DRUGS counsellors are furious about flyers linking a club night with heroin use.

The flyer promoting the 'Habit' night at Northern Light has been brandished as irresponsible by heroin support workers who help users ditch the habit.

The advert shows a forearm hooked up intravenously to an amplifier. Employing drugs metaphors, it says: "Get ready to take your first hit. Addictive

It has prompted calls for a

tighter restriction on ad imagery. Will Lunnon, from Leeds Drug Action Team said: "There should be a responsibility within advertising so that it doesn't promote drug use in any way.

Miranda Powers, spokesperson for Leeds Alcohol and Drug Services, said: "Its heroin-taking imagery is grossly irresponsible.

This sort of thing glamourises drug use and I can tell you that there is nothing glamourous about seeing someone with the habit.

Reaction from the student body has not been as fierce.

Adam Bell runs and promotes Habit while studying English and History at Leeds Metropolitan University.

He said: "I admit that the flyer uses shock tactics to grab the attention of the clientele.

"However the night is more about the music, and I can defi-nitely say that Northern Light does not condone the use of drugs in any way.

Paul Lewis, 20, a Geography student at the University of Leeds, agreed: "You have to look beyond what they are showing in the poster - it is more a comment on the type of event they are putting on, rather than glamourising drug

Union officials are now studying CCTV footage from the night...

Women's Officer Kim Shutler said: "LUU is carrying out a full formal investigation into the incidents on Wednesday October 27. I was of course shocked to hear these allegations which, if proven to be true, are horrendous and entirely unacceptable. Disciplinary action will be determined when we have the results."

Ambrosio, who met with Old Bar bosses this week, said: "I am shocked and appalled that this has happened at a club I am part of and I am convinced we have a lot of groveling to do... if we are ever to be made felt welcome around the

But furious students are pushing for further action. "I am not going to let this lie. I don't think [a fine] is sufficient punishment... it comes out of the Union's pocket anyway,' Balbul concluded.

No one can be certain how many people have died since the Iraq conflict began in March 2003. The Lancet medical journal said last week there could be as many as 100,000 civilian deaths.

Mahdi al Khanjar is an Iraqi student at Park Lane College whose uncle and cousins have been killed during the conflict.

He said: "I was unhappy with Saddam, but people are dying every day in Iraq. I support peace and war wasn't the way to deal with Saddam."



### PREPARES FOR SHAKE-UP

A RADICAL overhaul of Leeds University Union has been proposed with the launch of a £23,000 survey this week.

Students at the University of Leeds will be asked what the union means to them, how it should spend its money and how it should develop. It is claimed that the two year process will save LUU £900,000.

The union Exec have hired an independent research company to conduct focus group discussions in the new year. Proposals will be taken to the Sabbatical Council for

further review in April, and then a vote will be taken in December next year. It is hoped the review will become a three-yearly process.

Tom Wong, LUU Communications Officer, said: "We really hope students buy into the idea and take action to change the way the union operates. Maybe we'll see a complete change of culture in the Union, but it is for the students to decide. This really is so important for the future of the organisation.'

the University of Leeds, lived in DC for a year as part of her course. She worked for Senator Joe Lieberman on Capitol Hill for some of the time and spent nine months with the BBC News bureau. The Beeb's producers invited her back as Assistant Producer for the Dimbleby-anchored marathon coverage which went live across BBC 1, BBC News 24 and BBC World during the count.

Here are her reflections on the political storm and the media whirlwind that was election 2004.

#### What's the mood like over there?

Everyone's talking about it. In DC on Wednesday evening it was extremely sombre. The vote there went to Kerry, but a number of people were obviously delighted at Bush's victory-cars honking, running around outside the Smithsonian museums, Republicans in their neighbourhood bars enjoying liquid lunches over Kerry's sober, concession speech. To be honest my close American friends are threatening to leave America for the next

What were you up to while the count was going on?


I was in the TV gallery for seven hours observing pictures and reports coming from our correspondents at the two HQ and

campaigns were. Whether it's their image; their stump speeches; their appearances on late night comedy shows their spot-ads - the ability to spin and market their stances and profile has been fascinating to observe.



I literally ran into Senator Kerry on my way to deliver a document to Joe Lieberman. I don't think he was impressed. I was involved in the BBC's coverage at the White House for a few world leader visits, including Blair's in April. Both are so fiercely protected by the Secret Service that, especially for a journalist, it would be hard to just 'meet them'

#### So why do so many people like Bush?

Whether you approve of his politics or not, Bush is an extremely personable guy. His charm held him strong throughout the campaign, especially in comparison to Senator Kerry who was frequently accused of lacking warmth.

