## Housemates compensated after court triumph

THREE HOUSEMATES successfully defended themselves after their estate agents took them to court for more than £1,500 in rent arrears.

The trio claimed that property agents Donnelly Estates had failed to provide them with suitable living conditions for eight months of a twelve month

And after a battle lasting more than 18 months, a judge at Leeds County Court granted them £200 each in compensation. Debts of more than £500 per person in unpaid rent were also written off.

Rob Hughes and Ammo Kambo, both graduates from Leeds University and finalist Ben Roberts, had complained about the state of their house on Royal Park Road almost as soon as they moved in during July 1997.

The previous tenants had abandoned the kitchen two months before they left, leaving rotting food for us to find when we moved in," claimed Rob. "There was even battery acid on the carpet by the front door.'

Their tenancy agreement included six main concessions which had to be met by the landlord before the house was satisfactory. These included the fitting of adequate kitchen facilities, a shower

## Douglas left on shelf after red tape row

A LEGAL loophole has left a Leeds University second year with no financial support after he was sacked from his library job for taking temporary leave from

his studies.

Douglas Paulley, who is now considering legal action against the university, worked at the Edward Boyle Library before being dismissed due to his nonstudent status.

But when he attempted to claim benefits from the DSS to support himself, Douglas was told he was ineligible because in legal terms his status was still

that of a student.

This has left him without a regular wage or the chance to claim extra benefits to help make ends meet.
The disgruntled worker said:

"I am £4,000 in debt and I have no income at all. I think it is unfair that I have been sacked over a technicality."
And the Geophysics student

conducted a silent protest in the Brotherton Library last week to draw attention to his plight. He explained: "I sat in the library's general office and refused to move until I was dealt with. The Dean of Students spoke to me and explained that I was legally not a student and that therefore I should be able to claim income support."
However, a spokesperson for

the Leeds University student office explained that this is not how the DSS view the situation:

"A temporary leaver is someone who leaves with a view to return usually within a year

But technically a temporary leaver is not registered and therefore cannot be considered a student

by the university.

"Having said that, it is important to take note that this is a grey area with regards to the government and the welfare department at the university are currently drafting a report into

the status of temporary leavers."

Douglas added: "Legally it seems the DSS were right to refuse me benefits and in the meantime the university have given me a £100 hardship grant to tide me over for a while. But, I'm disgusted at the fact that this hole in the benefit system exists because I'm being told one thing by the university and another by Welfare. I'm just left hanging at

A spokesperson for the university said: "We're very sympathetic to Douglas's situation students who have been in a similar position. But as far as the university are concerned, a temporary leaver is no longer a student. The problem arises because DSS doesn't consider

He added: "In the past, people who have been in a similar position have been through tribunals to solve their cases and I think it is important that this is investigated into by all institutions concerned.'

Douglas is considering challenging the university's decision to sack him on the grounds of unfair dismissal.

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

SPORTS bosses are under fire this week over the poor state of pitches at Bodington Hall even though students now need a sports users card to use them.

The Leeds University sports pitches suffer from drainage problems, unlevel surfaces and are also not equipped to deal with rain and snow. They are now also under threat with the university considering offers for

And these problems severely affect inter-mural teams which regularly use the grounds and according to one unnamed source are only suitable for 'sheep to graze on.' David Evans, the Head Groundsman, said: "The pitches at Bodington are little more than agricultural load." The scientific services when the said of the sa land. They simply aren't prepared to tolerate sports on anyway and no amount of week to week maintenance

would change that."

Many of the footballers who play for inter-mural teams are angry at the conditions of the pitches now that the university has decided to impose the need for

that the university has decided to impose the need for sports user membership.

But Dave Boreham, LUU Sports Officer, feels this is a small price to pay for the use of the facilities. He commented: "For £25 you get hugely discounted rates for the use of grass pitches and artificial pitches at Weetwood."

However, the Weetwood pitches are used mainly by the university teams and are classed as 'developed pitches,' receiving proper funding for the maintenance work needed. However many footballers are questionning whether any of the £25 sports membership fee they are paying is going towards the grounds at Bodington.

Gawain Moore, the Director of Law Society Sports

said: "The pitches at Bodington are in a terrible state.
"They don't appear to receive any maintenance, and this has the potential for leading to injuries."

A medics inter-mural player, Chris Foster, chipped a bone in his foot last season and said: "It is only a matter

of time before someone suffers a serious injury."

And Mark Molyneux, assistant manager for the Law
Society team, commented: "It's hard to have a proper game of football, when there's hardly any grass and the pitches are on a slope.

"The quagmire in the midfield makes it impossible to pass the ball along the floor and the puddles in front of the goals turn many of the games into a joke."

And until the inter-mural football leagues are moved to a new site and the teams receive proper facilities, the footballers will have to put up with the inadequate

## Double sex attack in broad daylight

### Same man suspected of female assaults close to campus

POLICE fear a sex attacker may strike again after two indecent female assaults in the middle of the day.

The first attack happened at 4.30pm last Tuesday as a 23year-old student was walking across wasteland off Woodhouse

A man walked past her but then turned back and carried out an indecent assault. The student was able to push him off and

make her getaway.

The next day, just before 1pm, an 18-year-old student was taking a short cut to university across a grassed area near North West Road, also off Woodhouse Street.

She was indecently assaulted after a man grabbed her from behind.

The descriptions of the The descriptions of the attackers and the similarity of the crimes have led the police to believe the assaults were carried out by the same man.

The first attacker was described as in his early 20s, of mixed race and about 5ft 6in.

He wore a striped shellsuit jacket and dark trousers and was slim with what looked like freckles across his nose.

