

Is your degree being assessed unfairly?

OFF THE MARK


EXAM marking techniques have been labelled unfair because departments decide whether or not to mark their papers anonymously.

Although anonymous marking is not compulsory throughout either university, the majority of students assume the schemes are in place. After a Leeds University Communications lecturer admitted his department does not anonymously mark, one student stormed: "Obviously you can never expect complete objectivity because we're human beings. But if a student is friends with a lecturer it's going to affect the results. Especially if marks are on a grade boundary."

Stephen Lax, the Institute of Communications' exams officer, explained: "We don't do anonymous marking - but we're not opposed to it. We agree with it in principle but it isn't practical in terms of person power."

A university spokesperson confirmed: "Anonymous marking is used according to departmental discretion. However, where used, it is across the board, for all student's exam papers. If a department anonymously marks it is for all students on a course and not just a few."

But Emma Rabin, Education Officer at LUU, is hoping to persuade university bosses to consider anonymous marking across the board. She said: "There will be further discussion whether anonymous marking schemes should be applied to essays and course work as well as exams. In the meantime, students should make sure they are aware of the procedures within their own departments."

Grant leaves sports chief cock-a-hoop

SPORTS Minister Tony Banks has given his seal of approval to a new scheme aimed at introducing more children to basketball.

And he gave Mel Welch, Head of LMU's External Development Unit of Sports Studies, a cheque for £2.8million - the final installment of a £10 million grant.

Mel currently chairs the Outdoor Basketball Initiative, a company set up to manage a National Lottery funded programme to provide 10,000 basketball goals in parks and open spaces throughout England.

Tony Banks presented the cheque at All Saints Community centre, Sheffield, to celebrate the news that 5,000 goals have already been erected thanks to the scheme.

Mr Banks said: "Basketball is booming in popularity at the moment.

"This is a fantastic response to it, bringing free and accessible basketball facilities to the very heart of communities at grass roots level."

The 5,000 goals which have

been installed to date by the OBI have been placed in over 95% of the local authorities in England.

The Lottery Sport Fund's contribution has been matched pound for pound by local partners installing the goals, upgrading existing play areas and building over 300 new full and half size

The bar room chat which may help save lives

A GROUNDBREAKING system which aims to combat airborne viruses is being developed by a Leeds University boffin - thanks to a chance conversation in a hotel bar.

Dr Clive Beggs, of the School of Civil Engineering and a specialist in air conditioning and refrigeration techniques, had been speaking at a conference in Brussels, when a conversation over a beer with an American counterpart sparked off his idea.

"We were chatting about an idea of mine of using UV lights installed in the air ducts of air conditioning systems to kill airborne germs, when my American college told me about the severity of tuberculosis throughout the world," explained Dr Beggs.

It was then that he realised that he might be able to use his device to tackle the killer disease.

"I went back to Leeds and started my research from scratch. We now have a multi-disciplinary team and are the leading place in Europe for research in this field."

Tuberculosis is one of the world's biggest killers. It is estimated that I in 3 people in third world countries have TB and the Word Health Organisation estimates that another 200 million people alive today will contract the disease.

Particularly vulnerable are those people that are already ill, the elderly and the young. Contraction of the disease can be a serious problem in the third world, where the disease can

spread rapidly.

The School of Civil Engineering and the division of Microbiology, have combined to produce a prototype device aimed at reducing the spread of viruses and diseases through the air and ventilation systems in hospitals.

The use of UV light will stop the spread of illness by breaking down the DNA strands in the bacteria, viruses, yeast and fungi preventing them from breeding and the disease spreading.

And experiments are now being conducted at the Leeds General Infirmary on how best to implement the technique.

The first stage involves placing UV lamps in the air ducts and measuring their affect on the microbiological environment in the air.

If successful, UV lamps will be placed in wards killing the viruses as they rise on convection currents into the UV field.

Dr Beggs said: "The possibilities for this technique are enormous. If somebody coughs, for example, this new device would prevent the spread of the illness.

"If the experiment is successful these high level UV lamps could be installed in schools and health centre waiting rooms across the world. They would be particularly effective in the third world where one of the biggest killers is the contracting of hiberculosis through airborne viruses after being admitted to hospital for a different illness."



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




The Student Advice Office at City Site is temporarily moving to 4 Queens Square over the summer vacation due to the current building works.

The office in the Student Union Offices will CLOSE at 4.00pm on Friday 11th June and will re-open on Monday 28th June at 4 Queens Square.