#### Has this been as divisive an election as everyone says?

Absolutely, and strikingly so. The country is still overwhelmingly divided on major issues. Iraq, the economy, the war on terror, approaches to the environment, pro-life vs. prochoice-all these crucial issues may actually force Bush to adopt a more concilliatory approach at the beginning of his second term. He's got to try to unify a deeply polarised country

lare Short's mood is almost as black as the bulging stone on her ring finger. Sat in the lounge of the Royal Park Hotel in York she gulps down three swigs of strong coffee and leans

The former government minister isn't here to talk about her time at Leeds University in the 1960s; nor about her reunion with the son she adopted 30 years ago whilst taking her degree. Both themes feature briefly in her new book 'An Honourable Deception?', but they're subplots to a wider spectacle. We're here to talk about Tony Blair - a man to whom Short devotes a whole barrage of adjectives in her book, most of them unflattering

"I don't think admiration is the right word," she explains puckering her mouth into an awkward grin. "We got on fine on a day to day level in the first term... but I didn't vote for him as leader of the Labour Party"

"No, I'm sure he won't [read the book]," she jokes. "I don't think he reads a lot anyway." It's the kind of dig that Short gets away with well; the Midlands lilt in her accent somehow giving a subtlety to what are fairly crude swipes.

Short pours herself another cup her coffee ("It's hard pouring a cafetiere sidewades isn't it?") and we move to what she really wants to talk about. The destruction of both Iraq and the

#### LIES AND INCOMPETENCE

"Iraq is a mix of dishonesty and incompe-tence," she says bluntly. "[Blair's] determination to go to war and to fail to prepare for its aftermath is outrageously incompetent.

She blames this on a new system of government ("it's psychophancy rules OK"), run by a tight-knit group of friends and advisors, who she calls the "bright young things". "It's an outra-

geous way of doing things," she says. "It's both undemocratic and error prone."

"Iraq did need attention, containment wasn't working and sanctions were inflicting serious suffering on the Iraqi people. But I didn't agree with the argument, 'It's do something or do nothing.

During anti-war protests in Leeds two years ago placards went up referring to Tony Blair as a 'terrorist' and a 'murderer'. Blair's "machine", as Short puts it, led us into war. So does that mean Blair is a murderer? Does he have blood on his

Short frowns, drawing imaginary lines with her finger tips on the table. "It's a dramatic way

of saying it but it's a reasonable point," she says after a long pause. "He led it personally."

"Have you seen the figures today?" she then asks, referring to that day's Guardian front page, which claims 100,000 Iraqi civilians have been killed during the latest conflict.

How does Blair cope with that reality I ask and again her answer is pithy and unforgiving. "He deals with it by being delusional."

"He can't be enjoying [being PM] anymore. He loves adulation and he's not getting much - apart from from his advisors.

#### BLAIR BASHING

Since resigning from her cabinet position in May 2003 Short hasn't been on permanent Blairbashing duty. She praises the government's achievements on child poverty and, perhaps unsurprisingly, international development. Yet even



when praising government achievements the 'but' clause is never far away. "It's got a lot more to do," she says. "I do insist on that."

Her anger doesn't simply revolve around the Iraq war. Blair's presidential style and spin fetish ("charm and presentation without content") are destroying the Labour Party, she says. His determination to cling onto power, and strike deals to maintain his position are rapidly undoing the party's 100 year legacy. "It's a disaster," she points

But Short does believe that Blair's time in office may nearly be up. "I don't think there'll be anymore deals. Tony breaks them anyway. Tony made a deal with Gordon [Brown] about top-up fees again and he breached it. I think that was a mistake on Gordon's part.'

In the hotel's breakfast lounge Tony Blair is very much dish of the day. Anything else seems off

topic. When we talk about Leeds, where Short graduated in Political Studies in 1969 the colour-ful adjectives suddenly dry up. "It's a great city," she says. "Smaller than Birmingham ... it's a good place... it was good, I enjoyed it... a good course."

Short's memories of the city seem sparse in the extreme. In her book, 3 years at the University of Leeds are reduced to 26 lines. In person she's hardly more expansive. "I remember being at a party in his [Jack Straw's] house," she says vaguely. "But I don't think I was there very

So we return to politics - her views on the res olution of the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians and the US elections. "A new settlement in the Middle East could be achieved if the US can be persuaded to change its unbalanced policy towards Israel," she writes in the book's This, I suggest, would have been an enormous and improbable 'if', even if John Kerry - who enjoys even closer ties to the Israel government than Bush - had been elected.

#### CONFLICT AND BLOODSHED

"Kerry's speeches on Israel and the Palestinians are just as bad as Bush's," she concedes. It echoes the conclusion in her book that: "the world is in deep trouble and that conflict and

bloodshed are likely to continue for decades."
"The world is in a lot of danger," she explains, cradling her head in her left hand, "and the Middle East is the fulcrum of this.