And the second victim described her attacker as mixed race Afro-Caribbean with a pockmarked face

Latest crime figures for the Hyde Park and Burley area show nearly a 50 per cent decrease. Coupled with the safety and community initiatives being launched, residents no longer

have the unwanted label.

The area, recently called a 'Student Ghetto' in *The Times* University Guide, was reeling

from bad press and reputation. Many of the residents were frustrated at the level of crime and due to the large shifting population, found a lack of

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## Search is on for campus rapist

A FEMALE victim who was raped on Leeds University campus has this week pleaded to anyone who might have witnessed anything to come forward.

The woman was raped by a man next to the Physical Education building at 1am on December 12 after attending a party on campus. And police have now released a photo fit of the attacker in a bid to refresh the memories of

The victim was walking back from the Faversham pub when the man, who did not speak once during the incident, approached her in the Sports Hall car park. Pauline - not her real name - was confronted by the man who pointed

name - was confronted by the man who pointed in the direction of the Physical Education building and then forcibly led her there.

DI Shaun Tunstall from Millgarth CID explained: "The man approached the victim from the campus, so it is possible that he might have been seen by students.

"The woman was carrying her shoes at the time and might have been noticed. We would call on anyone who might have seen something to contact us with any information that they to contact us with any information that they think might be of use."

DI Tunstall also stressed that as they have forensic evidence, witnesses should not feel worried about identifying possible suspects as they can be eliminated from the enquiries through DNA tests. An incident room has been set up and extensive enquiries have been made, including checks on known sex offenders, since the rape. But police now hope that the renewed appeals will bring fresh leads.

Pauline is now trying to rebuild her life following the assault. "I've never actually known anyone who has been raped before. But what has happened has given me a lot of empathy with other people. I wouldn't wish it on my worst enemy, it's a horrible experience."

She is now determined for anyone who might have seen the incident to contact police. "This man will attack again. If someone has got a feeling they need to go with their instincts and come forward and speak to the detectives who

are working on the case."

The attacker has been described as being Afro-Carribean or of mixed race. He is between 5'6" and 5'10" and 20 to 30-years-old. He was also described as having medium length afro style hair at the time and has bushy eyebrows and thick him. and thick lips. ## On course for safer salads



TOP eggsperts at LMU have conducted shellbreaking research into the dangers of salmonella in mayonnaise.

The university's Food Research Group investigated the effects upon salmonella in mayonnaise using lemon juice instead of vinegar.

And the team discovered that the amount of salmonella increases as the ratio of egg yolk to citric acid decreases.

In other words, the more citric acid used, the lower the survival

time for salmonella.

The boffins' discoveries could prove vital in helping to lower instances of salmonella. Alan Edmonson, principal lecturer in LMU's School of Health Sciences, explained: "Home made mayonnaise is a perennial favourite but it has been associated with many outbreaks of food poisoning."

The team also discovered that storing mayonnaise containing

lemon juice at too low a temperature could protect any bacteria present.

However, storing it at too high a temperature could lead it to have a shorter shelf life due to mould.

And Alan Edmonson offered advice for the perfect salad:
"When using 20-35 ml of pure lemon juice per egg yolk, cooks should hold the mayonnaise at 22 degrees or above for at least 72 hours before consumption or refrigeration.

## Guineas pig out on test cash

CASH strapped students are being offered hundreds of pounds to take part in medical trials.

Big money rewards are available r the desperate few who give up their bodies to test previously untried

A Leeds University finalist, wishing to be known only as Dave, stayed in hospital for eleven days to test antibiotics and earned £800.

"I spent all of my loan in the first term and needed to pay my rent," he said. "I've got a dissertation to write and don't really have time for

"I know that loads of students have jobs and it's a pretty lame excuse but I really needed the money. My parents don't like it, but they

can't afford to help me." Companies like Leeds-based firm Covance recruit people and pay them to give up their time and bodies. They target students in need of extra cash.

A spokesperson for the company said: "The drugs we test range from mild painkillers such as paracetamol to heart disease drugs. The drugs aren't tested for their effectiveness, but the effect they have on the human

The Covance spokesperson stressed that side effects are rare but the mild symptoms include headaches, dizziness and fainting. "We haven't had any deaths in our 12 years," he added.

Typical cash rewards range from £280 for a two night stay to £815 for 15 nights. Clients are paid for the time they spend in the company's residential building just off campus, not for the mildness or severity of the drugs being tested.

Dave knows of other students who have taken similarly drastic measures to keep their heads above

He said: "I heard that you can have your little toe chopped off and sewn back on. But apparently you can lose your balance for life. Also you can have your heart stopped and restarted for £16,000.

"Having that done takes ten years

## House about that for a bit of self-defence

IT IS encouraging to be able to report this week that one group of disillusioned housemates have been brave enough to stand up for their rights and deservedly emerged victorious.

For too long we as students have automatically assumed that we have to passively put up with substandard levels of accomodation and maintenance all against a backdrop of ever increasing rents.

The fact is there remains a surplus of housing, if not always quality housing, across Headingley and Hyde Park and students should remember they are still the consumers in this most imbalanced of markets.

As explained in our *Community Special* a few weeks ago, there is no reason why as a collective body, we cannot force landlords and estate agents to realise that they cannot treat us as second-class tenants.

And the story of Rob Hughes, Ammo Kambo and Ben Roberts is proof of that. They were taken to court after collectively refusing to cough up because several undertakings they were given over installations had not been kept. Reason won the day. They were granted compensation, had their unpaid debts written off and they did it all without professional legal counsel.

This is not to say that all property owners and managers automatically prey on our insecurities and willingness to accept whatever we are given. Many landlords, especially those with just a few houses, do take care of their properties and their tenants, and we in return have a responsibility to treat them and their houses with respect.

