IRANIAN SPIES

The Iranian Government has ordered all its Embassies and Consulates abroad to step up their spying operations on counter-revolutionaries, and not to renew the passports of 'so-called' students

In a document from the Iranian Ministry of Foreign Affairs marked 'TOP SECRET --URGENT', foreign delegations are told to: "supply with the utmost accuracy the names of all Bahai's and counterrevolutionaries, especially the so called students, resident in the area of your responsibility.

"Also refuse renewal of their passports and only issue them with the pass permits"

This seems to be part of a growing campaign by the Kho-meini regime to silence opposi-tion from Iranian students studying abroad. If a foreign national does not have his passport renewed each year by his embassy, he automatically becomes an illegal immigrant

and faces deportation.
This week Iranian State Radio announced that no more money will be allowed out of Iran to pay student fees. Ostensibly this is to save foreign currency, but if this ruling is enforced many thousands of

Iranian students will be left without a visible means of support. Once again they are liable to be deported.

If they are sent home, many will face summary execution. Recently a group of students studying in France and Germany went back to visit their families --- they were executed before they even left Tehran airport.

The Iranian Consulate in London, somewhat predictably, denounced the document as a

forgery. "We don't know whether it was produced in this country or in Germany", said a spokesman.
"It is just another piece of counter-revolutionary propaganda".

The spokesman claimed that they are renewing all Iranian passports, except for those non-students who are eligible for National Service.

He also denied that Khomeini agents are spying on students. Of course we spy on prominent counter-revolutionaries like ex-president Bakhtiar, but we don't consider students to be counter-revolutionaries"

Such platitudes are unlikely to inspire confidence in Iranian dissidents in Britain. Whether they will be deported or not is at the whim of the Home Office.

Home Office policy, as far as is known, is to treat every case on its own merits. Those who can show that if they return they face persecution "for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular group or political opinion', will be allowed to stay. Those who cannot seem likely to be deported.

One thing is certain -- the Home Office is going to come under great pressure from Stu-dent Unions throughout the country to allow Iranian students to stay.

Leeds area NUS is pressing for all Iranians to be allowed to remain in Britain for at least two years. Leeds University Union is to table an emergency motion at the NUS conference, asking the NUS to publicise and condemn the Document from the Iranian Foreign Ministry.
They will also ask NUS to

write to the Home Office, asking if they intend to deport Iranians, and they hope to get an NUS committee set up to deal with the problems of Iranian Students

This Union resolves to mandate

Mads Dohm, the Poly Union Vice President for communication and Recreation commented that "The motion is a waste of time. It an Ordinar GM. The bit about 'all residents of Carnegie' is daft.

A lot of the students in Carnegie are members of other schools". As to the "resolves" part of the motion Mr Dohm said "Exec. already supports all the customs and traditions

The week also saw a double triumph for leading F.C.S. member Marcus Killick. He came an unexpected 2nd place in the NUS elections, and then followed it up by being elected Publicity Secretary, taking over from the retired Catherine Ogle.

Andy Graham did only half as well. He was elected External Affairs Secretary, but only managed to get elected as an observer to the NUS.

There were other unexpected failures in the NUS election. Jeremy Mindell, the often criticesed OGM speaker, and Gill Newman, the current Cultural Affairs Secretary, both failed to be elected as dele-

gates to the Conference.

Growing Support

A demonstration outsider the Town Hall last Friday afternoon kisplayed the growing support for Kitson student Chun Hee Leong the Malaysian student who is facing deport-

Mr. Mr Leong's solictor, heard from M.P., Merlyn Rees, at the Home Office had extended the deadline by a week to 21st November. After a further representation, the deadline has again been extended, although it is not known for how long.

An appeal has been lodged in the divisional courts against the decision of the Immigration tribunal on the grounds that Chun Hee Leong's supported him not only while he was in Malaysia but also while they were apart.

