MEDICS are facing the collapse of their training schemes because of selfish university hospital bosses, it is claimed this week.

Essential on-the-job training is being jeopardised as Leeds University hospitals battle each other for clinical prestige and government cash, according to an unpublished report leaked to Leeds Student.

Divisive "us and them" attitudes mean teaching sessions are being cancelled and lectures disrupted by insults and jibes aimed at rival university hospitals.

A NEW draff report on higher cducation has recommended scrapping the present student grant and loan system, writes jonathian Lamdmain.
It says some students should be charged top-up rees' for going to elite institutions
The paper from the Conservative National Policy Group on Higher Education reports that the prexent system is "highly inefficient" and
should be replaced by a private sector repayate foan from banks and building societics.
Students would repay the loans through income tax or
ontributions over a 20 year period.
This would replace the present system of income based payment, which has been criticised for leaving students with high eharges soon after graduation.
The report says that the state should still fund tuition but some expensive research based universities may need to charge 'top-up fees.

Leeds University students living in Henry Price flats have been subjected to regular bursts of the fire siren since they moved in three weeks ago.

The past week has seen eight fire alarms - three of them during the night.

And now they are asking university officials why the problem has not been solved.

At the time the university promised clean up its act and stressed at commitment to promoting disabled righs. But if we add this latest case LMU's disabled policy seems to amount to a catalogue of mistakes. cmors and buck-passing
Of course, no one thinks LMU chiefs are purposely discriminating agumst disabled students. But until the university rethinks its attitude disabled students will continue
second-class citizens.

A UNIVERSITY disciplinary hearing this week has dismissed claims that three freshers were caught in possesion of illegal drugs.

read will never be forgotten. The novel is split into three sections. The first is a nostalgic tale of childhood friendships in the style of Stand By Me. the second a shocking account of the terror of prison life and the third and final part asks us to sit as judge and juror in a courtroom drama, one wrought with controversy and some very unusual proceedings. Larenzo Carcaterra was one of a group of four boys who grew up in the '60s in Hell's Kitchen, a mafiarun district on the West Side of New York. Exposed to poverty, domestic violence and organised crime from an early age the boys found security in a friendship that cushioned them from the harsh realities of the streets they lived on. Despite the trials they faced every day the four had managed to steer clear of trouble managed the day that a seemingly untir the day that a seemingly
harmless prank went disastrously harmiess prank went disastrously wrong, and a man was nearly killed.
What happened next was to change their lives forever.

Carcaterra and his friends were sent away to Wilkinson, a boys reformatory school in upstate New York. Here they were subjected to a year of beatings, torture, and rape at the hands of four violent guards. Throughout this living hell only their undying loyalty to one another
kept them alive. They survived the abuse, but left with emotional scars that would never heal and physical problems that would plague them for the rest of their lives.

John and Tommy became hardened to the world. Nobody would come close again. They drifted into drugs and crime, eventually founding a notoriously brutal gang, the West Side Boys. Michael left the neighbourhood, went to a good school, studied law and became a prosecutor with the District Attorney's olfice.
Carcaterra himself found a job o the New York Daily News. What remained common to all four was a bond that ran deeper than blood and an over whelming desire for revenge. One night, sitting at the bar of a downtown Irish pub, John recognised one of his former captors amongst the diners. Calmly, John and Tommy walked toward the guard, confronted him and emptied guard, contronted him and compt a round of bulfets into his body.
Once the two gang-members were Once the two gang-members were
arrested, an opportunity arose for both the D.A.'s assistant and the journalist to work the system and play their part in a remarkable quest for revenge and truth. Sometimes toaching, sometimes shocking, always gripping: this is a

powerful and compelling story told with the honesty and strength necessary to face the nightmares of lives left shattered by the evil which grips the hearts of men.

The book is dedicated to 'sleepers every where. to those who didn't make it, who died in body and spirit, whether within the walls of Wilkimson or only much later. But most of all, he pays tribute to his fricads, united by a bond which even Wikinson

How, in spite of everything? saying in Hell's Kitchen," he grins. Perhaps Mr Scott was employed by the American authorities to justify their military spending and maintenance of a nuclear deterrent, and this film could be seen as an exercise in propaganda. But, fortunately, it's all a bit more complicated than that, and Tony Scott is far too talented to be wasting his time on jingoism.

Yes, the Russians are the enemy, or at least a rebel group led by a right-wing Zhirinovsky figure are, and a post Cold War world is portrayed as being on the verge of nuclear destruction that can only be averted through American endeavour. But the focus of
Crimson Tide is on the specific level of a
crisis taking place in an American nuclear submarine, itself presented as a microcosm of events occurring simultaneously during
the all-threatening Russian rebeltion. At the root of this crisis, which places the fate of the world in the hands of a fow military officers, is the personal rivalry between Captain Ramsay (Gene Hackman) and his Executive Officer. Hunter (Denzel Washington). Ramsay is a grizaled war veteran - simple, aggressive and determined te launch a nuclear strike on Russia. Humer is his foil - educated, intelligent and subtle, but he doubts the rationality of the order to strike. and stands in Ramsay's way. Then the shit hits the fan.