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Anonymous marking is the right answer

WHEN it comes to exams, we all have more than enough to worry about on our side of things, let alone consider that those doing the examining may themselves be falling down in their most crucial responsibility - marking our work honestly, fairly and accurately.

Given that a university's prime undertaking must be to establish and maintain a credible system of accreditation and degree classification, it seems more than slightly perverse that the decision on how to mark coursework and more importantly exams is left up to the discretion of individual departments.

That's not to say that each individual department is not more than capable of making a carefully considered and informed decision. Merely that it can only cause confusion and serve to muddle administration.

And this inevitably leads to a divergence in the standards demanded for each band of mark, and ultimately a loss in the status attached to a degree from the university as a whole.

Moves have already been taken to try and enforce anonymous marking in all departments and preferably at all levels. This appears the most straightforward and sensible solution. Students know their effort, or lack of effort, will be evaluated impartially and university bosses will find increased reputation and standing attached to the qualifications they award.

Saying 'it's not practical' is no excuse. Settling for a second best solution makes as little sense as some of the questions students are confronted with when they turn over that piece of paper for the first time.

Students today use more drugs more often

High time for

Academic stress forced most students into the library. LOLA ALMUDEVAR examines alternative routes to high marks



FTER two months of academic hell, thoughts of exam techniques should be the last subject to bounce like a pogo stick around my weary head. But the revelations exposed by drunken banter have led me to question previous work hard play hard ethics.

In the weeks subsequent to the Easter 'break' I was a hermit - faithful to the library, a stranger to my friends - I was convinced the way to survive the ensuing academic horror was a high vitamin intake, minimum four hours sleep a night, (deadlines permitting) and general emotional suppression. 

underlying regret about his
experience: "Sadly it's never

or proving myself to the
examiner. It's been a reflection
of not caring about my degree
but just getting marks which



for mental health said "it's impossible to say that 'a' will lead to 'b', there are so many factors and circumstances it depends on an individuals situation."

The triple B cartel may also have missed the opportunity to develop certain skills necessary for surviving high pressure situations. The side effects of stress and the dementia it causes to normally rational



HOOSE LIFE', ran the mantra at the start of Trainspotting. the seminal 'drug movie' of the 1990s. 'Choose a job. Choose a career. Choose a family.'

Yet the hero of Trainspotting,
Mark Renton, chose none of
these. Throughout the film he
continually failed to kick a
heroin addiction, was convicted
of theft and stole the proceeds of
a drug deal from his gang of socalled 'friends'. At the end we
saw Renton striding purposefully
off into the distance, a new
swagger in his step, a new
confidence in his outlook. We
never really knew whether he
ever properly kicked the habit.

Few students are addicted to heroin, but many have recreational drug habits that affect their daily lives, their grades, their prospects and their relationships with friends and loved ones. If people take the time to think about the catchy Trainspotting soundbites, they do actually make sense, in relation to all other drugs as well as heroin.

Without doubt thousands of people across several decades have seen their lives ruined by drugs. But intelligent and story of a group of ecstacy users on a typical weekend in Cardiff, the film has been received with caution in establishment circles because of one crucial problem: the accurate portrayal of these young people's weekend carries no undertones or anti-drug messages.

A new British film, Human Traffic, opened last weekend and does for ecstacy what Trainspotting did for heroin, but without the glamorous and successful overtones. No less an authority than Home Secretary Jack Straw failed to condemn marijuana use during his time as union president at Leeds University. And no less a cult figure than South Park's Chef has given students all the justification we need to continue our responsible recreational drug use: "There's a time and a place for everything, and it's called college."

Or maybe not. As the author wittily spells out. This Handbook is a complete con and the author an out and out con man. In an age where people pursue the spiritual via the internet, furniture arrangers and so called faith healers, it makes a refreshing change to come across a light hearted account of a major philosophy.

This book is never ashamed to point



out just how vacuous the search for inner peace is. Its underlying message is: do what you want, you are eventually going to die so none of it really matters. In any case, you shouldn't try perverting Taoism for your own selfish quest for fame and fortune.

It has to be said that the jokes do wear a little thin after a while, and the lack of any serious insight into Taoism does become irritating. While there are a few interesting meditation tips, much of The Barefoot Doctor's Handbook for Herses advice is along the lines of get yourself a good agent and good PR

This is a book that is well aware of the current pre-millennial thirst for the spiritual, and exploits it to convey a message so vague, so general and oh so bland. However, it is a book that openly extracts the urine out of itself, and ultimately the reader for being both vain and gullible.