Poly Union OGM

Apathy doesn't rule, OK! Not at least when the agenda contains so much inflamatinary The Polytechnic material. O.G.M. was nothing if not cotraversail. With motions covering all grades of emotional reaction from feminism to Carnigie collective ego, the meeting was packed, often rowdy sometimes unmanageable, but

never apathetic. Preliminaries were quickly dispensed with, before going on the the meat of the agenda, starting with the proposal to have any society supporting the Khomeni regime in Iran banned. It was pointed out that this was unconstitutional. and the wording was amended to "investigate". Even so, members of the YSS and SWRF were concerned at the implication, especially as they support Khomeni as being anti-Imperialist. A warning anti-Imperialist. warning from the floor that the motion sought to involve LPU with affairs beyond its jurisdiction in a weak and uncertain way did not affect the mood of the meeting and the motion was immediately passed.

Moving on to a motion to

ban pornographic and sexist material from Union buildings. and the motion was passed convincingly, despite weak speeches for the motion, and a lot of chauvenist heckling for its supporters.

A motion called for a late minibus service fell victim to confusion generated by calls for the Carnegie motion to be read, and lost any chance of being passed in

its original form. Finally, the motion on Carngie. Principally this concerned the fact that on the Becket Park site there are a dispropportionately large number of places awarded to students of Carnegie, which results in bad feeling towards Carnegie students.

Concerning the banning of pornographic material from Union buildings, the Union held that: pornographic/provocative material in any form fosters violence against women. Also, sexist advertising is unnecessary and unpleasant and should be eradicated especially from displays in public places. It thus declared it's intention to be non-sexist in all matters, and ban sexist adverts from the union.

In discussing a late minibus for women students, the union recognised the special danger to women at night. But it would cost £197.50 per week to run even a limited service. It was resolved to organise a LANUS campaign for the return of a late night bus service for the benefit of every one. And in the meantime to use present Union transport to prevent people being stranded.

The Hall of residence should have a fair representation of the academic disciplines and not be overrun by one department, said the OGM. It was resolved to request Hall committeees to have "LEEDS POLY TECHNIC" printed on their sweatshirts and not "LEEDS CARNEGIE".

NUS WANT 17% RISE FOR STUDENTS

The National Union of Students has lodged a claim for a 17 per cent rise in student grants to give students back the real income they had in 1978/9 when Mrs Thatcher

David Aaronovitch, NUS President. David Aaronovitch, NUS President, claims that in the last three years "inflation has outstripped the student grant by 20 per cent, and nowadays most students live in real poverty".

He said that if the value of grants continues to decline, only the wealthy will be able to go on to college or university.

But, the size of this claim does not hide NUS fears that the grant is going to take another sharp fall. The most students can

hope for is the Government's norm of 4 per cent, and there is talk of them not even getting that.

Sir Keith Joseph, Secretary of State for Education, at last weeks Select Committee on Education, did not deny that student grants might bear the brunt of Department of Education

brunt of Department of Education and Science next year.

He emphasised that the student loans issue is not yet dead, and is reported to admire the American practice of students working their way through college.

Mr Aaronovitch says he is:

"Incredibly worried about recent press reports which tell of abolishing the £410 minimum award, paid to all students regardless of their parent's

income, and drastically increasing parental contributions.

"The Government seems poised to

inflict great hardship on students and their parents. An increase in the parental contribution would divide families and make students even more dependant on bank overdrafts."

dependant on bank overdrafts."
The grant increase was only 7 per cent last year, despite most college hall fees rising by between 15 and 25 per cent. At Manchester Poly, hall fees rose by 46 per cent.

Many Universities and Colleges have

also started charging students for services and amenities they had previously provided free.

MINIBUS OFFERED £7,500

The University Council has agreed to fund three quarters of the Women's Minibus Women's Service but only for one year, and only if abuses are ruled

The agreement to provide a lump sum of £7,500 with strings attached was made as last Thursday's Finance Committe meeting. The Committee decided on a one-off payment to be reviewed next year rather than a firm commitment to a percentage

The University is also trying to limit the use of the minibus to trips between the Union building and the women's homes.