At the moment, she says, poverty and injustice "recruiting sergeants for Al-Qaeda". "People Europe understand this anger, I think. Otherwise people who have never even thought about the use of force before will turn to vio-

Short's publicist is fretting about the hotel waiter, who can't seem to get the order right. The former minister ordered coffee with milk, she says, but he keeps getting it wrong.

If the fresh-faced waiter is intimidated by

Short, he isn't be alone. Before the publication of 'An Honourable Deception?', Whitehall officials requested a copy - presumably worried what she might let slip.

"If you are a former minister you have to sub mit it to the cabinet office, so it's read around Whitehall," she points out. "The Cabinet Secretary asked for some changes as did MI6, but didn't have any requests for changes from Number Ten. Presumably they decided they couldn't do anything."

With signings now going on around the country, she's certainly right in this. But the book has not gone unnoticed: there were rumours this week that Short's critique of Blair might lead to her losing her seat in Birmingham

Does she aim to return to politics, I ask, or have six years under what she calls an 'elective dictatorship' blunted her appetite for front bench

### Cast Notes Ying Tong

Showing until November 20 at West Yorkshire Playhouse Director: Michael Kingsbury

Hilarious tribute to bygone comedians tickles the funny bone

Set in Spike Milligan's linoleum lined psychiatric hospital room, *Ying Tong* opens up the mind of the comedy great for all to see, marvel and guffaw at. It plots the rise and fall of both Milligan's sanity and the celebrated *Goon Show* for which he, Harry Secombe and Peter Sellers became famous. With that in mind, you'd perhaps be forgiven for thinking *Ying Tong* is suited to a more mature and discerning audience; one whose members actually remember the days when Radio One went by the catchy name of Home Service Radio. An audience for which, moreover, Harry Secombe is best remembered as a comedian and not the rotund Welsh presenter of *Songs of Praise*. Unfortunately, thinking along those lines, you'll be missing out.

missing out.

The characters may be more recognisable to your grandparents and the humour wouldn't seem out of place coming from your dad but the story's a decent yarn and the gags are as timeless as they are hilarious. Sexagenarians will laugh at the

same time as sprightly youngsters. Ying Tong does a fantastic job of bridging the age gap.
The stage is variously Milligan's hospital suite, a BBC Radio studio, the pub in which he and Sellers first met, and lastly, perhaps most poignantly, his subconscious. Stripped bare, it's a bio-play detailing how the unlikely trio came together to forge the most loved comedy act of their era and how the partnership came to an end when Milligan suffered a breakdown. But Ying Tong is more than just that, it's a very funny play for Goon groupies as well as first time listeners, and a fitting tribute to the Goons and Milligan in particular.

particular.

Much of the comedy, as unlikely as it seems, stems from the tragic tale of a comic genius hounded by his own imagination. Milligan's delusional flashbacks and hallucinations provide great

slapstick and the melancholy, even morose, 'present day' Milligan chastises with a wit that, if anything, is sharpened by the breakdown. For good measure, the myriad voices of Sellers and the easy self-deprecation from Secombe give the audience a taste of what made the Goons such a comic institution. Unfortunately, some bits fly over the young head. Indeed, some of the more idiosyncratic Goon references are only understood by veterans.

A falented cast of actors-cum-impressionists and a superbly inventive set make *Ying Tong a* fine night out. Those less part of the Goon fraternity may question whether, as the actor who played Milligan takes his solo curtain call, the audience is applauding him or the real Milligan. Both deserve the praise. (7)

Unfortunately, our hopes and expectations rather tumbled out into an embarrassed splurge as one after another of the performers proved to be less entertaining than the last.

Of the lot of them, and lots there were, perhaps the only redeeming instance was when a man dressed in an illfitting green suit told us the joke about his dog, Minton. Such is the serendipitious nature of life that it transpired that when Minton needed to be admonished for his frequent misdemeanours, not only could the owner severely rebuke his dog, he could also induce side-splitting hilarity through shouting: 'Bad-Minton'...stone me, what larks!