Black magic in 60s studentdom


know that because I have read Robert Irwin, and he was there. But the Sixties also had a darker side, a stream of experimental Satanist groups who did very weird things with the usual paraphernalia of goats, virgins, incantations and sometimes, drugs. I have a feeling that Robert Irwin was there as well.

His sixth novel, Satan Wants Me, is the story of Peter a sociology PhD student, deeply impressed by the array of drugs and music on offer in 1967, and is told from the viewpoint of his diany

Peter and his friends, (not like the film), have joined the Black Book Lodge, who instructed him to keep the diary. They are a group that resides at the deeper end of occultism. Peter quickly rises through the ranks of the faithfull, submitting himself to many tests and rituals along the way. A whole new language emerges, (pathworking, Qlippoth, congressus subtilis...), and dubious sexual practices abound.

It is only much later that we learn that the Black Book Lodge Itself is the centre of Peter's thesis. However, the distance the spying sociological observer might wish to maintain is quickly reduced as Peter is drawn to the centre of a series of reincarnations involving Aleister Crowley.

The historically accurate 'Great Beast' of British Occultism that is largely unknown by our generation is only one of a series of meticulously researched historical angles of this



book. From the Stones to pubs around London, this gives Sotan Wants Me an authentic edge above lain Banks' Whit for example.

Whilst not giving away the real denouement. Peter does end up as a grey bourgeois city banker, a conclusion that saddens, and may ring all too familiar for students everywhere. Soton Wonts Me is essentially comic. Though the genuinely scary darker sections

forced me to read the reassuring Economist before turning out the light. It is a brilliant book, it has much to offer students of the occult, the 60s, of drugs and of life.

Having been Booker-long listed once, I feel that Irwin could make his big break into the mainstream with Satan Wants Me, but it will be a brave public that devour it en masse.

Comic caper in the American South

HAT happens when two white supremacist rednecks win \$14 million in the Florida State Lottery?

Fortunately, to all intents and purposes, our two big winners, though dangerously evil, are total morons. Bode Gazzer and his unhygienic, offensive partner, known only as Chub, decide to set up a militia to prepare for the combined NATO invasion of Jews, Cubans and Negroes gathering in the Bahamas.

Before mobilising the Aryan army however, greed and the second winning lottery ticket is their priority.

At this point it becomes clear what is ultimately going to happen, but I will not presume to tell. Suffice to say that Lucky You focuses upon a feisty black sex bomb of a veterinary nurse, a miracle town with a Madonna that cries scented tears, a jealous judge trying to assasinate a

journalist, a polite skinhead, numerous stunning women, Richard 'The Icepick' Tarbone and lots of baby turtles.

Basically, Hiaasen's social commentary involves a light-hearted development of a sinister plot, and seems to imply that to varying

When discussing where to hide the lottery ticket, Chub's "butthole scheme" is frowned upon by Bode, even the offer to wrap it in foil is not greeted with approval: "I don't care if you pack it in fucking

kryptonite, that lottery ticket ain't going up your ass."

Notably quotable, but because Bode and Chub are so constantly ridiculed by their own incompetence, as the reader, it is impossible to feel in any way intimidated by them.

Perhaps that is the writer's intention; to show the weakness and fallabilty of society's most toxic human products.

Certainly, there is no lack of emotional realism as a consequence, it is merely that the bizarre world Hiaasen has created is more like a

cartoon than real life, displacing any

feeling of sympathetic involvement.

However, it is the inventiveness of the satire that dazzles. Hisasen ably provokes laughter in conjunction with a feeling of stunned shock through the off-the-wall perspective and brutal honesty of his black humour.


He appears to craft extraordinary scenarios with consummate ease, using the volatile mixture of extreme, but well-developed and believable characters, to ignite a blazing fire of sharp dialogue and romping action.

Apart from the narrative style being slightly tedious, Lucky You is an innovative piece of comic writing that is nothing, if not enormously entertaining.





HE Super Furries recently said about Guerillo, "We aimed for it being accessible - we've got a pop mentality." Don't be fooled. Despite the upbeat hispanics of 'Northern Lites' and the bleepy stompy histrionics of 'Keep The Cosmic Trigger Happy' (is that title one of Crispian Kula Shaker's cretinous cast-offs?), much of Guerillo has pretty much 'done a Blur', i.e. Messy Cool plays pin the tail on the donkey with Nice Melody. All good, but hardly pop.