Union President Seamus Gillen has insisted that negotiations are still open. The payments are not being backdated to last April, and he is keen to get this changed, as well as clear guidelines as to what constitutes legitimate use of the

UNIVERSITIES MAY HAVE TO CLOSE

Education Secretary Sir Keith Joseph has indicated this week that Government spending cuts may well lead to the closure of some Universities. He feels this would be preferable to allowing random bankruptcies.

Giving evidence to the Com-mons Select Committee on

Education, he said: "We would certainly deplore random closures, random bankrupties, resulting from a failure of a Uiversity to adjust adequately...But if it were the judgement of the UGC that it would be better for the qualtiy and standards of Higher Education as a whole that some thing other than random bankrupties must occur, Government would listen to that advice".

His that some Universities may close seems at odds with his comments on the probable effects of the cuts;

"I should concede that in very limited areas indeed there may be something called

Sir Keith also believes that the cuts could produce a higher standard of graduate by giving better opportunities in certain

The Education Secretary's extraordinary "doublespeak" comes after his flat rejection plea by the Vice-Chancellors' Committee more time to carry out the cuts. The Vice-chancellors wou-Id like the cuts to be spread over 5 years instead of 3, reducing the need for expensive redundancies and allowing them to accomodate present high levels of 48 yearhigh olds.

In a letter to Sir Keith Joseph they say that "cuts of unparalleled severity of such speed are certain to do untold harm to the quality of both teaching and re-search". They point out that they have not only been hit by the 8% budget cut ordained by the public expenditure white paper, but also

the loss of overseas student fees which has cut their income by a further 7%. All this at a time when the lagacy of the '60s baby boom is an unprecedented number of 18 year-

Government policy will mean the loss of some 10,000 places for new home students in each of the next two or three years.

The real dilemma for the universities is that to pay off a lecturer who is made redundant will cost as much, if not more, than to keep him

Mr Christopher Price, chairman of the Education Select Committee said:

"If universities do make people redundant they are liable to go bankrupt and if they do not make people redundant they are also liable to go bankrupt'

The Government hopes to save £250 million from cuts in the education budget and overseas student grants almost exactly the sum that the vice-chancellors are saying they will have to get from the Government to pay for all the required staff redundancies.

Sir Keith Joseph seems pre-pared to see the closure of some universities, and irreperable damage to others at no saving to the Gover-nment from its present positi-

Sir Keith, after 3 years of "giving in" to the national ized industries, would seem to be staking his political credibility on forcing through the university cuts.



Better president than premier?

I found the first of James Mates articles on CND, the one arguing for unilateral disarmament, quite readable and convincing. However, the second one was a sham. It may be politically expedient to make generalisations based on inaccuracis but for a topic as important as nuclear disarmament anyone who refuses to check up on their facts and who ignores other embas-sassing arguements in favour of unilateralism is doing your reader-ship no good whatsoever.

In other words, such a debate should be conducted on the basis of what we know and not on the basis of what we would like to think is actually happening. For example, according to Mr Mates, the balance of nuclear forces in Europe is such that NATO has a total of 1109 warheads and the Warsaw Pact has a total of 3502. How convenient of Mr Mates to exclude from the NATO list the 400 warheads to be found on the Posiden submarines which are on permanent loan to

NATO from the USA: how convenient to exclude from the NATO list Buccaneers, Jaguars, and American F-10, all nuclear bombers. How convenient, yet again (!) of Mr Mates to totally ignore NATO's 12:1 superiority over the Warsaw Pact in nuclear artillary, including the Lance and Honest John missile systems. And finally, how convenient of Mr Mates to imply that all the USSR's SS-20's are based in Europe (which they are not) and that all the USSR's Fencer-fighter and Flowger-D hombers are nuclear. and Flogger-D bombers are nuclear bombers (which again they are not). If one therefore makes some new calculations, the total is as follows: NATO warheads: 7,000, Warsaw Pact warheads: 3,250. Prove me wrong Mr Mates!

