Six arrested at party

Six students were arrested in a police swoop on a party at the home of Poly Union officer Phil Fergus.

Eye witnesses said that the Saturday night party was in full swing when the police arrived. Earlier a patrol had called to request that the music from the hired disco be turned down.

Phil had left to clear up after a regular Poly disco, and so was not present when the arrests were made.

But other hosts at the executive vice-president's Manor Drive, Headingley address claimed that the police over-reacted.

"I don't think the music was particularly loud, and we had warned all our immediate neighbours."

A police spokesman said later that a decision on whether to proceed with charges had yet to he taken.

Poly president Jim Millar said the union would offer legal help if those arrested face court action.

All these proposals have been made without consultation with any of those involved - the NUS. the Department of Education or any MP's.

Woolas wins NUS

Labour Student's sweeping victory of the National Executive elections was headed by Phil Woolas' victory as President.

Phil Woolas is this year's Treasurer and ran as favourite throughout the election. After five transfers Woolas beat the nearest rival, Left Alliance candidate Jane Taylor by 26 votes, with the independent Socialist Sarah Veale third, the FCS candidate Simon Spalding fourth. Mr. Aardvark the 'anarchist' fifth and the SWSS candidate

Afterwards Phil Woolas answered some questions about the next year. He said that by the end of the next year he hoped to have got an admittance from the government that the present grants system is defunct. On more specific issues he thought that local links with Trade Unions needed to be strengthened, that the independence of individual Student Unions needed to he protected through reaffirming agreements with local L.E.A.'s.

Phil also said that a greater awareness of the problems of racism had to be built, and also concerning the right wing nature of the new leadership of the CS and its plans for disaffiliation. He said as well that he was opposed to the proposed LUU invitation to Gerry Adams. but would defend LUC's right to do

NUPE **ACTION**

The possibility of industrial action by NUPE is this week still unconfirmed.

Talks are continuing in London between the union and the University Council for Nonteaching Staff

Syd Ğarrneu, Branch Chairman refused to give any details to Leeds Student. He said: "There's no way I'm going to tell the University or you what we are going to do."

DEMO BAND COMPENSATION

Feelings have become heated at Sadler Hall in recent weeks as a result of antagonism between students and their warden Dr. Michael Littlefair.

Students are angry at the disciplinary action that has been taken because of their alleged had behaviour. The Hall bar has just been closed for two nights and a formal meal cancelled for reasons students consider to be unfair.

In a letter sent to Leed's Student signed 'The Students as Sadler Hall' the claim is made that 'During this Academic year, we have been subjected to excessively oppressive activity from the Warden,' According to this version the action was taken because of some singing at the Hall bar which the Warden took exception to.

The Warden, Dr. Michael Littlefair. said that the disciplinary action had been taken as a result of the bad behaviour of students playing foot-ball on the lawn outside the Hall at midnight and also upsetting his 'rife. He claimed that the letter 'did not represent the majority of the students at Sadler Hall.

Hall President, Anthony Richardson agreed that there had been problems between students and the Warden but fill that the T.G.M. on Tuesday nigh; had 'cleared much of the air.'
Two second year students at the

Hall, one of whom is a committee member, felt that small incidents had escalated into bad feelings within the Hall to a large extent because of the lack of communicaaon that has seemed to exist between the Warden and the students.

It was also tuggrurd that (he Warden who is new to both the Hall and the University is suffering because students diSlike the disciplinarian role that he had adopted in contrast to the more relaxed atmosphere under the last Warden.

There seemed to he some feeling of optimism in the Hall that the recent T.G.M. may have helped ill improving relations between the Warden and the students although how far this is true remains to be

Health Service Costs Paid

The University Health Service charge was finally burled at a meeting of the University Finance Committee yesterday, which has approved a payment Of nearly £11,000 to the Health Service.

The payment, made on a non-recurrant basis, is needed to meet the shortfall left by the failure of the Student Health charge, which only raised around Ei0,000 of the £22,000 which the charge was meant to raise.