But when there is something wrong, there is no greater crime than not saying so. Closet barristers we may not all be, but we *are* all capable of coherently standing up for our rights.

Tighter legislation, local council monitoring and our own welfare and housing bodies can only do so much. We will only get a better deal when we are seen to be able to stand up for ourselves when we have to.

## **Getting the most** out of rubbish

AFTER Harold Best's comments about students putting more back into their community, we finally have a simple way of doing it.

By creating more recycling points around the Hyde Park and Woodhouse areas, Green Action are encouraging students to become more aware of both their local surroundings and the wider environment around them.

Sheffield already has one of the best recycling schemes in the country, and Leeds is sadly lacking any formal project to rival it. But students are stepping in to fill the vacuum by doing it themselves.

There should be no shortage of rubbish to fill their boxes, if the empty bottles and tins lying around Hyde Park are anything to go by.

Even the diehard, materialistic, pizza-loving student will be able to help by just chucking the ultimate symbol of their consumer lifestyle into the nearest recycling bin.

## The real danger

## Welsh politics may not capture the imagination, but AMY WAREHAM has fears about centrally controlled politics



AST weekend's rugby wasn't the only closely fought battle to rally Welsh fervour ahead of St. David's day. Saturday's Welsh Labour leadership contest result, which effectively decided the Welsh 'Prime Minister', outraged Welsh people across the political spectrum because of the circumstances of Alun Michael's narrow 5 per cent victory over Rhodri Morgan.

Welsh Society President
Gareth Jones reflected disgruntled attitudes: "Blair was supported in Wales at the last election because of his devolution stance, but he's thoroughly disappointed the nation. New Labour have blatantly used undemocratic tactics to suppress the voice of the masses and place their puppet in Wales. It's a fix."


According to Plaid Cymru, the Welsh party: "New Labour has reverted to its bad old ways, insisting on keeping the reins of power in London. The Assembly is meant to allow Welsh people to take more decisions for themselves."

Whether or not you're prodevolution or a Labour supporter, New Labour's undemocratic tactics used in Wales should outrage and alarm us. Blair used Old Labour's fixing

Blair used Old Labour's fixing tactics to ensure that Michael beat the popular candidate Cardiff West MP Morgan, who he sees as a 'loose cannon'

Michael was propelled into the competition on succeeding Ron Davies as Welsh Secretary. Mair Hughes, a 3rd year Psychology student said: "Unlike Morgan, Michael didn't want the job, he's never been close to Welsh politics, and didn't even campaign for devolution." Despite this Blair was determined that Michael would get the post. He adopted an outdated Old Labour voting system which contradicted his one-memberone-vote ideals.

Voting was split into three equal sections, Labour party members, MPs, MEPs and Assembly candidates, and the unions. Of the 25,000 party members polled, 64 per cent voted for Morgan confirming his grassroots popularity.



Michael shouldn't celebrate gaining 58 per cent of the MPs, MEPs and Assembly candidates votes with a clear conscience. His 'victory' reflects the support of Labour's undemocratically chosen 'top-up list' candidates. Once again MPs and MEPs towed the party line rather than represent their constituents.

The greatest controversy lies

The greatest controversy lies in the union results which swung the votes toward Michael. Some unions, under pressure from Blair, cast block votes for Michael. Despite members'

one-member-one-vote ballot." For example 74 per cent of UNISON's 50,000 members. James Benson, a History

James Benson, a History finalist, expressed concern over phony Tony's tactics: "I don't care about Welsh politics, but democracy, well that's another issue. If I join a union after I graduate I expect them to represent me, not kow-tow to Blair."

Hypocritically Blair pressured the unions not to adopt the very system that made him Labour leader, and has tarnished New context and have therefore never got over Old Labour tactics. New Labour is a rhetorical flourish on top of traditional politics."

top of traditional politics."
At the same time as pushing devolution, Blair has been championing Lord's reform, proportional representation and an elected Mayor of London. At the last Labour Party Conference he announced: "This government is giving more power back to the people." This hasn't been the case for Wales, and doesn't look like it will be for the rest of the country.

Blair's undemocratic tendencies are also evident in Scotland where Labour has been vetting it's candidates for the Parliament. In London he is determined not to allow lefty Ken Livingstone run for Mayor. A recent White Paper on Lords reform said it's replacement would not be wholly elected. Meanwhile PR in the Commons has been discreetly shelved. The latest in this disturbing trend was the recent gagging order on the Sunday Telegraph over the leaked Stephen Lawrence report.

This trend for undemocratic

This trend for undemocratic controlled politics has been epitomised by the events in Wales. By using such tactics Blair has undermined the validity of New Labour, and indeed the faith people have in him. If he follows this path it will be fatal for his party.

complaints these unions, like the TGWU, GMB, AEEU, who made up one fifth of the total electorate, refused to ballot their members. A poll by the television programme *Dispatches* of members of TGWU found that only 182 wanted to vote for Michael whilst 471 supported Morgan.

Morgan's campaign manager Kevin Brennan said: "Block votes proved decisive. Rhodri won in every union who fully involved their members with a democratic Labour's commitment to democracy. Dafydd Wigley, Plaid Cymru's leader said: "In imposing his man on Wales by using discredited block votes, Blair has lost face as he has used something New Labour is meant to be against."

## Disco inferno: A club scene in crisis

ROM its eventful opening night in June 1998 to the blaze which tore it apart during the early hours of last Sunday morning, Leeds' Parklife nightclub has suffered a string of catastrophes unparalleled by any other venue in the history of the city's rapidly expanding club scene. Following the tragic events of last weekend, this special report examines the extraordinary run of bad luck which culminated in the closure of one of the North's brightest new night spots.

was killed on the premises by a freak ambient rhythm. The first year medic was relaxing in the chill-out room when the rogue vibe struck, leaving him mortally wounded and several other clubbers seriously out of time to the beat.

time to the beat.

