This year sees the first opportunity for students to take part in the governing of the University. A part which it is vital that the elected representatives are prepared to play to the full in these times of education expenditure cuts.

Already the cuts are taking effect. Lecturers are forced to cope with decreased numbers of Postgraduate demonstrators, causing a drop both in teaching standards and, for those postgrads no longer required as demonstrators, a decrease in living standards. Meanwhile, the University sees fit to spend thousands of pounds on cleaning buildings, planting bushes and grassing land at Wood Lane Flats which is to be dug up when the new Headingley dual carriageway is laid. Centenary celebrations are thought up as the University runs itself further into the red, and unless we are vigilant and act on the re-

sults of our vigilance we will find that as lecturers leave they will no longer be replaced.

As well as actively opposing these cuts and wild expenditure, representatives must also work to ensure that the Union receives a realistic increase in the per capita fee, which comes up for review this year, and ensure that the present University imposed system of electing departmental student representatives to University committees is changed so that the student body has the power of recalling their representatives if it believes them to be acting against student interests.

If I am elected as a Union representative to University Council, I will do my utmost to get changes implemented on the subject I've mentioned, whilst remaining alert to any new developments.

This Union exists to provide, among other things, efficient representation for its members. With the revision of the constitution of Senate we now have representation on that body, albeit inadequate. Senate makes the academic decisions within this University, and is in practice, the most powerful organ of University government.

It is important that the person elected to serve on Senate has close contacts with the currents of student feeling. This person must also be fully accountable to Union members through the general meeting. Whoever is elected must be able to put across forcefully the

wishes of his electorate on matters which concern them. Academic matters, dealt with by Senate, are of prime concern to students.

The person elected in this election will have to assist in the battle to get the University to agree to the Union's right to elect its own representatives on University committees. At present, student members of these committees are often appointed by a University administrator.

- 1 The role of a Union representative is to act as a *delegate* from the Union, carrying out Union policy and instructions from the relevant Union bodies. He must be willing at any time to resign from a committee if the Union passes a motion of "no-confidence" or if he feels unable to follow Union policy — even though the University do not accept this form of accountability to the Union membership.
- 2 Student representation in no way alters the basic undemocratic organisation of the university. Representation in itself only allows

the Union to influence peripheral decisions. Representation must be used firstly to gain information on the University's plans, and secondly to ensure that the University are aware of the Union's position on these plans. On major questions the *only* way to influence the University's decisions is by building a Union which is capable of *taking action* as a whole.

3 As a member of the International Socialist Society, I shall continue to fight for the adoption by the Union of our specific policies *within* the Union structures.

The Job of Academic Committee

The Academic Committee of Senate is responsible for all matters relating to academic work which are not within the province of the Boards of Faculties. (This includes for instance, Language problems of overseas students, Scholarships, Admissions, Teaching techniques, vacation Studies, etc).

Students on Committees

As with all committees on which students are in a minority, I do not expect, if elected, to be able to make much headway in making any innovations. For the University to agree to any changes, the backing of a substantial part of the student body is required. Only in that sort of context will any notice be taken of student reps.

I envisage, therefore, that the job of the student rep will be to keep watch over the interests of the union on the committee. This I will attempt to do.

Recallability

Finally, I have already been elected by union council, as a temporary member of this committee. The University does not agree and has decreed that I am permanently on the committee. It is a major point of union policy, and one with which I fully agree, that reps on university committees must be answerable to union general meetings. If I am not elected to this post I undertake to resign from Academic Committee to enable whoever is elected to take their seat.