And so to continue. The Warsaw Pact's conventional superiority over the West is a fallacy. They may have 25,000 tanks and we may only have 12,000, but, leaving aside the fact that the Pentagon has openly said that Russian tanks are just no match for NATO, one should refer to the

decision of NATO planners in the early 70's to switch from tank production to anti-tank missile production. NATO has 195,000 of these accurate anti-tank missiles installed in Western Europe alone. Not to mention the fact that even the NATO funded Institute of Strategic Studies has accepted that Russian tanks are more concerned with keeping an Iron Grip on E. Ger-many and Poland etc. than on invad-

ing the West. But let us turn to Russian Expansionism. I would be the first to condemn Russia for not knowing what the word democracy means: CND nationally has, for example, condemned the Invasion of Afghanis-tan and the Installation of SS-20's. Yet how can Mr Mates talk about the Soviet threat and ignore the behaviour of our own so-called democracies? Has he forgotten that whilst Soviet tanks rolled into Hun-gary in 1956, British and French fighter aircraft were bombing Suez? Has he forgotten that at the same time as Czechoslovakia was invaded

destroying Vietnam and went on to finish the job in Cambodia? If we are democratic, how can Mr Mates justify Western behaviour in Chile in 1973, in Cuba in 1962, in the Dominican Republic in 1956? Does Mr Mates believe, just because a Russian submarine was incompetant enought to get caught in Swedish territorial waters, that NATO themselves aren't engaged in simi-lar activities elsewhere in the world? Come off it James, that type of arguement is naive and worthy of

What we must accept is that both power blocs would gladly grab at world domination by their own respective political and economic systems if they could get away with it. Both are equally culpable. They would fight their wars in Europe if they could get away with it, but are content to fight them in the Third World for the moment: European peace has therefore been achieved by exporting war and fighting it by proxy. Russian aggression must be condemned, and so must American

in 1968 American bombers were aggression: but it is the most aggres-sive that must be chastised most

strongly.

Western decisions on MX, Trident, Cruise missile systems are frightening; they give such an overwhelming superiority over the USSR (we had it anyway!) that nuclear war is inevitable.

Cruie missiles are first strike, Ask

I and 40 other students at Leeds University have jumped at the Bridlington Club, having been trained by the 4th Battalion, Parachute Regiment at their barracks at Pudsey. 

"The participating States will respect human rights and fundamental freedoms including the right to freedom of thought, conscience, religion or belief, for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion".

"Everyone has the right to leave his country, including his own, and return to his country".

The above extracts are taken from the Helsinki Final Act on Human Rights, to which the Soviet Union and Soviet bloc countries are signatories. Commenting on the agreement signed in Helsinki in 1975, Leonid Brezhnev said that it was: "... of historical significance... millions are conscious of the special nature of this event and its political sweep..."

There are approximately 3 million Jews living in the Soviet Union, making them the eleventh largest minorities in the U.S.S.R, are permitted their own traditions, languages, histories and cultures. The Jews in the U.S.S.R. however, are the only minority group totally denied facilities to perpetuate their own heritage: There are no text books available

on any aspect of Jewish history or culture, the teaching of Jewish history is forbidden and anything remotely connected with Israel of Zionism is considered to be an anti-Soviet activity. Hebrew is considered an anti-Soviet crime. Most synagogues have been closed and the few showplace synagogues that have been left open are strictly controlled by the K.G.B.

Anti-semitism today in the Soviet Union is open and official. More and more progressions are joining forces with politics and there are no Jews in the army, journalism or litera-

WITHIN EDUCATION

Higher education in the U.S.S.R. is one of the only two doors that leads to a career higher than routine technical administration, clerical or manual. The other door is party membership. However, it is increasingly difficult each year for Jewish students to enter university. Until 1968, the number of Jews admitted to Soviet universities continued to climb.

In 1968, as a result of the 6 Day War, a new ideological perception developed regarding Jews and their role in higher education. A leading Polish Communist theoretician Andrzej Werblan in an article written in June 1968 argued that anti-Communist diseases were generally inherent in Jews. The concentration of people of Jewish origin in universities and institutes created "bad political atmos-phere" and he recomand he recommended the "correction of the irregular ethnic composition" in higher education through discriminatory devices. It was later discovered that this was written on the initiative of the Soviet Central Party Committee in Moscow. From the academic year 1968/9 the admission of Jews to Soviet universities for the first time declined dramatically.