A brief period of closure saw the venue thoroughly inspected and site manager Paul Yesburt cleared of charges of negligence, but the incident was merely the first in a series of disasters to hit Parklife over the ensuing months. "There were things I could have avoided," Yesburt admits.

Controversy has surrounded Parklife since it was first announced that the two empty houses in the middle of Brudenell Terrace were to be converted into "Hyde Park's freshest nightclub". Local residents and, in particular, the next-door neighbours whose properties adjoined the venue mounted a vehement campaign against its opening, but their protests fell on deaf ears. Leisure project developer Vance Peiterhaus, literally hard of hearing due to repeated overexposure to happy hardcore, remained adamant that his proposals would bring prosperity to one of the city's most run-down areas.

"I took two old student houses that didn't even meet Unipol's code of standards and turned them into the coolest party zone in Leeds. There was a lot of noise, I admit, but I always ensured it was mixed by the country's top DJs. What more did the locals want?"

The club's copping night

The club's opening night extravaganza, however, was tarnished by tragedy when a student of Leeds University "Such as the time the landlord took my keys away because my rent cheque bounced for the second time, but other things like the damp in the basement and the stairs falling through were simply out of my control."

HE previously quiet little street just off Cardigan Road was soon to be the centre of an outbreak of violence and crime. Emily Donovan was the first of eight female students to have their skulls splintered in separate assaults outside the venue. "It wasn't safe around there," she remembers. "I'd just popped out of the club to buy some fags before the offie on the corner closed when these men grabbed me and started kicking me. By the time the bouncers intervened, it was too late. My head had already cracked."

Witness to the attack Helen

Witness to the attack Helen Lennard took her concerns to the local authorities. "It got to a point where, every time I looked up from *The Bill*, I'd see girls having their skulls splintered right outside my window... well, I had to do

something. I got the council to send me a pack of blank video tapes for every episode that was interrupted, and they also sent me some new curtains."

The final twist to the lid of

The final twist to the lid of the Parklife crematorial urn came last weekend with a fire that reduced the building to rubble. Tragically, the flames spread to number 59, where six students asleep in their beds were incinerated. Landlady Shandy Backspin offered a tearful tribute to her tenants.

"My deepest sympathy goes out to their parents. I feel as if I've lost my own children. This terrible calamity has affected me so painfully, so... dramatically... almost like the final episode of some twisted docu-soap..."

docu-soap..."

Examination of the nightclub's black box provided no information regarding the origin of the blaze, and the staff of the Screamin' Hot Flamegrill Takeout which backs onto the property could offer no further clues. Parklife's resident DJ, 'DJ Rezident-Deejay', suggests that his kicking sets were perhaps too hot for the place to handle, while regular punters point out that that there was always a funny gas-like smell around the upstairs dancefloor airing cupboard, and all of the ceilings had highly flammable polystyrene tiles anyway.

Whatever the cause of

Whatever the cause of Parklife's fiery demise, it seems that the events of last Sunday were a fitting climax to a story symptomatic of a city's nightlife in crisis. Amidst a club scene searching in desperation for wilder attractions and a fresher image, Leeds' bright young things are increasingly turning to more extreme events like Majestyk's non-club night Booklovers, Nato's blood-soaked Thursday night massacre Smear, and Uropa's fortnightly Chunderfuck. While the ashes settle on Brudenell Terrace, it may be time to consider the question: has clubbing gone as far as it can in the nineties, or is the Internet now a more viable ontion?

HERE are certain subjects that are considered acceptable avenues for humour, and others which are considered to be taboo or politically incorrect. Robert
Benigni as the writer,
director and star of Life is
Beautiful has daringly
managed to transgress these
boundaries by making a successful comedy about the Holocaust. Benigni is renowned for his Chaplinesque approach to film, and has a reputation for tackling controversial issues, and Life is Beautiful is no

exception.

The first half of the film tells the story of Guildo (Benigni) a young Italian who moves to the Tuscan town of Arezzo to live with his lewish uncle

There Guildo meets the woman of his dreams, whom he calls La Principessa (the princess), and whose fiancée happens to be a local fascist official. Employing his goofy charm to the full, and after several hilarious mishaps, Guildo eventually manages to win her heart.

Things take a turn for the worse when Guildo's upple hears and the several hilds.

when Guildo's uncle becomes the when Gando's aricle becomes target for the anti-semitic graffiti, which is soon followed by his uncle's bookshop being labelled the "Jewish

Guildo continues to see the funny side of things. When his son, Joshua who is five, asks why Jews are not allowed into the pastry shop, Guildo explains that shop owners make the rules and can exclude anyone they

Thus he proposes that they will right a sign saying, "No spiders and No Visigoths allowed." From here on Guildo employs humour as a coping mechanism to help him and his boy deal with the spectra of Nazi hatred.

When Guildo and his son are sent to a concentration camp, he reinvents their situation for the sake of the boy into a game- the winner of which gets to take home a real

When on their arrival a German soldier sprouts death threats, soldier sprouts death threats,
Guildo pretends to understand
German, and tells his boy they are
being instructed on the rules of the
game: "There are three cases in
which you lose all your points," he
says. "One: Those who cry. Two:
Those who want to see their
mamma. Three: Those who are
hungry and want some snack. Forget
about it"

about it"
While this may appear a cheap way to generate a few laughs, it successfully helps them both negotiate a terrifying situation.
Benigni has come under serious criticism for this film. Time magazine labelled it a "Fascist Fable" arguing that it didn't reflect the "brutal reality" that the majority of Jews reality" that the majority of lews

Furthermore the whole notion that individuals might have the strength of character to maintain a composure in the face of such totalitarianism is described as both absurd, as well as being abhorrent in that it turns horror into feel-good entertainment'

Similarly Le Monde described Benigni as a "Fascist Negationist". Philip French of the Guardian criticised Benigni for creating a "sentimental fantasy" that leaves a

'dispiriting ring''.

