Not quite. Biding his time after the almighty farce of Reading '96, Ian Brown has used his time out to sit down 'on the grass' in the sunshine with a few musically talented mates (Mani and Reni included) and knock out a few relaxed and contemplative ditties.
This is as near to the

he opening shot of this book is Nabokov's admission that prior to writing his famous Lolita he had formed an idea for a book in 1939. Sadly he refected that the novella which he subsequently typed was lost. It was, however, merely mislaid and Nabokov duly sent the newly found manuscript to the publishers.

This then is a pre-Lolita delve into the mind of a madman, one obsessed with the desire to rule, through his

paedophilic nature, a young girl.

At first glance, the book is an amusing tale of a middle aged jeweller trying to concoct situations where he may steal time with the victim. Descending into near farce when he sets out his stall, to marry the girls sick widowed mother, he awaits her demise, either manufactured or naturally. Through his attempts to speed up the process the novella at once shows up the nature of chances lost and gained due to external influences

The upshot of this short tale is the furtive attempts of a sick and twisted child molester to manipulate for his own

ends, the destruction of innocence.

The end comes swiftly and not to his The end comes swiftly and not to his satisfaction, when on taking his young charge on a long sojurn ends up in a double bed with her asleep next to him. Overcome with temptation, he lets down the guard which he has, till then rigourously applied and is sent running into the night by horrified hotel guests. There the story ends but it is taken up by his sen Dmitri in the offernered Desire. his son Dmitri in the afterword. Denying that the book is a another Lolita he adds that the book is really an exercise in suspense. The sense that reality will always betray the dream. If this is heavy, at least it gives a background to the man who went on to write one of the most influential books this century.



well. We've always been busy around the January period."

The new single Cerys refers to is "Mulder and Scully", a plea to the inquisitive couple to try and unravel the mystery of level and a new certification. the mystery of love, and a new entry in the hit parade at a quite staggering number three (outselling Oasis, by the

Are you excited by chart success? "It's quite funny really how things are progressing at the moment. It's been a gradual process though, and not one we haven't enjoyed."





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

While Keanu Reeves gives perhaps the best 'straight' performance of his career, he still on occasion lapses into his 'amiable and confused' persona suggesting perhaps a patient director and a good editor.