It is perhaps cruel to launch such a vehement tirade against an institution so bereft of attributes, but so egregious was our experience that only unremitting slander will suffice. (2) Thomas Hunt

Modern piece experiments on gigantic infants with Blairite politics


This darkly comic play starts in an idyllic country setting with two young lovers fumbling behind the backdrop, but the plot quickly descends into murder and tragedy. It predominantly mixes and hence compares two worlds: the 18th century period of Enlightenment, and our league-table dominated culture of 'Education, Education, Education'.
The aim of the playwright is to launch a poignant attack on the pressures which threaten to

steal away childhood before it comes to fruition, and transform the role of the parents into that of helpless onlookers, watching while their child

becomes an academic performing monkey. It doesn't stop there though - Murray implicitly extends the inhumane, impersonal tendency of Blairite Britain to transform all aspects of presumably ideological social provision into cold competitive statis-

But it's not all doom and gloom - Philip Dinsdale provides more than just a little comic relief, delivering some fantastically funny performances as Everybody Elsie. He ranges impressively from the failed artist Foggy Nan through to a brilliant Tony Blair impersonation at the play's tragic conclusion. On the whole, the aptly named parents, Janet and John (played by Cristina Catalina and Chris Buckingham respectively) pull off their roles as an ordinary loving young couple, who struggle with the upbringing of a super-sized, genius baby, convincingly played by Samantha Adams. However, some of their scenes are a bit stilted, and Catalina's south country accent is prone to an uncomfortable degree of variation.

The only real flaw of the play is the bizarrely frenetic finale, which simply loses its impact. The idea of making a child a cultural commodity is taken too far and things become unrealistically horrifying, which renders the ending forced and slightly pre-



tentious. I'll just say that huge inflatable turds make shit props!

On the whole though, this is a comically outstanding and thought-provoking play - it's a pity it only came close to being so much better. (6) Rachael Wake

### Garden State

Director: Zach Braff Starring: Zach Braff + Natalie Portman

Home is where the heart is. Along with drugs, repression and feelings of dislocating emptiness

For those that don't know, New Jersey is the heavily mocked industrial and suburban spread southwest of NYC, awash with strip malls, gas stations and the kind of social stereotypes that give New Yorkers (and pretty much the rest of the US) some-body to laugh at. To all intents and purposes this is the armpit, the Essex of America if you will. The moniker "Garden State" then is something of a joke and an ironic title for Zach Braff's (lead actor, writer, director and all-round glory taker) directorial

You'll know Braff, probably, from Scrubs. In



Garden State he plays a heavily medicated, zonedout, struggling actor in L.A. who returns home to attend his mother's funeral, and in the process returns 'home' in the emotional and spiritual sense too. We are dealing here with that much loved American neuroses, that of the dysfunctional family. Truly, this film is very much about being American, dealing as it does with issues wholly endemic to that society with psychiatrists, malls and an underlying sense of failure and estrangement from the idealised American childhood.

The thing is, it works. Maintaining a cultural distance makes it easier for us to laugh; and it is funny. Watching Braff's Largeman reuniting with old schoolmates is particularly amusing, awkward

and cringe-worthy. There are some great deadpan moments, and Natalie Portman injects some irreverent, random humour. And is pretty beautiful too.

The film does its best to be unique and offbeat but it's essentially pretty straightforward and hardly original in its themes or subject matter. Despite this, it is rather charming. Whilst slightly let down by an ending that is downright predictable, this is a quirky, feel-good movie with a great soundtrack and some classic moments. Outlying messages are also positive: you may be an inarticulate, drugged-up freak, but you can still get a girlfriend like Natalie Portman. (7) Mike Brookes

#### The Company of Wolves

Theatre Group @ **Riley Smith Hall** October 28-30

Modernisation of classic fairy tale

The first student led theatre production of thin year was a stage adaptation of Angela Carter's The Company of Wolves, her famous revision of the story of Little Red Riding Hood. The revised story resounds with Carter's distinctive and personalised style of the corruption of childhood fantasy by adult experience, this production in particular confronting the transformations of puberty, symbolic loss of innocence and sexual awaken-

ing.

The production also benefited from an impressive set loaded with evocative imagery, the mystery of the shadow casting trees being coupled with an implied phallic substitution to give the central 'wood' area of the stage a relevant double meaning. The division of the stage into three separate territories, each dominated by a group of characters, restating the division and ambiguity present in the text. The Narrator (Brodie Ross) and Granny (Rosie Tooby) became overbearing in their roles as joint storytellers, tactically placed at opposite sides of the stage to promote the dualism of the storyline and characterisation. An effective layering of imagery was present in the per formance also, most notably the colour red and the mention of blood, which represented both the predatory violence of the character of the wolf and the transition of Red Riding Hood from an impressionable infant through puberty to her sexual realisation and empow

erment in the final scene.