Benigni was inspired to make the Bengal was inspired to make the film after his father, who joked about his experiences when he returned from a Nazi Labour camp. Originally this was to protect his children, but Benigni also felt that it helped liberate himself from his own nightmass. nightmares.

when shown as part of the annual Jerusalem Festival, the film was voted "Best Jewish Experience Award" providing a interesting rebuttal to the critics.

Critics are right to say that the film doesn't provide a true insight into the real horror of the Holocaust. But Benigni never professed that it did.

XPECTING such a criticism Benigm includes a disclaimer at the beginning of the credits clearly stating that the film is a "fable"

In truth it is not wholly misguided to think that you could ever make a film that really understood and accounted for the true horror of the Holocaust (it is worth remembering that when Schindler's List was first read to was criticised for its positive ending).

But let's not attack Benigni for highlighting the potential of human beings to find "some" comfort and dignity in the face of such adversity through humour.

Powerfully disturbing

Vladimir Nabokov's notorious story of corrupted childhood as pornography. Adrian Lyne's new adaptation attempts to concentrate on the tragedy of the situation rather than the graphic nature of the relationship between 13-yearold schoolgirl and middle-aged stepfather. It almost succeeds.

It is impossible, however, to completely avoid voyeuristic shots of Lolita from the very beginning when Humbert (Jeremy Irons) first sees her lying in the garden underneath a sprinkler. The camera lingers on her dewy limbs and flawless skin. It is disturbing to be made to vious a disturbing to be made to view a young girl in such a sexual way. Similarly, when Lolita is sitting on Humbert's knee reading a comic and giggling, it is only when you notice the expression on Humbert's face

the expression on Humbert's face and the rocking chair that you realise they are having sex.
Watching scenes like this makes you feel like you did when your parents were watching a couple going at it on the TV over your shoulder, except that now it is your



conscience making you feel

OMINIQUE Swain portrays
Lolita's alluring combination of
naivety and precocity brilliantly
but publicists took great pains at the
time of the film's release to point
out that an adult body-double was

used in all the sex scenes.

From the outset it is clear that Humbert and Lolita's relationship will have damaging consequences. It is, in Humbert's words, 'a paradise

whose sky was lined with hellfire.' As Lolita becomes increasingly devious and Humbert more desperate and paranoid, their relationship degenerates even more with Lolita exchanging sexual favours for extra pocket money and privileges. However, despite his loathsome

actions, it is difficult not to feel some sympathy with Humbert. He does have a genuine love for Lolita, although an oppressively possessive one and would probably not be placed in the same odious category as sinister child pornographer, Quilty

as sinister child pornographer, Quilty who follows the pair across America and eventually takes Lolita away from Humbert.

In the end, Humbert must accept the moral culpability for the tragic consequences. The savage revenge he reeks on Quilty cannot make up for his lustful actions which, whether tinged with love or not, are responsible for taking away Lolita's responsible for taking away Lolita's youth and innocence and ultimately

INCE Daft Punk got down to doing their Homework in 1997 a chilling blast of fresh Air has been blowing in from across the channel, and with Cassius claiming 1999 for their own you'd be forgiven for feeling that the future belonged to our French neighbours.

Beaucoup Fish, however, Underworld's third full length offering, looks set to redress this imbalance. Their 1993 debut Dubnobasswithmyheadman was as

defining a moment for the nineties as The Stones Roses debut was for the tail end of the eighties, not so much blurring


boundaries between guitar and dance music as smashing them to pieces.

Beaucoup Fish sees Karl Hyde's characteristic inane ramblings continually expounded and distorted. To such an expounded and distorted to Such air extent, in fact, that on 'Jumbo', over an electro-disco backing, he doesn't sound entirely dissimilar to a certain Richard Fairbrass of Right Said Fred. Surprisingly enough, this is not a bad thing.

'Shudder/King of Snake' speeds things up, bringing together Detroit and Chicago's legacies in a whirlwind of innovation and pristine production. Not surprisingly, the promo copies have

been kicking up a storm in clubs since they first emerged.



Problems only start to creep in when, on 'Bruce Lee', they take a sloppy stab at further diversity through break beat drums and monotonous sleazing vocals. 

Lynch on ed. CHRIS RODLEY Lynch Faber & Faber £9.99

US great surrealist in question and answer mode

AVID Lynch is one of America's great directors. A man whose skewered ideas of sexuality and vision of the childhood realm of the intrinsically American neighbourhood have shocked and fascinated audiences for over 20 years. In this, film documentrist Rodley teases some intriguing responses out of the

The success of a book like this relies The success of a book like this relies wholly on the questions asked and the answers given. Thankfully that is never in doubt. Whether talking about his photography and paintings, or the trials and tribulations of filming Eraserhead (a five year gestation period), Lynch is never anything but entertaining.

His actual conversational style is

His actual conversational style is enjoyable as well. He comes across as some sort of 50s pre-teen, delivering his musings in a cutsey 'aw-shucks' argot, which belies his supreme intelligence, but helps you comprehend his ability for writing dialogue for small-town high-schoolers.



More importantly though, Lynch on Lynch just about succeeds as a piece on its own, due to the musings on various abstract themes. His ideas on film interpretation - that they are a purely abstract creations - are very interesting in themselves, even when his own work is removed from the equation. Never once does he give his own personal interpretation of his films: he states that any other interpretation is just as valid as his own, in a post-structuralist kinda way.

