot of fun.

The Leicester Theatre Company have realised this and have produced a success; comedy is played up to near maximum and the pace is fast and constant. With the aid of an extremely snappy jazz-orchestra and sensible stage-amplification, there were very few problems.

In fact, my only complaints were a definite slowness in two routines in the first act — "Perfect Young Ladies" and "The Boy Friend" and a certain tepidness in Martin Smith's performance as Bobby Van Husen ("that terribly rich, handsome, young American

who's staying at the Negresco!") I took exception to the latter, as Bobby is supposed to convey more vitality than all the other young men in the musical — even the bouncing energy of Mr Smith's partner Elaine Page, as Maisie, wasn't enough to lift him.

Miriam Karlin was superb as the glossy, sensuous Mile Dubonnet and played for laughs at every chance without having to impose herself. Also excellent was Darryl Kavann as an unusually svelte Percy Brown. Equally satisfying performances came from John Conroy as Tony and Alexander Dove as Lord Brockhurst.

This production is bright, funny and tastefully handled.

Audience involvement

This film is probably one of the best things to have emerged from the last Olympic games. It is not obsessed with winning, nor does it subject its audience to an embarrassing glorification of those athletic demi-gods on skis.

The film is, on the contrary, a brilliant and essentially realistic study of the triumph and despair of top class sport. The production and direction have aimed—successfully—at getting audience directly involved in the sensations of each sport.

Rick Wakeman's music, while it provides an interesting and well-related background to the action, does not — unless you're a true

"The Last Tycoon" has little beginning and less end. It is a statement of the past and a fantasy for the present. In both aspects it is a success.

This transformation was chiefly inspired by the efforts of conductor Volker Wagonheim. His approach to each piece was personal and without preconceptions. Never afraid of making heavy demands on his orchestra, Wagenheim received a consistently spirited response.

Mozart's concert aria 'A Questo Seno Deh Vieni' sung by Janet Price probably came over best. The tempo and orchestral forces were perfectly guided behind Ms Price's lyrical performance.

However, she didn't fare so well in the two songs she contributed to the Incidental Music of Egmont. Here, her voice lacked the necessary bite and energy and often the orchestra played too loudly for her to be heard. In general, however the

piece had all the drama and excitement called for. Small slips were largely technical.

It was the concluding work of Brahms' Third Symphony that raised the greatest expectations and proved to be the biggest disappointment. All the previous balance and unity of the orchestra seemed to have been lost and the lack of coordination in the various sections was so blatant as to be almost startling.

Still, the effort was there and that made the whole concert far more enjoyable than colourless competence. ROGER MATTHEWS

Country classic

Emmylou Harris is the sweet siren of country song.

Her bright voice and demure taste have shepherded her from the comparative anonymity of the credits on countless L.A. cowboy albums to well-heeled stardom as the first lady of country rock.

She began her career as a colleague of Gram Parsons — meshing with the whole Poco/Eagles/Burritos gilded palace of sin network. Now, three solo albums later, she has established her own identity out of a flux of similar personalities like Maria Muldaur, Melissa Manchester and Wendy Waldman.

"Luxury Liner" is the hackeneyed country rock fusion at its best. There are the usual maudlin C&W lyrics about trains, prison and booze, lost loves, cowboys and cars; but all delivered with a frisson of rock consciousness that puts steel in the pedals and strength in the sentimentality.

The title track is a late Gram Parsons original, straight uptempo country, driven and directed by Emmylou's sweet upper registers. It's fast and catchy and could even be a hit.

"Ponchy and Lefty" has the two eponymous and anti-heroes gunned

down by the Federales in old Mexico. Emmylou Harris tackles the sweeping and stately melody line with tonal accuracy and a yearning timbre, making a credible scenario of a typical country "easeful death" song. On side two, the stand out cuts are "She", another Parsons effort and "Tulsa Queen" the single Harris composition on the album. "She" is dripping with potential emotional identification. It is the story of the girl from the rural South whose sole ability is to sing. Unlike Emmylou, this heroine wasn't very attractive nor very intelligent but "Oh she sure could sing/Yes, yes she sure could sing."

And so too can Ms. Harris. Her voice is the classic stuff of country. It can intone and emote without cliche, it can swing and be subtle; but more than that it can turn the merely competent into a thing of beauty.

She exudes wistful feminity but beneath a soft exterior she conceals vocal chords of silver and steel. If you've never bought country rock before, buy this. Now.

Masterful

Fairport Convention at the LA. Troubador

This is an album of quality. It features Fairport in concert several years ago and is a masterful demonstration of musicianship.

Anyone who thought they were finished without Sandy Denny has been proved decidedly wrong; they play with a command of their instruments and material which is complete. Dave Swarbrick's violin playing is extremely good. The album contains three "jigs" all of which he plays with relentless skill. Drummer Dave Mattock is also especially good, adapting really well to changes in mood and tempo, and showing great imagination.

The material on the album is varied and the standard of the lyrics is high. The songs are original and the singing distinctive and thoughtful especially on 'Jolly Hangman' which, despite the title, has a marvellous sombre quality.

In general the album has excellent textural variety about it. The band move effortlessly from jigs like 'Mason's Apron' to the gentle 'Sweet Primroses' to the humourous 'Yellow Bird' and it all works equally well. Even within a track they will change the tempo or mood very slightly giving the whole thing interest and colour. They are very well disciplined and coordinated and yet creative and always interesting. I found it refreshing.

Better than average

"Average White Band. World Tour 76," said the T-shirt. From such a mammoth investment of logistical and musical expertise, a live album souvenir seemed a natural product. After all, '76 was the year of the live record — but a double album? Could the Average Whites salvage a sinking reputation from the stage when they had so signally failed with studio material?

Well, yes. Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Cleveland are enshrined on vinyl and give the lie to the premises that the white album was a unrepeatable nine day's wonder.

The band dispensed with the over-confident sloppiness evident on the early, U.K. Tour dates. Here, they are tight, aggressive and very functional. Hamish and Alan's vocals are back to their strained Scottish perfection; the Dundee Horns, Roger Ball and Molly Duncan are welded into brassy smoothness and Gorrie's bass playing is as treble and twisted as a funk player can make it without lapsing into mannerism.

Person to Person by Average White Band ATLANTIC RECORDS

All the greatest hits are here. "Person to Person" is good — almost as good as the original studio version. It is a relief to hear Stuart and Gorrie singing without that hoarsely alcoholic inaccuracy which plagued them in 75. Even the falsettoes are hit straight and true. "Cut the Cake" is as solidly funky as ever and "If I ever leave this Heaven" sounds crisply melodious and tightly controlled.

The only error of judgement on the record is the eighteen minutes plus of "Pick Up the Pieces". It is the song with which they've become most closely identified, but at this length it's fast turning into the proverbial albatross around the neck — the sine qua non of an AWB concert.

However unlikely a Scottish funk band sounds in theory, the Average White Band prove that in studio practice it sounds good and live it can even sound better.

Still waiting for the break

Their live performances have assured The Steve Gibbons Band the premier position on the Brum rock circuit. They are a band of highly-skilled musicians led by the mean-looking Steve Gibbons.

This is the band's second album. Twelve original compositions plus a Chuck Berry standard showcase the versatility of the group. A large proportion of the songs tend towards a west coast sound reminiscent of The Eagles. This type of material tends to distract attention from the band's strongest asset — their ability to play raucous, heavy metal rock. Only-