Jews are kept out of the

best higher educational institutes according to recent "Samizdat" (underground press) disclosures, by a system worked out, in fine detail for lowering the marks of Jews, which is administered by specially selected examiners who give Jews unusually difficult oral entrance exams. As a result, Jewish students are failed in entrance examinations of the universities of the main cities and find it possible to be admitted only to the universities in the outlying cities if they are fortunate. There are numerous cases of students who it appears have been failed in their exams as a result of discrimination. Misha Tratuta a 20 vear old student, is a gifted artist. He applied to an art school but was informed he had failed the entrance examination after a vigorouse interview. The following year he applied again to a less prestigious college. He was once more notified that he had failed the examination. The Soviet examination procedure allows candidates to appeal against a failure before 7.00 pm on the day of the result. Misha and one other Jewish candidate were not given their results until 8.00 pm, too late for an appeal.

Entry to Moscow University is now virtually closed to Jews especially in technical faculties: physics, mechanics, maths, engineering etc. and in faculties of Journalism,

History, Biology and Jurisprudence. In the academic years 1977/78 and 1978/79 not a single Jew was admitted to the Faculty of Mathematics.

The number of Jews accepted for medical institutes has been sharply reduced. The Moscow Institute of International Relations which trains diplomats, jurists and economists for work abroad is completely

closed to Jews. A study was undertaken by two mathematicians, B.I. Kanesvsky and V.A. Sandevov, who taught in special Maths and Physics in schools in the U.S.S.R. One group consisted of 47 students, none of whose parents or grandparents were Jewish, the other group consisted of 40 students whose parents and grandparents were Jews. Of the first group, 40 students were admitted to the Mocow University. Of the second group, only 6 were accepted. Yet students in both groups attained similar grades in their final

REFUSNIKS

school examinations.

A further obstacle is that it is Soviet policy to expel any student from university or institute, who has applied for an exit visa. There has not been a case where an applicant for an exit visa has been expelled for academic reasons such.

as poor grades. While he is a student, the male Soviet citizen is exempt from army service which is compulsory for men over 18. Expulsion from higher education means the loss of this exemption. Thus Jewish students who are expelled from a university or institute are immediately rendered liable to serve. Further conscript is barred from making an application for permission to emigrated for a further five years. This rule is inflexible and extends to every conscript regardless of whether he has been connected with a secret location or project.
The Soviet authorities

even accused children of having learnt state secrets from their parents. Boris Kalenarer's older sister was granted an exit visa in 1973. She lived at home with her family, as did her brother, yet he was accused of knowing secrets and she was not.

By depriving young Jews of an incentive to live in the U.S.S.R., the authorities are adding to thenumbers of those wanting to emigrate. But an application for an exit visa leads to further discrimination. To want to leave the U.S.S.R. is not unlawful, yet an application for an exit visa is treated as a crime! It is reason enough to expel a student from college, to sack a person from his job, to disconnect the telephone, to prevent that person from receiving any mail, to divide families. It is commonplace for the Soviet authorities to split families, allowing only one member of the family to emigrate. The family has to face the agonizing decision of whether those given visas should leave for the West and be separated from those who are most dear to them in the hope that one day they too will be allowed to leave, or whether to stay and continue to live in Soviet Russia. One woman wrote to the Soviet authorities after receiving another refusal: "...I am a sick old woman, a mother and I appeal to you with an urgent request for help. It is already ten years since I had last seen my son and my only

grand-daughter... Application for an exit visa can lead to the K.G.B. constantly following and harassing the family who want to emigrate. It can mean exile, prison and labour camps, as in the case of Anatoly Sharansky, Ida Nudel, Victor Brailovsky and so

many others. Thus those Jews who apply to emigrate but are refused an exit become "Refusniks"

At the beginning of the year Yosef Bernstein a refusnik, wrote to his cousin in England:

...On 10th November 1980, after my wife and I and a number of other refusniks had lodged a protest regarding the illegal refusal to allow us to emigrate to Israel, our family became the focus of persecution and threats.