'experimental' (to use an overused generalisation) album so far is also the most seditious considering their supposed assault on the throne of Pop. This is left-handed music in its Beta Band element, and to pit such wits against the likes of Billie is to wear trainers on your wedding day - quite cool but ultimately a bit silly.



Someone (just someone) once wrote that Blur's 13 was an album's worth of secret tracks, and even if they were wrong, those sentiments could almost apply to Guerilla. The likes of 'Wherever I Lay My Phone (That's My Home)' are quite cute in a 'ballad of a packman' way-all digital cartwheels and hi-speed dubbed vocals - but a bit superfluous all the same.

Highlites come in the shape of 'Something's Come From Nothing' - loopingly graceful electronics cocooning Gruff's soporiphic refrain, and the falsetto fest of 'The Door To This House Remains Open' which comes pretty dam close to ice-cream van gone drum 'n' bass territory, if that feat is possible

In comparison to Fuzzy Logic and Radiator, this album only features the olegeetar in small doses, but its presence is certainly felt on 'The Teacher' and the super grassy 'Night Vision'. Of the Welsh Guards to have invaded the charts in recent times, the Furries are certainly the least easy to categorise, and easily the most unwilling to be categorised. They're a bunch of welsh bandits intent upon making damn sure that no-one confuses them with The Stereophonics, and with this idiosyncratic collection of songs, the Cymru guerillas have landed sunny side up.

Everything you never wanted to know...

OU can never complicate the issue. Manic Street Preachers are way too complex to begin with.

Everything recounts an intricate and impassioned mythology, a story that extends beyond pop music alone, back to a hermetically sealed Blackwood bedroom in the 80s, where foundations were laid in isolation, dreams of glamour, revolution and escape blotting out the boredom of a South Wales adolescence.

Manic Street Preachers was never exactly a boyhood dream for Nick, Richey, James and Sean; James (a teen bohemian in a squaddie's body?) initially conceived a local art collective called 'The Blue Generation'; as icons Marx and Monroe burn as bright as Guns'n'Roses and Public Enemy, no problem. Rock'n'roll was only ever part of their experience, "just another reference point". The



collison point of too many references, too many ideas: this early and intense sifting of culture, history and politics is largely the reason their influence ever reached so far beyond previous notions of rock'n'roll as 'lifestyle' or 'mindset'. They were never a band for musicians. A reason to love them alone.

As Simon Price points out in his meticulous account, the Manics were and are too insoluble a prospect to ever fulfil that "we're gonna sell 60 million albums" promise/threat, and the crux lies in what Price valued about the band ("ATTITUDE x ARROGANCE x REVOLUTION x SEX") and what he (still) desires for them (the kind of multiselling universality that would make every word and every note dangeroos).

This duality is valuable: Price is defiantly a fan from within the Generation Terrorists stronghold (of Nick's retreat into inert domesticity he asks bluntly:

"Nicky Wire-boring fuckhead?"), but he isn't about to give up on them:"(MSP) have indelibly scorched their world view into the popular consciousness. There is work to be done. This is not the end."

Everything is as close to a definitive biography as the Manics are likely to get, and not just in terms of sheer detail, but precisely because Price is aware that a band like this cannot be dealt with simply in terms of "telling the story" (each chapter is intersected by essays analysing their relation to rock n'roll, America, sexuality, self-abuse...), Price hits an admirable balance between passion, polemic and acute analytic insight. He actually cares. And that's what elevates Everything above every other biography so far written about Manic Street.

Electro retro-futurists Add N To (X) are scared of their audience. OLIVER CRANER puts them at ease

"It is the rationalising and ordering imposed by technology that makes us forget that machines have their origins in the irrational."

Georges Canguilhem

P SOME dank narrow stairs into a draughty room above The Duchess Of York. Barry Smith, of Add N To (X), sonic sex terrorists to a wo/man, sits forward on a sagging settee.

"...It's like we're fighting with the machines, trying to control them, to regain some kind of command. So you're always in conflict. On stage it's always hostile. That whole idea of digital/corporate technology taking control away from the individual, the human. It's seductive, to the extent that you get sucked in. The machines take over."


Add NTo (X) reclaim the leftovers, the relics of technology. To try and find a kind of redemption. It's a symbolic conflict, but then it's not.

"The problem is the pace of technology. Music becomes this rush simply to get the latest equipment, and that kills it dead: the imagination is just gone. The sounds are all the same." Robert Moog once said: "An and start to play themselves. And we have to control that. With digital technology that fight is taken out of our hands. It happens by itself, and so you can't control it. It's a separate organism."