The ill-fated charge was instigated after the University decided that as part of the second stage cuts the Health Service had to save £22,000 over the year. Rather than cut the service it was decided to introduce a L5.00 charge for the use of the special facilities. When this charge was made compulsory the Union organised a successful campaign in opposition to the charge. This led to the Universite's abandonment of the

With the University forced to reconsider the future of the charge, a group consisting of University officials and Union officers Aileen McLoughlin and Martin Glancy has been formed to investigate the future of the **Health Service.**

LUU President-elect Glancy told Leeds Student that it is .. "no longer a feasible way of raising the money. We shall be pressing the University to -accept its responsibility to fund the service.'

The group will also be discussing future development of the service. LUU General Secretary, Aileen McLoughlin told Leeds Student: "I want the group to accept that the Issue of the fee is dead and to concentrate on stabalising the finance of Student Health so future developments can he made to meet the needs of the students."

Proposed developments are the expansion of the psychiatric services, including the possible introduction of a full-time post. Also proposed is the opening of the sick bay to Polytechnic students and the expansion of the Family Planning service.

Miss McLoughlin told Leeds Student with a certain optimistn that she thinks ... "the options of expanding should be fully explored and extra finances provided if these services are found to be needed." **NIGEL HOLTHY**

III iuus _{Tartan Bar} Tonight 5011**54** funic disc/ Impact Theatre Company are rapidly establishing themselves as the leading avantegarde theatre company in England. Originally based in Leeds, they returned last week to perform their new production; devised and written by the cast it has all the hallmarks necessary for being received with the same critical acclaim as their previous work.

Graeme Miller, one of the founder-members of the co-operative, went on to talk about the first five years of Impact. The original line-up were all at one time or another) members of the University, and had decided to go professional in the Autumn of 1978, having been involved in **Abide With Me**, an NSDF entry for that year.

Based in Leeds 6, the company struggled along in poverty and isolation. Half of them were funded by the Manpower Services Commission while the other half begged what little they could from Yorkshire Arts. Their isolation from the 'mainstream' theatre scene in London was, they agree on reflection, vital to their development. Inhabitants of Leeds 6 may at last sit back and proudly claim some part of the shape of modern theatre.

The recent move to London was aided by a newly acquired and considerably larger grant from the Arts Council of Great Britain. The company are pleased with this, but far from being complacent they are actively combatting any chance of 'staleness' in their work; they have large plans for the future.



The grant will mean that they will be able to maintain their long-standing commitment to touring, and also be able to go further technically than they have done in the past. Anyone acquainted with Impact will know the individuality of their work, their definite style, and striking originality. This is largely due to the way they devise their

plays through improvisation, as the cast went on to outline.

Drawing from their own experiences, they transform their own 'psychological realities' into universal metaphors in order to communicate to the audience. Out of a five-week rehearsal schedule four weeks are spent in discussion, with only the final week spent visualising their ideas. The looseness of this approach means that a play may, if they are lucky, only come together on the first night, and continues to develop throughout a tour.



Part of the reason for their return to Leeds with their new show is due to the presence of a critically responsive and, they hope, sympathetic audience.

The essence of their work is myth. In drawing on their 'collective subconscience' they build surreal, timeless dream worlds which create resonances that they naturally do not control. They are quick to deny any ambiguity for the sake of it, but see its validity as the only way in which their work can be at the same time personal AND public.

The company are decidedly optimistic about the future. The Arts Council is keen for them to continue the element of collaboration with writers and composers, which has always been a strength of their work. A future production is planned in association with the author Russel Hoban. They also have a strong interest in film and see their work as particularly cinematic, but as yet this remains something of a pipe-dream.

With such definite plans for the future and their belief in their work, Impact are clearly going to maintain their high standards and reputation. If you missed 'Songs Of The Claypeople' in Leeds it is well worth trying to track them down during their tour of the north, or in October at the ICA in London.