"But it was the uninhibited blackmail to which the officials resorted that was the most shocking and agonising aspect of it all in its deliberate cruelty and cynicism. Calmly... they said that we have a nice young single daughter who could easily be assaulted by criminals, whom, they said, it would be difficult to restrain. They spoke for a long while in a refined manner, accusing us of not hinking enough about our daughter and adding that by trying to obtain permission to emigrate to Israel, we were exposing our daughter to the risk of being mutilated or raped by criminals... in a cool manner and with a measure of shrewdness they appealed to man's most precious quality - parental feeling, to deter us from attempting to get the illegal refusal regarding visas reversed...'

This story is not an exception, rather the norm.

THEIR ORDEAL

Everyone has their own tragic story and horrific experiences to relate. Ida Nudel who is serving four years internal exile in Krivosheino, a remote Siberian village for applying for an exit visa, wrote



& daughter Yana

in her diary before her sentence:

"October 25th.

I leave the house in the morning. After a few minutes I hear steps behind my back. Two men stop me and demand that I get into their car - I refuse... I am hit on the shoulder and fall. I am grabbed by my arms and dragged into the road, a car arrives. I am thrown in and we leave... The car stops at militia headquarters... I leave the car. I am brought into the room and the door is locked on the inside. One of the men puts the key into his pocket. I ask them who they are - they refuse to say, but merely declare they are going to interrogate me... They are holding me there until the evening. At night a car arrives. I am pushed into an iron box, locked up and being driven somewhere. My person will be searched. I demand to know of what I am being accused, what have done? Why am I being treated like this? They do not stand on ceremony. Grabbing me by my hands they push me into a room and start un-dressing me by force. Dirty hands are touching my breasts, my whole body, lifting my skirt and crawling into my pants. They find neither atom bombs nor revolvers. They do not know themselves what to look for ... '

It is difficult to imagine that human beings can create such horror but this is not some adventurous novel, nor does this information record occurrences from ten or twenty years ago, it records something that is happening now.

At the moment that you are reading this article, Anatoly Sharansky weighing 61/2 stone, going blind, is being tortured both mentally and physically in a camp in Siberia because he is a Jew who wanted to practice his religion in freedom in Israel.

Siberia, Sharansky wrote wife or child. Even a to his wife who, after being married to her husband for just one day was told she could emigrate and the authorities would definitely give Anatoly his visa after 6 months. That was 7 years ago:

... the cars, the ring of 'tails' around us in the street, the 'watchmen' by the doors and in the lift ... this is the picture of our life today"

On August 30, 1981,

Sharansky wrote to his mother in the one letter he is allowed to write from prison every 6 months:

... For a long time my only contact with human beings has been with the bird on my window-sill and the insects in my cell...

Anatoly Sharansky's 70 year old mother wrote to Brezhnev just after her son's imprisonment:

"... Almost 3 months have passed since the cruel, unjust and inhuman trial of my son Anatoly... there is no cessation of humiliation inflicted on us, the aged and sick patents. Knowing full well that his father was seriously ill during that difficult period, in fact, he suffered a severe heart attack - nevertheless, he was by calculated deceit, deprived of a visit to see his son which had been authorised by the Supreme Court. This may have been the last opportunity for a meeting between an ailing father and his condemned

On January 20th 1980, Sharansky's 32nd birthday, his father died without having seen his son for one and a half years.

The present situation for Jews in the U.S.S.R. is deteriorating rapidly. On June 11th 1981 a refusink wrote:

"...Today in Leningrad a common event took place, a Jew was fined for wearing a yamulka (skullcap) and for speaking about Shabbat (the Sabbath). What comes next?"

During the past three years, the increase of anti-Jewish attacks in the press, books and media, accusing visa applicants of being criminals, has incited hooliganism and racial descrimination. Individuals have had their photographs and addresses published in the local press and shown on nationwide T.V.