The most affecting performances came from Francesca Martin's Red Riding Hood and Sam Ward's Wolf, between them developing an uneasy stage chemistry making the viewer by various degrees uncomfortable (as with Red Riding Hood's characterisation both as an innocent child and a sexually dominant woman), derisive and ultimately sympathetic of each character's physical urges and weaknesses. The final scene in which Red Riding Hood becomes empowered by her own sexuality shows a triumphant shift of the traditional power relationship between herself and the Wolf: in effect she becomes the hunter from the traditional fairy tale in that it is she who seizes the masculine power from the Wolf, not, however, by the use of an axe, but by her own femininity. A very timely and impressive re-assessment of the established tale. (8) Richard Woolley



### The Grudge



Starring: Sarah Michelle Gellar, Jason Behr + Bill Pullman

US remake of the Japanese cult horror hit about a vengeful curse

It's difficult to see why Ju-On was specifically chosen for such a high profile remake since it was one of the many films to try to follow in the footsteps of the internationally renowned Ringu, and was widely regarded to be a sub-standard imitation. There is, perhaps, room for a franchise here although it is doubtful Sam Raimi would risk sullying his good name for a few fast bucks. He clearly saw potential in the idea and so kept the director and much of the crew of the original on board to make an English language version so Western audi ences could better appreciate it.

The plot is similar to that of the original, and tells the story of a powerful curse born in a house, a curse that stalks and kills all those that have crossed its threshold. Yet for some reason, scary pale-faced children are once more the chosen medium for almost all the shocks. That's not to say The Grudge isn't frightening as there are some very tense moments, but it feels like a tired formula. How many times do we need to see a character hear a strange noise and explore it over-zealously only to get their jaw ripped off? Some scenes are very chilling though, such as when the curse stalks a girl all the way from her workplace to her apartment, culminating in her getting snatched from underneath her duvet. This exemplifies what The Grudge does well, in that it avoids the usual spooky settings and tries to integrate everyday things with the terror it portrays, such a sitting on a bus in broad daylight, or talking on the phone.

The script and characters are utterly

humourless which leaves little room for



sympathy as one by one they perish at the hands of this seemingly unstoppable force, unstoppable enough for a sequel anyway. Sarah Michelle Gellar has little to work with, although she does very well at looking terrified.

The film's fragmented structure tries to keep the pace up by constantly jumping back and forth through time, telling the story from parallel points of view, but ultimately isn't enough to save The Grudge from being anything other that your run-of-the-mill, seen-it-all-before horror film, albeit a well executed one. 

The DC universe has been evolving since 1935 and is inhabited by some of the most famous characters in the world today. Whereas their rival, Marvel Comics, gave us more recognisably human superheroes with flaws and private lives, DC gave us icons: Superman, Batman, Wonder Woman, Green Lantern...these are the gods of twentieth-century pop culture. In this book there are entries for

over a thousand characters from the big names to the cowboy heroes of the sixties and seventies (when the genre was still in vogue) and the dark fantasy characters of the nineties imprint, Vertigo, such as John



Constantine and Neil Gaiman's Sandman. All of these creations supposedly exist in the same fictional world and you can spend hours flicking through the pages seeing who is related to/ once had a relationship with/ killed each other in a parallel

dimension. It's great fun looking for the most obscure and absurd character possible (the best I could come up with was Angle Man whose special powers are provided by "a magical set square"). There are also features on the most important characters and themes like "Amazing Weapons",
"Alien Races", "Romantic Moments" and "Strange Times and Places" (my favourite of which is Frank Miller's Dark Knight Returns in which an ageing and fascist Batman tries to impose order on Gotham City).

The one thing the book struggles with is trying to make sense of over sixty years of continuity: anyone who has studied mythology knows that the stories of King Camelot, Troy or Asgard are not neat and tidy. There are different versions and interpreta tions and it is better to sit these aside each other rather than trying to forge them into one monolithic version. Unfortunately this book takes the latter approach with DC's mythology and the result is absurdly convoluted.

But forget that. It's big, shiny and has amazing cover art by the excellent Alex Ross. If there's a comic geek in your life who you love enough to shell out 30 quid for then this is the perfect birthday present. They will love you forever and then happily dis appear into their room for the next few months incapable of any conversation more important than whether Alan Scott or Hal Jordan was the better Green Lantern... #### The Rainhow Maker

Self-proclaimed controversial political thriller which never quite lives up to its own press

Arnold, Margaret, and Richter are government scientists, carrying out mysterious experiments on primates in the depths of the Surrey countryside. Zac is a Gulf War veteran turned construction worker. Elliot is the filthy rich and morally bankrupt owner of a London-based financial services company. Antonio is his protégé. These are the main characters of *The Rainbow Maker*, the not particularly inspiring first novel of

The book fits in perfectly with the current zeitgeist, relating as it does a sinister government plot to turn the inhabitants of London into savage killing machines. Using a vial of a highly toxic substance called Thimos', the authorities launch 'Operation Black Cloud', a rather extreme type of urban regeneration project, which sees the inhabitants of the 'cradle of democracy' (sic) tearing each other limb from limb in a most undignified manner. The problem, you see, is that London has become over-polluted, over-populat-ed, and full of nasty foreigners that need exterminating. But how can the government expect to get away with such wickedness? By blaming it all on the terrorists, of course.