Taylor Hackford must have felt pretty pleased with **himself when he** finished directed '.4n *Officer and* .4 *Gentleman'*. It was evidently a film of quality, establishing him as a stylish creator - which is all that it takes to be regarded as one of the better

And so he moved on to Against All Odds. Sad to say, he appears to have been sucked into the jaded end of the Hollywood production line.

Against All Odds is nothing in particular to get excited about. Another muscled but flawed hero (this one is Jeff Bridges), another wealthy, spoilt beauty (this one played, for want of a better word, by Rachel Ward), and the completion of another love triangle by another vulgar rich-quick boyfriend (with James Woods putting in another talented performance).

The story revolves around two plots. Firstly, Bridges the ex-footballer is sent by Woods the night club owner to find his girl (Rachel Ward), who has run off. Secondly, Bridges the ex-footballer investigates the business dealings of those involved in his old team management. The whole story would not look out of place as a pilot film for a TV series, even down to the crass sound effects used to create tension.

However, Hackford's direction gives the movie a visual style and swift pace, making

the worn-out story a lot more tolerable. Although what happens isn't really all that novel, the way that it is shown to happen lets the story scrape into the 'interesting' category rather than the merely 'run of the mill'

Unfortunately, by far the most memorable thing about the film is the lame-brained performance of Rachel Ward. Miss Ward can act about as well as she can mine coal. Each appearance is accompanied by a stick-on smile which she uses to convey every emotion. If she is upset, she shows only the top teeth. If she is happy. she flashes the full set. If frightened, the enormity of her terror **is** registered by separating the upper and lower jaws. Sexual pleasure is obviated by the biggest grin of them all (with her eyes shut). If you could separate the mouth from the rest of her, you'd have one hell of a performance! As it stands, she wins my award for the actress most likely to be replaced by a cardboard box, and also receives the John Cleese award for the most unusual walk this year - for her amazing impression of someone with two broken legs and an addiction to Ex-Lax.

I really would like to recommend Against All Odds, because I think that the director is worth the trouble, I'll settle, though, with pushing the boat out in your direction, in the hope that it doesn't sink under Miss Ward's leaden weight.

This is apparently at the top of a huge tower over a defunct city and is inhabited and staffed only by Mr. and Mrs. Fox (Steve Shill and Niki Johnson). Hardly communicating and frightened of each other (and of themselves), they meet only at the changes of shift,

Emotionally crippled, Mr. Fox fantasises about tormenting others: humiliating an old lady in a wheelchair, or bombing a whimpering potted plant with a paper aeroplane (yes, the effect **is** funny, also pathetic and disturbing).

Somehow their world has lost the capacity for empathy and sexuality.

This initial exposition takes maybe twenty minutes and rascinates. a twisted, unpredictable comedy of manners. Then a real guest arrives, a sensual, and for Mr. and Mrs. Fox highly disturbing, young woman (Heather Ackroyd). Their distress increases under the erotic influence of this enigmatic figure, heightened by the use of effects and a powerful synth soundtrack, producing a succession of startling images, such as the visitor standing serene in a white shirt by an open window as light and wind flood in. Eventually the pair 'crack' and (re) discover sexuality and tenderness, so becoming a real couple and symbolically a family; bird-song replaces the harsh grating in a morning of regeneration after a very

long and nasty night before. It is the story of the Fall. turned on its head. A 'serpent' (often represented in Medieval icons as a woman) enters a sterile and neurotic Eden and 'tempts' Eve, and thus Adam, with human feeling and warmth_ Another ancient myth of fertility is echoed: the healing of a crippled king and his barren realm, which was used by T. S. Elliot; in Impact's Waste Land the healing rain does eventually fall and a new beginning is possible.

Stylistically the main influence is 'Erazerhead': the shadowy, decaying '50s interiors, the 'industrial nightmare' noises, the (initial) horror of sex. But 'Songs of the Claypeople', while less enigmatic, engages a wider range of emotions. See Impact if you possibly can.



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
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