Themes such as the inverting of the idealised relationship, such as the sadomasochistic one between Dennis Hopper and Isabella Rossellini in *Blue* Velvet are discussed. Lynch's ideas on these subjects are near the knuckle, but in a sense they are so provocative that it forces you to analyse your own responses to his images. His idea that there is always a downside to things is also intriguing, especially in the way that



he depicts the small-town neighbourhood. Accepted as being a safe, innocent place, Lynch shows off the insecurities and resentments in an unflinching and stark way, especially in Blue Velvet and Twin Peaks

There are not many deeply revealing questions, and whether you like the book depends on whether you like Lynch. But as a treatise about film theory and the as a treatse about infinitely and the abstract notions of human emotion, the book is very interesting indeed. But it also works as the story of a film school grad who went from making films for installation pieces in the 1960s to the cognoscent's darling at the end of the '80s with Wild at Heart with Wild At Heart.

In effect Lynch achieved the American dream - becoming successful off his own back. But what he produced to do this would kill moralists

on can tell you a lot without quite giving the game away. And once the first story has made you feel thoroughly sick and uneasy, there's little chance that knowing what to expect will he a problem.





Gay Dad have more range and more verve than we have bargained for. 'Dim Star' is a jagged, glittering offering, while bluesy 'Oh Jim' stretches Cliff's voice beyond his more usual hollering into expressive territory. 'My Friends and I' seems to territory. 'My Friends and I' seems to galvanise proceedings into a guitar frenzy interrupted by duller 'Desire' but at this point Cliff climbs up onto the speakers and begins to taunt the hard core of moshers. Eventually he leaps down into the fray and is lightly mauled, which he seems to relish. No-one is spitting, though.

OREOVER, 'To Earth..' is performed with a cascade of style and vigour, to everyone's apparent delight. It is their 'Come Up and See Me'; we are not

I am being an old bitch, of course (not a 'cynic', take note. Cynicism and sarcasm are not the same thing. I am predisposed to cynicism, but that is another kettle of fish. And enemas.) When I asked Bernard Butler about what he thought of the Manics' image, I received the curt reply that "I don't see fucking dresses when I listen to their records." The proof of the pudding is not in the hairstyle. Neither is it in the quality of Cliff's witty epithets and selfcontradictions.

No, we have to wait until the gig, which, as it turns out, is a revelatory experience. Watching 'One Lady Owner' lurch through their dirgey odes to Frank Butcher's car-lot is a bit like watching a holiday bus sliding around in an oil slick in a 70's Carry On film. Aw, so *British*. We smile

disappointed. Melancholic 'A disappointed. Melancholic 'A
Different Kind of Blue' closes the
show. I leave hastily to avoid being
bludgeoned to death by the flailing
chains of elephantine skaters, newly
arrived for the 'Garage' club night.
I could at this point criticise Cliff
for his 'glam' attire, given his
aspirations. But toots, his Kiss te

shirt, some glitter in the hair, dark denims. How glamorous. (Actually, Bewitched wear dark denims, don't they? I take it back, Cliff).

But that would be churlish and irrelevant, given the coup they pulled off tonight. I refer to their second performance, not Cliff and Baz's first. In the words of a cynic, you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear.

But you can spin a yarn out of thin air, especially if you're a former music



## Playing the name game



BACK in the days of good old rock and roll, when your ma was twisting with your pa, bands were named after their star members. Cliff Richard had his Shadows, Gerry had his Pacemakers, and everyone knew where they stood. The Silver Beetles backed other star performers til they became a band in their own right and realised the amazing punnage on the current Mersey Beat scene that could be acheived by forming The Beatles.

This set the precedent for the rest of the sixties, as The Animals, The Byrds and The Doors followed the formula, along with a whole host of Northern Soul girl bands such as The Crystals, The Ronettes, and Diana Ross and the Supremes.

The Small Faces built their name on the idea that they were all short and

the idea that they were all short and mods ('faces'). Prog rock saw some crazy drug-induced mistakes of names: Iron Butterfly, Tangerine Dream, and King

Crimson were all living out their

hallucinogenic dreams.
Punk saw the first major outbreak of risque names: the Sex Pistols, of course, but also The Slits, The Vibrators, and The Buzzcocks. Heavy Metal later developed its own mythology of destruction, with names to match: Napalm Death, Iron Maiden, Megadeth, Anthrax and Cannibal

Nirvana took rock names to the opposite extreme, and Pearl Jam cosily named themselves after one member's gran and her preserves. The nineties have seen an overload of one-word names (for films as well as music), like Blur, Oasis, Ride and Moose, turning band names into brand names.

This has resulted in some fantastically blunt names: Fuck, Wank, Tampasm. It's a new era of rudeness, and now Gay Dad have topped it off with a concept name, a shocking social comment in just two words.

## Faker makers

### Ratings pressures mean we can't trust what we see, says JONATHAN

HE girl who managed to successfully hoax the Channel 4 documentary, Daddy's Girl last year (subsequently pulled from the schedules) attempted to evade culpability by claiming that 'nothing we see on TV is real

Those words have come back to haunt television producers in recent weeks as allegations of wholesale malpractice and deceit have enveloped all ends of the television market - from award winning documentaries to the brash and glossy Vanessa and Trisha talk

Of course when you are watching a typical late night offering of Jerry Springer

rival ITV programme, *Trisha*, suggests a similar story happening here. It has emerged that four separate items on the *Vanessa* show have featured bogus guests since its launch. For instance a pair of feuding sisters who featured on the programme were revealed to be strippers who had never met, represented by the Café Absolute Entertainment agency. Another actress, Angelina Chandler who appeared on the show as a woman beaten by her husband, has never married.