The press release provided by the publisher breathlessly claims that "The publication of The Rainbow Maker is currently in doubt due to concerns of political interfer-ence". This is a rather sorry attempt

at sensationalising a novel that is very unlikely to make the political establishment turn its attention away from the pressing affairs of state for even a fraction of a millisecond.

Despite all its blood and guts and horrible disfigurement, the book is nowhere near as controversial as its promoter claims, for we are living in the Age of Nightmares, a time of television programmes bearing such titles as 'What If...' and 'Dirty War', whose stock-in-trade is to prey on our media-enhanced fears of societal decay and nuclear/chemical/biological attack, a method that serves the wielders of power (a.k.a HMG) extremely well. It is population control of the most insidious kind (a fact admirably demonstrated by the BBC2 documentary 'The Power of Nightmares').

This would not be too much of an issue if the book was well-written. Unfortunately it isn't. At best it is competently written but, in many places, it reads like an end-of-year project for a Creative Writing course. Great literature it ain't. The author seems to recognise this himself: his profile tellingly states that 'He is determined to squeeze as much success from [writing] as his potential will allow'. The book has very few intrinsic merits, but I wouldn't be at all surprised if The Rainbow Maker turned up as a telly film one day. It would be a great vehicle for Ross Kemp. (6) Natasha Hurley

A stylish thriller about money, love and...er...taxes


Quiz time. Which of the following statements is true?

a) The main character in this book is an Inland Revenue tax inspector. b) This is an intriguing and original

The answer is both. Strange but true. So how on earth do you write a thriller about a tax inspector? Not an obvious choice of protagonist I am sure you will agree. A bit like writing a romance featuring a mortgage broker. So it was with trepidation that I began reading The Cryptographer.
Anna Moore is a tax inspector and

she is assigned the project of investigating the finances of John Law. Law is a multi-billionaire who has made his fortune through inventing an unbreakable code that enables him to create a virtual online 'electronic currency'- it's money, but not as we know it, Jim. Anna deduces that there is more to be discovered about the enigmatic cryptographer than mere numbers suggest, and gradually becomes involved with him and his family on a more than professional level. Admittedly, Anna is not the character in whom the strengths of this book lie. She is a rather stereotypical 'career woman,' professionally successful but living alone in her mid-thirties with only her cat and a pile of takeaway cartons for company. A bit like Miranda from Sex and the City. If she was a tax inspector.

It is the money man who really keeps you turning the pages. For the same reasons that Sunday Times' Rich List fascinates us ordinary folk, Law is a fascinating character. We want to be able imagine his unimaginable wealth,



and to explore his private areas, as it were. Hill guides us through John Law's enormous estate where climate control means it can always be springtime, offering us a tantalising insight into the life of someone very rich and reluctantly

Not only does the novel appeal to our trashy Hello!-reading sentimentalities, but also to our philosophical sides. If money is the root of all evil, and John Law is the root of all money, is he the devil incarnate? Or is he a mere vehicle for the greed of humankind? Questions, questions.

Hill never allows us to feel totally certain about the motives or feelings of any character. The characters themselves appear muddled in the confusions that wealth and desire bring, lending the novel an unsettling yet realistic tone. The visual details of a grey London in winter also convey the atmosphere of foreboding, of a bomb about to explode, that permeates every page of the book. A novel that asks more questions than it answers, *The Cryptographer* is original in a way that thrillers rarely are. Whoever would of thought that being a tax inspector could be so thrilling? #### **Arthur: King of** the Britons

Attempting to unravel the mystery of the legendary king

The questions 'who was Arthur?', and 'did he ever really exist?' govern Mersey's troublesome exploration of an iconic figure whose existence so intertwined with myth, legend and folklore that there are no concrete answers available. If you require an in-depth study of Arthurian legend suitable for the expert reader then this is not for you. Instead this is an introductory approach to the immense field of knowledge surrounding King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table.

This is an exploration which delves into the geographical and cultural aspects of life in the Dark Ages to question the reliability of the very few historical accounts which each claim an Arthur of their own. The 'search' for Arthur reveals a British history of incessant invasion, (from Romans, Saxons, Picts, Scots and the Irish), bloody battles and countless toppled kingdoms, dividing yet eventually uniting the British Isles and at the same time culturally and geographically altering it. It is no wonder that historians are at a loss to pinpoint the exact events of Arthur's life since no two sources agree and not one can be relied upon to have been written without political bias.