A digital network; webs that make redundant all notions of linear connection, systems with the potential to organise and maintain themselves. If the process has already begun, then what exactly can art or pop do to arrest that? What have art and pop even got to do with it?

Ann Shenton, perched somewhere near the corner of the room on a hard wooden chair like a dignified jackdaw, streamlines Barry's train of thought. "When the instruments overheat on

We can't be contained."

Are Add N To (X) futurists?

"No.What we take from Futurism is the idea of smashing everything up, like replacing old buildings with new ones. But it's not about The Future, it's about Now.There is no future, no past, only the present. All pasts converge in the moment. All elements of the past exist at this point what we already have and what we amalgamate into the whole. We're not futurists because we don't believe you can project that far into the future. Futurism and science fiction: essentially these are all about the present."

Add N To (X) are humanists.
"Yes, absolutely."
So explain.

"Avant Hard is a love album, it's

emotional. It's about how you fall in love with and to music, and accessing the feeling of that moment. You can't be detached, you have to express emotion because you want to connect. So regain control of the machines and exploit them to communicate. That emotional engagement with music is what I remember and loved about music in the first place: the release."

"Music is a safety valve," continues Ann, lighting cigarettes with steady fingers, "every week, at the end of the week, going to a club, a gig, a film, whatever."

Add NTo (X) always seemed the opposite, which is why the Kraftwerk comparisons were ostensibly legitimate. You once called yourselves "aggressive futurists". You seemed more detached than you are. Like robots, to a point.

"We don't believe in the conjunction of man and machine," counters Barry. " We exist somewhere else. Somewhere in between. But not the Man-Machine."

Ann: "We want this to be sexy. And machines can be sexy."

Hence the cartoon porn flick that acommpanied the single 'Metal Fingers In My Body', animated human-cyborg fucking. Kinda cool, but kitsch, and it's time to kill kitsch, surely?

"Yeah, but Add N To (X) aren't ironic," stresses Barry.

"We grew up on Benny Hill," adds Ann, mysteriously.

Barry: "We graft theory onto sound. The cerebral and visceral: what would happen if Stockhausen met Motorhead?" Controlled carnage. Like Cesar's supercompressed scrap metal collages, except made out of sound. Add N To (X) implode on stage, a haywire combustion of moogs and synths, Morticia Addams make-up (Ann) and pretty-boy rock shapes (Barry). And a theramin. As if

they'd forget.

"We're scared of our audience," says

Ann.

"We feel hermetically sealed," says Barry, "an insular unit. We're like exiles. Which is a kind of liberation. But that's terrifying. All freedom is essentially terrifying. Being in a band like this, or any band, you're so enclosed. Locked in your own world, you go slightly insane. Being in a band is definitely a kind of madness."

You should go and see them. Scare them. Adore them.

"It's not even so much about conviction, but striving towards something. Something elsewhere. Y'know, I've seen chrome grass, scarlet skies, mathematical trees."

Because they actually talk like this! Rewind to fast forward to get to where we are now. While there's still time.

He's called Q and his cult novel *Deadmeat* has just seen its first stage adaptation at the Playhouse. ALEX WALKER finds out more

N MY book, anyone who calls themselves Q is either extremely pretentious or has to be able to provide the cream of Her Majesty's Secret service with lots of high tech gadgets. The fact that I am about to talk to the author of the cult novel Deadmeat and the star of its subsequent adaptation definitely implies one more than the other.

As he strolls over it is impossible not to feel a certain amount of apprehension as rumour has it that he is prone to walking out of interviews if the wrong questions are asked, but the friendly handshake and the big smile reassure me that some preconceptions can be wrong... maybe.

Leaving the sooty streets of Manchester for Leeds, Thelma Barlow alca Coronation Street's "Mavis" is surprisingly revealed as the most humorous character. Endearing and comic she is a catalyst for a warm performance which inspires a wave of

"Enjoy" juxtaposes with charming

THE LIGHTS are going, Afrobeat (a mix of Jazz, Hip Hop, African and Drum 'n' Bass) is booming against the walls, an MC is prancing up and down the catwalk, strange images are flickering on the giant screens that surround the room... but nobody's dancing.

Why? Because we are in the West Yorkshire Playhouse. Somehow the Courtyard theatre has been transformed into a club that could match even the cream of Leeds's night spots in order to bring Q's debut novel "Deadmeat" to the stage.