A Jew can now only apply for an wzit visa if he has been 'invited' to live in Israel by a close relative: Before he was sent to mother, father, husband, brother or sister is not considered a close enough relative. So few Jews are allowed out of the U.S.S.R. at the moment that of those who are permitted to apply to leave, only a mere handful actually manage to get permission to do so.

THE FUTURE?

To conclude this article,

an extract from a recent letter received from a refusnik living in Kiev:

... This is what's happened to us during the past year and a half; threats and humiliation on registering and submitting our documents for emigration; life as social outcasts; an illegal refusal; the hopelessness of our future in this coun-

...Emigration for us is now a matter of life or death. If we're refused a visa we shall be brought to the brink of psychological and material disaster, for a refusal would now amount to the physical destruction of our family.

"Friends in the West, our situation worsens with each passing day, but there's not the slightest sign that out petition to emigrate will be answered in the near future.

"In our hour of need we particularly appreciate the concern and interest in our fate which you show...

Every great love leaves its mark' says the slogan accompanying the film Tatoo, showing next week at the ABC. The tory involves New York tatoo artist, Karl Kinsky (Bruce Dern) who is asked to tattoo several models for a photo feature in a leading fashion magazine. It is here that he meets beautiful blonde model, Maddy (Maud Adams) whom he falls in love with to the point of obsession.

When work on the magazine is finished he is determined to see her again, but an evening at his flat turns sour when Karl is shocked by Maddy's promiscuous advances and is offended by her coarse language, for he is a man of high/old fashioned moral standards. He sends Maddy home but regrets it later when he finds that he cannot forgey her. He persistently asks her out and she understandably refuses. she, understandably, refuses.

Eventually he is driven to abducting Maddy and he takes her off to a secret hideaway, overcome by the desire to bestow on her an indelible mark of love, in other words, to tattoo pretty patterns all over her body. 'Love', he tells his victim, it's not something to be

painted on for a one-night stand-it has to last', and so he drugs Maddy and begins to make his permanent mark

When she awakens and sees her reflection in the mirror, Maddy is horrified and plans to kill her captor. What seems like a six million half-hearted attempts later, she still hasn't succeeded and I realised that just when I thought the action was about to begin

Maddy spends the rest of the film either drugged or locked up in a cupboard, or trying to kill Karl, and Mr. Kinsky (who turns out to be rather kinky) carries tatooing until he has finished his masterpiece.

It is a shame that the action is so slow, since both Maud Adams and Bruce Dern give good performances. But the director. Bob Brooks, has not really exploited the story to its full potential. There is little suspense and no terror until the end, when it eventually comes, is both predictable and frustrating, since neither Karl nor Maddy seem to be acting according to their beliefs, and one is left wondering what the point of the film really was.

The audience reacted apathetically when the band eventually managed to arrive on the



An American Werewolf in London

With the rash of entirely uninspired horror films which we've been assailed with in the last few months it is refreshing to at last discover one which is not only intelligent and imaginative enough to maintain interest throughout but which also brings an amusing and disquieting touch of reality to the age old subject of Lycanthropy.

John Landis's An American Werewolf in London is just that. Although Landis has had his commercial successes in the past, with Kentucky Fried Movie and Animal House, with this production he is aiming considerably higher, attempting to set the Werewolf Story against the 'ordinary, and even humourous events of every day life. It's a tall order, certainly, but the result is a film that is head and shoulders above his previous efforts.

David Naughton (a dead ringer for Sylvester Stallone) plays the title role - starting the film as David Kessler and innocent, boorish hitchhiker trudging accross the film which will have you unsure Yorkshire moors with his equally loud and tasteless but which is guraranteed to friend, and ending it as a entertain. friend, and ending it as a entertain. four legged friend in Piccadily DON WATSON.

circus. The film has all the turns of plot of the typical Werewolf film - the close knit and less than welcoming Yorkshire community with a closely guarded secret; the human touch, as Kessler falls in love with lonely English nurse Alex Price (Jenny Aguter) and the return of the friend from the ranks of the undead to warn Kessler that under the light of the full moon he will undergo a grotesque transformation (cue dramatic swoop of orchestration).