Mersey, interestingly - and quite rightly in my view- avoids the historian's need to distinguish between fact and fiction by delivering a book that studies Arthurian legend through poetry and folklore as well as historical documentation. And as such, we have Arthurian tales of magic and monsters, romance and chivalry as well as those written in a more realistic vein. For film buffs, the book also discusses different representations of Arthur in film, which is how many of us will have first learnt of his story. Emphasis is placed in the book on the many different



aspects of Arthur, to all people he meant some-thing different, and still does today.

Although purposely written and organised in a stylistically simple manner (i.e. with headings) in order to comply with the introductory func-tion of the book, Mersey rather lowers the sta-tus of the book with his trite and out of place modern examples to explain 5th-century events: he attempts to describe the 'spin off' stories of Medieval writers by using 'Grange Hill' and 'Buffy The Vampire Slayer' as examples! Yet despite the cringey modern-day comparisons of Medieval society, the book is an enjoyable and engaging read by an author whose research into the mysterious Arthur was clearly extensive. More importantly, it is written in such a way as to be wholly accessible to audiences of all ages, who would otherwise be ignorant of Briton's darker ages in the times of Arthur. (7)

**A-Ha Shake Heartbreak** (Sony)

Songs about fighting, loving and fucking. Original

Thousands of copies of your debut album have sold worldwide, the critics like you, the fans love you, and you're raking it in like Hallmark on Valentines Day. What's next? Well first of all you spend a good year partying, drinking, touring and generally living the fast life. Then you make the record about it all. Simple right? Well no, but Kings of Leon make it look that way.

A-Ha Shake Heartbreak is the story of the Kings' life since their rise to fame, and the lyrics are revealing, heartfelt and much grittier than we've heard before. In their own words 'We've got some songs about fighting and some songs about loving and some songs about fucking.

I can assure you this is no empty statement. A-Ha Shake Heartbreak is a natural progression as their sound becomes much faster, dirtier, and harder. This comes together in a piece of blues rock with a feeling of urgency and rhythm running throughout; with quicker, tougher drumbeats and slightly heavier, more aggressive guitar sounds. 'Four Kicks', in particular, delivers a pounding piece of quality at a point when many albums trail off into acoustic rubbish. Current single 'The Bucket' is one of the many highlights of the album, but by no means is it all this record has to offer.

There's a lot of quality to be found here; - 'Velvet Snow carries on the fast-paced thumping of 'Four Kicks' with a cleverly written lyrical tone that accompanies a beautifully strum-infested chorus and ballad-like verse. This isn't to say that the

boys have forgotten about their roots, or the unique style that got them here in the first place; - there's still a lot of melody and emotion in this album. The improvised, naked sound of 'Milk' balances against the more aggressive songs in the bands new repertoire, whereas the perfectly varied 'Soft' reminds you of the up-and-down style of Youth and Young Manhood. Ok. The Research are, shock horror, a mildly successful West Yorkshire band with the genuine subtleties to make you actually care. That they've enjoyed radio play on Zane Lowe's Radio 1 show in recent weeks is as refreshing as it is intriguing, especially considering their unusual approach; - their frontman, Russell 'the Disaster', is permanently beseated on a stool, balancing a curious old keyboard, and permanently wearing a baseball cap. Of course, this week will become remembered as the one where every live music venue in Leeds gave its tribute to John Peel. However, for the Research, introducing a song he actually once played on a show, it seems all the more poignant. And is something you probably can't claim if you're Black Wire.

Black Wire.

Their sound is, without doubt, unique. No guitars, but songs bouncing along on the back of buoyant keyboard riffs, with three-part harmonies doing the work along with the rolling melodies and bittersweet lyrics. Single release 'She's Not Leaving' is the prime example, but with changes of pace like the gentle 'Love Me Tender' to sustain the set there is sufficient variation to negate any accusations that it is the novelty of their set-up that takes musical precedence.

It's a genuinely accessible approach to lo-fipop; - with their flimsy looking old Casio and fragile vocals it could all end up sounding rather childlike, but instead of amateurish read all the more personal. Although Russell may lead the banter, with drummer Sarah and bassist Georgia sharing vocal duties and equally forefront in the stage set, they're a triple-fronted band and all the more approachable for it. Apart from the infectious pop moments, this open approach seems an invitation to share

their vulnerability. With a lyrical refrain as candid as "it's not that I don't love you/ I'm just scared of fucking up" it's impossible to know whether to laugh, cry, or just mix them both and grin like a child In a time of the disposable set against the astute, such playful yet eloquent lyrical and musical endeavour sets the Research apart as a band with a genuine, sustainable, appeal. They have no need to be made up, trussed up and appear on the front of Dazed & Confused. Instead, Leeds has an almost fully-formed popband with, at last, tunes and appeal that precede, rather than pursue, the hype. (8)

Silly-named man makes schizophrenic album

Rocky Votolato may well be the most relevant political artist you have never heard of. Which is a shame. When he's not singing vomit induc ing odes to the American landscape in 'Montana', he actually presents himself as a lyrical diplomat who appears to have stepped outside the insular media box of America to look at the world's political climate from a purely objective view. He approaches his find-

ings through aggressive, sung-through-gritted-teeth, acoustic strummings that make him sound like he smoked Damien Rice in a roll-up and got high from the fumes of melancholy.