The rivalry is presented flawlessly, thanks to outstanding performances by Hackman and Washington and to some pretty impressive seripting. At first, it's fust suggested, bubbling under the surface as Ramsay and Hunter go through the motions of pretending they get on. But, as the situation heats up, so do their tempers and it soon reaches a point where you justexpect the two of them to slap their dick. on the table and see who's is biggest.

The Royal National Theatre's version of John O'Keeffe's Wild Oats exploded into life last week at the Bradford Alhambra providing an evening of rumbustious comedy. The Vampire Lovers(18) Countess Dracula Hyde Park Picture House Stars: Ingrid Pitt

Lesbian vampirism, misty graveyards and decapitation - the perfect ingredients for a celebration of Hammer Horror and its mo famous female lead, Ingrid Pitt, star of both the evening's films and present at this special double bill screening.

The Vampine Lovers, our firs taste of gore, proved itself a Hammer classic. The plot-ulmostas flimsy as most of Pitt's clothes - follows feisty lesbian vampire Marcilla and her efforts to seduce as many young females as she can get her fangs on. Naturally, the noble fathers of her victims, George Cole and a suitably grim Peter Cushing, are none too impressed and proceed to lure Marcilla to her grive in order to drive the obligatory stake through her heart (and decapitate her just for good measure),

Before this grisly end, however, much hilarity is to be had from the high proportion of heaving bosoms, semi-naked romping and less than sophisticated "specia effects," Nevertheless Pitt's performance, a spirited blend of seduction and campness, admimably compensates for the film's lack of style and the hamming of her co-stars, particularly the nauseating Madeleine Smith as Marcilla's dewy-eyed prey Undoubtedly Hammer at its low budget best.

Countess Dracula, on the other hand, was truly shocking essentially because it resembled a real film. The air of amateur theatre was replaced with noticeably less humour and some sound performances. Here Pitt plays a widowed Countess whose passport to eternal youth involves regular bathing in the blood of sacrificed virgins. Posing as her young daughter, Ilona retumed from boarding school, she seduces a young man, to the disapproval of her older lover. The nvalry between the two men, well played by Nigel Green and Sandor Eles, exposes the truth, and young Imre (Eles) meets his death in saving the real Ilona from her mother's next bath

Far-fetched though the plot is, the performances are more polished than those of The Vampire Lovers. The scenery and direction too are much less false. Still a few laughs, in the shape of lusty tavem whores and a ludicrous old historian straight out of Monty Python, but adicrous old histonan stagha is a glimpse of a lesser known quality side to Hammer Horror. This double bill himed at what Hammer might have been if it had only ard the chance to develop the vampish talents of Ingrid Piti.

## Ever wanted to live on a different planet, but were worried about the lack of atmosphere? DAVID ADAM investigates a possible solution <br> jodecmars

Scientists sometimes get accused of trying to play Ged. Doctors, geneticists and physicists all have toyed with principles many believe should remain the exclusive property of the almighty.
However, rarely can the term have fitted as comfortably as it does on the shoulders of a handful of space fanatics, aeronautical engineers and planetary scientists from NASA They are terraformers, and their goat is to create a world
More accurately they wish to change one world into another, a remote and inhospitable planet into as second planet earth. We are not talking mere
colonisation here, this involves a total change of the climate and environmen of the planet, to those found on earth, and is likely to take hundreds of
thousands of years
This is not a new idea, science fietion arriters have speculated about the idea of such global metantiopthosis tor years. However, a recent conference has moved thic concept from the realms of pure fictio ealhering of the best people in the field will discuss and plan the terraformation of Mars

It may appear easy to dismiss the idea ath pure famtisy but money ralks and NASA currently considering investimg millions the project.

Currently Mars is not a mice place to live but you probably knew that already. There i no atmosplere, no oxygen and the temperature is a rather bracing-60 C. Wind of up to 150 mph ravage the surface, currying with them a constant bombardment of airborne dust. Step outside without a pressmised suit, the air is so thin that your blood would boil.
It was not always so hostile, three billion years ago the planet had conditions similar to those that enabled the formation of life on earth. Photographs of the present martian surface show a series of dried riverbeds.

been above freezing point at some point in the planet's history. As water camnot form at very low pressures, it also indicates that the atmosphere was somewhat thicker than at present. ## Leeds goes to the heart of the matter

A MAIOR new project is under way at Leeds University to develop a new computer model of the retivity of the heart.

Computers already emble scientisis to study how organs in the body work, but the beating heart will be the first organ to be engineered in detail within virtual reality: Building on previous work, researchers in the Departument of Physiology have heen awarded over $£ 100,000$ by the Wellcome Trust to carry out the new studies.

The construction of such an interactive model will help Doctors to leam more about how such amhythmas develop and how best they can be treated in patients