What makes the film exceptional however, is the way the archetypal plot is treated. There is a strong vein of humour running through the whole film - the frighteningly realistic metamorphosis scene is accompanied by Sam Cooke's Blue Moon and after a night of blood lust Kessler wakes up in the zoo (a dig at Altered States perhaps?) to face the problem of making his way across London completely naked. It stops short of complete parody, however, and the effect of the humour is to increase the effect of the horror. Kessler is no cardboard cutout, he is a real character who reacts to the intrusion of supernatural forces on his life in a realistic fashion by entertaining doubts as to his own sanity.

Add to this three dimensional treatment an impressive array of special effects - the work of Rick Baker, who created the superb bar-room monsters in Star Wars-and you have a

Especially funny, if slightly grotesque, were the scenes in which Hallum became the dog.

To add to this note of confusion Shirley becomes incorporeal in one place. We had already had Mother making valiant attempts to do up the imaginary buttons of imaginary Ernie's imaginary shirt. Towards the end we nearly had Hallum making love to an imaginary woman!

By the end when Mother and Ernie had set off for home and Shirley had decided to go back to her husband, the impossible happens; Wilfred actually appears as a giant

Has reality finally descended, the pretence of happiness with Shirley having been chuck-

ed out?

Or will Hallum be able to behave like an irresponsible animal out on the common with no qualms?

Martial Style

The origin of most martial arts seems lost in the depths of Japanese legends and history. In contrast to this, Aikido was founded by Morihei Ueshiba, who died as recently as 1969. The movement he founded in Japan

The movement he founded in Japan has spread all over the world, to over thirty countries in all six continents. The British Aikido federation was founded in 1968, and now has some 900 students. Last Saturday they held their seventh annual demonstration in Bradford.

Aikido is a non-aggresive art, derived from many of the older martial arts. It is essentially non-combative and taught by repetition of technique rather than a contest method of training. Although it provides ample exercise, it does not have or need a muscle-bound image. At the need a muscle-bound image. At the demonstration there were people of all ages and sizes, few of whom generated a sand-kicking image. The demonstration showed Aikido in all its forms, from novice to expert, and showed the techniques used in various aspects of the art.

aspects of the art.

It began and ended with Jiya-Waza, the free-form exercises used to warm up and unwind from training. Then followed demonstrations with sword, knife and stock, and various unarmed techniques, against different numbers of opponents and various types of weapons and attacks.

Perhaps the most impressive part of the display was not the almost static displays, but rather the classes we were shown in which the various grades of Alkido could be

s grades of Alkido could be Even to a non experienced

eye, it was obvious that the discip-line is based around negating force, eve, it was obvious that the discipline is based around negating force,
either by disenting it or taking
it over and reapplying it. In this
way, quite slight people were able
to throw fairly hefty assailents.
There was the feeling that the
defences only worked against preardained attacks, for example certain
techniques against a swordsmin would
have been of little use had the
attacker stood his ground and employed
the blade properly. But, I must
conless, it's been months since I was
attacked with a sword, and the ritual
aspect is present in almost all martial
disciplines that have evolved from
the Japanese fighting arts.

Although the novices were rather
static in their application of the
art, this was in no way true of the
masters, and especially Kanetsuka
Sensel, who is a fifth dan. His
demonstration came at the end,
and in it he convincingly disarmed
and multified the threat of four
attackers; one armed with a sword,
another with a stick, and the remaining
two each firmly gripping one of his
arms. A slight figure, he embodied
the intentions of the Aikido movement displaying good humour and an
easy relaxed grace.

Alkido is one of Britains most recent Aikido is one of Britains most recent Japenese imports, and whilst it does not have the long established tradition of Judo or Ju jittsu, or the TV and cinema enforced machismo of Karate and Kung Fu, the University ion showed clearly such an enthusiasic following.