Both the accidental and deliberate

hoaxes result from the fact that these shows, often discussing highly sensitive issues, were not taken seriously. What

showing a bisexual man attacking his transsexual girlfriend for sleeping with his mother, it is hard not to question whether these bizarre situations and people could ever be real. Very often of course they are not.

The need for ratings, the thirst for human bombs exploding and zoo television which drives the mentality of talk shows such as Jerry Springer, and the less accomplished British imitations such as Vanessa, are powerful incentives for dishonesty. More and more guests have come out in the US admitting they've been coached to go on these shows, told to brawl to reach the target audience which is supposed to appreciate a spectacle

The revelations against the Vanessa

posed as current affairs was regarded as an easy way to make money. While the BBC talks about improving procedures arguing that 'audiences must be able to believe in the integrity of programmes'

can we trust them any longer?
While television formats such as the Vanessa show invite trash tactics, mendacious portrayals are not confined to glitzy confessional talk shows. Even beloved old Countdown was found out last week over the use of backstage help on dictionary corner. Potentially more seriously, last month Channel 4 suffered again when it admitted that a hardhitting documentary aired in 1997, Too much Too Young: Chickens contained scenes where film-makers posed as clients picking up rent boys. This

followed the damaging revelation that ITV's award-winning drugs documentary, The Connection was faked, which resulted in a £2 million fine slapped on Carlton This latest development of dishonesty seeping into mainstream documentaries threatens to bring all factual programmes into disrepute. Needless to say there are many ethical and responsible producers still around, but for others the cynical purpose of making a powerful film overrides any higher purpose of conveying truth and reality.

The implications for television's credibility are certainly worrying, and

far-reaching. In trying to portray realism

in all its forms through television, there in all its forms through television, there is always scope for deception somewhere along the line. As television attempts to set higher and higher standards, and as there are now more and more people willing to do anything to get onto TV (as the *lbiza Uncovered* series suggests) there should now be more striptered to a suggest of the should now be more striptered to suggest the striptered to the suggest of the suggest of the should not be more striptered to suggest of the suggest more stringent safeguards imposed on programme makers to ensure that shows which deal with contentious issues, or aim to show a slice of life, do so with the honesty and integrity we expect of them. Television has a trusted and serious role to play in our society. It should start living up to it.







If you are a keen hiker there are several hard walks in the area, but since I was searching for relaxation a pleasant ramble was more what I had in mind.



There are several different forms of yoga, although they are all based around the same philosophy of inner and outer balance attained through certain physical and mental exercises. Hatha and Iyengar yoga are two of the most popular forms, and both are taught in Leeds. To get the full benefit of yoga, you do need to practise it regularly, or attend a day long course, but these are not frequent events in Leeds so we went to a Hatha class at the United Reform Church in Headingley.

Having been teased about twisting his body into abnormal positions, yoga virgin Matt Genever was nervous as he

approached his first class.
"I didn't know what to
expect at all," he said. "I was
definitely worried, but I was

really keen on giving it a go.'
At £2 a class, it's a fairly cheap form of exercise, but the benefits depend on how much you put in and on the teacher. The atmosphere he or she

creates is crucial.

"We started with these warm-up exercises," explains Matt. "My legs were shaking so much I didn't think I'd be able to make it. But then I noticed that no-one else could get their noses to touch the floor, or hold their feet in the air for hours on end.

The class was not as relaxing as it could have been, as there was a tendency to talk in between postures, which broke up the calm created by the

FTER warrior pose, frog pose, a quick dog pose and a couple of adaptations thrown in for good measure, the class finished with ten minutes of concentrated relaxation. Beginning in pairs, each person moved as close as possible to the other, and then at up straight against the other. The idea is to share the heat created by the last hour's work. It's certainly comfortable, and as the lights were switched off it was easy to sink into a very relaxed state.

Breathing became shallow,

They eat their chips with mayonnaise, strange but delicious; there are no signposts and a journey on the underground tram system

Not every eccentricity is a fault of their own. One Belgian gastronomic speciality is *Pain à la grecque*, a sort of bread stuffed with meat and vegetables which bizarrely has nothing to do with Greece at all. The name is in fact a mixture of the French pain du fossé and the Flemish Bruut van der Grecht, due not to Belgian stupidity but to the inability of French soldiers to pronounce either of the two.

The *Atonium*, besides supplying spherical conference rooms for European businessmen, has provided plenty of inspiration for the vast quantity of cartoons produced in Belgium. Scores of cartoonists set their adventures here with Tintin and the Smurfs amongst those running around the enormous metal balls. Apart from providing every French comedian with a wealth of material, Brussels has another identity - as home of the European

has another identity - as home of the European Union. The strangest thing about this is that for a city which for many symbolises Europe, it's surprisingly inaccessible for anyone who doesn't speak either French or Flemish. Even the museums have their information displayed only in a mixture of the two, preventing any foreigner who may be multilingual but just doesn't happen to speak French from taking full advantage. Ironic that the city at the centre of Europe is perhaps the least European of all.

# Raleigh to the voluntary cause

Many students want to travel abroad before embarking on a career. TRISTAN RUTHERFORD investigates voluntary work

ANCY scuba-diving the Tanzanian coast for a conservation project, or trekking through untouched Mongolia where Yaks are the main source of entertainment; for free? An increasing number of people choose to work for a voluntary organisation as a great way to see the world, do something

constructive and have a good time. The organisations involved offer security for the first-time traveller and a good way to make friends. There is also the opportunity to mess around in the region when the expedition finishes. The fact that many projects take you to an untouched part of the globe like Patagonia or Kazahkstan is of great appeal to some. Businesses look highly on people who have been on a trip as it proves initiative, teamskills and an ability to get along with people. Most expeditions last for around the property of the provided the people with people. around three months and require you to raise between £2,000 and £3,000 in sponsorship. This alone needs a few organisational skills and motivation that you can take elsewhere. Raleigh International is among the

most popular of expedition based schemes and offers a two-way learning process with local communities involved in its projects. The selection is based on a weekend trial at a few places around the country. It's good fun in itself and only costs £25. It prepares reports on data collected by venturers, conducts community projects, and lets those taking part complete their own expedition somewhere within the country, often seen as the highlight of the trip.
Their selection weekends are

reportedly very tough, but you come out with a changed attitude, even after the two days.