A vigilante is killing paedophiles whom he finds on the web, but this, although it is supposed to be the central story of the play has very little relevance to the two hours of visual treats that Jude Kelly has put together. Clarkie, the central character played by Q, is fresh out of jail and finds himself placed amidst a group of stereo typical characters (a spiritual Muslim artist a hardcore Hip Hop D) rudeboy, a camp, rich art dealer etc... etc.) around whom the intrigue revolves.

It isn't the acting or the content of the script that is important, its the way in which the production comes together that matters. A mix of music, video, lighting and the spoken word produces a truly multi-media affair that takes the audience into Q's world, a world where anybody can produce any kind of art thanks to the wonder of computers.

The teaming up of a contemporary cult icon and one of the country's finest stage directors promised to create a fantastic piece of theatre. And by attempting to show a realistic view of youth culture in an arena where a production of this kind would never normally have been given the benefit of the doubt Deadmeat is indeed a success it's just on leaving you are left with a niggling feeling that the novel should have moved straight anto the Silver Screen.

While not a place to get steaming drunk, Friday offers some interesting drinks promos with Carlsberg at £1 a bottle and selected shots also at £1.

But it's not just about nightlife, if you fancy a bite to eat, the food is superb. Everything is freshly cooked. From the usual pastas and salads to stir fries and tapus, there's something for all tastes. I med the Soul Kitchen salad - a gorgeous mound of crisp lettace, him cheese, seasted pine nuts and succulent chicken. If I hadn't been full after that, I would have tried just about everything on the menu and waddled back up through town.

As it happens. I can only imagine how mouth-wateringly fresh the Vegetable Korma and how creamy the mash (served with pesto or mustard and onion) would have been. And that's not even starting to mention the huge range of sandwiches and the far too tempting desserts.

I'm sorry if this all sounds like I've been employed to write a rave review, but when a place is this good, there's no other option apart from using as many asperlatives as possible. It's hard to pigeonhole Soul Kitchen - it can be everything to all people and no-one is left out. It's not your average pretentious city centre bar but on the same hand, it's not a sucky-floored dive. It's the kind of place which is what you make it - put in a bit of effort and you'll get a hell of a lot out of it.

To put it in a sentence - it's a kitchen and it's gotta whole lot of soul. Definitely worth a trip out of your way.

A perfect menu should offer the customer an array of interesting dishes, some traditional delights and several exciting innovations. There should be at least a couple of attractive dilemmas whilst choosing and never disappointment on deliverance. The power of The Fourth Floor Café, is that you know that whether you start with hazelnut toasted goats cheese and progress to pan fried monkfish, or move from tuna loin to rib-eye beef, that you are in for something special.

Everything that arrived at our table was full of flavour, bursting with aroma and a pleasure to

Taking things a degree further

Not everyone is ripping up their library cards with glee as they finish their degrees. ZOE FELLER met one of the many who stayed

OME people just can't get enough of university. Despite having just completed three (or even four) years of hard slog, they will actually be coming back for more in September. These are the post-graduates.

Taking a further degree has become increasingly popular for graduates as a masters or PhD is seen as one way to stand out from the masses when applying for jobs.

Phil Jacobs is one of the 3,000 post graduate students at Leeds University. He is just completing the final year of his chemistry PhD and sees it as an invaluable experience.

"Without a doubt I've got a far better job than I could have got after my first degree," he says. "And it's all because of my PhD."

'There are two simple reasons for me continuing my studies: I was not ready for a permanent job and I thought it would help me get a higher paid job. I was right on both counts."

Sue Hawksworth of the Leeds University Careers Service also simplifies the further studies decision to two separate options.

"Intrinsically, you've got to really want to take your studies further.

"You've got to be really

passionate about your course and
genuinely interested in more indepth research," she says.


"The only other reason is if you need an extra qualification to get the job you want."

The university offers several vocational masters which can help students get the jobs they want. Sue explained: "A lot of people want to do water resource management, but it is impossible to get into without a post graduate qualification.

"Publishing is another career where a masters can be useful."

Three further years of study is a big commitment, and for Phil it has seen a huge change in his approach to his subject.



HELEN MORTIMER has been selected to represent Britain in gymnastics at the World Student Games in Palma, Majorca.


Helen is a LMU Biology student and is only one of six students selected for the gymnastic squad which will compete in July.

She said: "I'd not competed for a long time and since I came back in January I have trained like mad and done really well.


"I didn't imagine it would ever happen having given up for so long and I am really enjoying it."



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