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# Heart of the matter

Worried about the shortage of available organs, second year medic JAMIE WILSON examines the issues surrounding compulsory donation

**HOULD** our bodies become public property when we die? Professor John Harris, a leading expert in medical ethics, certainly thinks so. His plans would aid in the automatic provision of organs for patients awaiting

transplant surgery.

There are currently 5,400 people in the UK requiring organ transplants and a fifth of them will die because no suitable donor can be found. The current voluntary donor card system is simply not popular enough to find sufficient organs. Couple this with the clinical criteria for finding compatibility between donor and recipient, and patients might feel that last minute reprieves from death row are as unlikely as in real life.

Professor Harris asserts that our concern for the fate of a corpse takes

precedence over the thousands who are seriously but not irreparably ill. This means too few of us are willing to part with any of our parts. Whether it is our conservative squeamishness, religious objection or apathy in getting a donor card, the system will have to change to maximise donor availability.

Distributing out body parts to the needy is not a completely radical idea. Anybody who objects would be readily removed from obligation. Professor Harris also argues that regulation of the donation process is far stricter than most of us realise. For example, if an investigation into the cause of death is deemed to be in the public interest, a post mortem can be warranted without the consent of

O NOT assume post mortems are a gentle procedure with an abiding concern for the maintenance of dignity. This opens the chest and enables systematic removal of all the organs for further examination. Blood tends to go everywhere. In many cases organs are retained by the


The implications of making corpses available for organ extraction are rife with ethical considerations. An internal market within the UK or EU would have to be strictly regulated, ensuring that altruistic and not commercial intent was the requisite motive. Infiltration of 'dodgy organs' from less well regulated countries

black market in kidneys exists. Although private healthcare or vast wads of cash can overcome NHS waiting lists in a jiffy, money confers no advantage in getting that elusive vital organ. When it comes to organ transplants, the rich and poor are on a level playing field.

This has opened a loophole, albeit illegal, for those willing to try their luck in a seller's market. Having your kidney extracted in the back streets of Bogota may net you several thousand dollars if you find the right organ

ogler.
Other 'middle men' have cottoned onto this. An Australian in Lima, Peru woke up minus his kidney three days after a night out with some Peruvian 'chums'. Watch out if you get medical attention in South America. It's likely that you'll become a side issue in your doctor's pursuit of kidnap surgery. However, organs are in short

supply. As a prospective medical professional, I should do my bit for transplant patients and say 'get a donor card'. In the future, it may be that we can grow human tissue on animals and in test tubes and this shortage will be a thing of the past. Professor Harris's ideas seem a workable stop-gap for those who can stomach them. In the meantime, treasure your organs for they are a valuable commodity.

Over 80 per cent of people awaiting organ transplantation require a kidney usually because chronic renal disease has terminally damaged the two they possess. Healthy humans can quite easily get by with one kidney and while most people prefer to hang on to their organs, this has provided an opening for desperate souls out to make a quick buck.



Other sports are also making the effort such as cricket in South Africa where South Africa where International cricketer Brian McMillan has been punished after shouting a racist slur at a bowler during a domestic

But for every bit of progress there are sports such as rugby in South Africa which has singularly failed to adjust to a post-apartheid system.

The only value these tales have is to act as a catalyst for change. In the same way that the Stephen Lawrence inquiry must facilitate a change of attitude across the board, so must we learn from Campbell's experiences and those in South

These incidents must be more than news stories today and forgotten tommorow. Sport has a big influence on society and if it leads the way in dealing with such incidents, the rest of society may follow.

category.



Chapman. She said: "We now either play away or not at all. We've even had to pay local rivals to use their training

Chapman believes that both of these undesirable alternatives have contributed heavily to a lowering of team morale and confidence. She is calling for positive action from the authorities to remedy what she sees as a dire situation.

But the university has hit back to counter the allegations of mismanagement saying that its resources are stretched to the limit.

Professor Margaret Talbot, the head of sport at LMU said: "The

university is a victim of its own success in having a range of achieving teams, with a finite number of pitches

to accommodate them.

"The university's rugby pitches could be better used if the clubs could co-ordinate their fixtures more effectively across the season.

"However, the university has been trying to negotiate more grass pitches near to Beckett Park which would help the development of more

The rugby teams were also left fuming as a newly-purchased scrummage machine was unavailable for use after the authorities deemed the coaches underqualified for its supervision. But LMUSU club captain Rob Grieg is adamant that team performance has been hampered by

the lack of facilities.

He said: "I feel that both the men's and women's teams have underachieved in BUSA due to the lack of equipment and the facilities offered to them by the University.'

The women's team were last year's BUSA semi-finalists, but season struggled through to the last 32. Despite coaching from Leeds Tykes, the men's team failed to make n impact upon the BUSA league Homer blames the authorities.
"I have no doubt whatsoever that

the performances of the rugby teams this year have been significantly impaired by the lack of suitable training facilities provided by the

university.
"The high level performance required to succeed in BUSA is impossible without proper preparation, especially in the forwards."

And at least the university has offered an olive branch to its rugby players in a bid to resolve the dispute.
Talbot said: "I would welcome discussion with representatives of the rugby teams, to see how together we can solve these problems