Whilst listening to this album he does nothing to disprove the feeling that the title Suicide Medicine is ironic. If anything the songs confront the listener with such a bleak worldview that the fifth floor window starts to look like a comforting escape from an impending apoca-

lypse.

The eponymous track is one of the only upbeat contributions to the album and keeps its promise of making you want to live life, cheekily adding "if you buy this/l promise you're gonna like the way it makes you feel" But that is where Rocky's main problem lies. Just two tracks in he has already made the promise of joyous songs that celebrate your very existence but by track four he is already warning that "even a smart girl can end up with a bomb strapped to her chest". The album is littered with jarring transitions between moods and it never really decides to what extent the title is ironic. It seems at times that he has made two albums and crafted it around his thirteen-track allotment, yet it should be noted that the socio-political album is far superior to his teen-angst blub-fest effort. If you need proof of this then skip straight to 'Prison is Private Property' and realise that yes, there is still such a thing as challenging music that isn't just a three minute

While he may not have the superstardom that allows him the political clout of his contemporaries (here's looking at you, Morrissey), Rocky uses this album to speak to those open to his opinions and makes them listen to his message that "inaction acts as a blade across the throat". But this could just be his way of inciting your action of going out and buy-ing his album. Just don't expect him to keep his promise of your liking the way you will feel. (7)



Me and Simon have the biggest C & D-list brit-pop band knowledge out of anybody. If you could do that on Mastermind we'd clear them out. We used to go and see these bands and it was the most amazing thing if the bass player from Smash signed your ticket. Meeting these people and hearing their views of the music or the state of the world today is interesting. It's more interesting than being sat around just with people you know in a backstage room or a bus and doing cocaine. It's fucking boring.

Is that why you make an effort with your CD packaging as well?

Sam: Yeah, you work on a record for however many years, I mean we spent 8 months non-stop working on our record, to do just turn around at the end of it and say 'It's all about iust music, man' Simon: A photo of us on the front,

Sam: Yeah it's just, don't you have any imagination in your bones? When I buy a record and it has good packing, stuff to look at, it means something. Packaging is an expensive thing, and all that comes out of our money. Yeah, we could just release our records in the equivalent of a McDonald's burger-wrapper, what's that going to mean to anybody? # Something Incredible this way comes

With the cinema release of *The Incredibles* imminent, Themis Bakas met creator Brad Bird, an ex-Simpsons collaborator and current Pixar wizard, to talk about his magnum opus

Pixar's past

winning Pixar Animation
Studios has established itself as the number one producer of computer-animated leatures, responsible for five of the most successful and acclaimed animated films of all time: the Oscar winner Toy Story (1995); A Bug's Life (1998); Golden Globe winner Toy Story 2 (1999); Oscar winner Monsters Inc.; and Oscar nominee Finding Nemo (2003) which is the highest grossing animated film of all time. The Incaedibles is set to break that record with Cars following in 2005, set to be Pixar's final association with Disney as they go salo.

Toy Story set the standard for computer animations and was the culmination of nine years of development. Featuring voices provided by Tom Hanks and Tim Allen, Toy Story became the highest grossing

film of 1995 and earned director and Pixar founding member John Lasseter a Special Achievement Oscar for his 'inspired leadership of the Pixar Tay Story team resulting in the first feature-length computer-animated film.' High praise indeed

Lasseter also co-directed and co-wrote Pixar's next two features, A Bug's Life and Toy Story 2, which was originally scheduled for a straight to video release until early test scenes caused so much excitement that Pixar redeveloped it into a full cinema release. Not only was it the first sequel for Tom Hanks and Tim Allen, neither of whom had been in one before, but is also a rarity in that it is arguable superior to its predecessor. The critically acclaimed Monsters Inc. came next which, apart from The Incredibles and Finding Nema, is the only Pixar short or feature not directed by


John Lasseter. Finding Nemo came next and, despite being the most children orientated of them all, smashed box office records worldwide and is the ninth highest grossing film of all time.

As well as revolutionising the world of feature-length computer animations, Pixar has produced a number of award winning short films including the famous Oscar nominee Luxo Jr., which features a pair of hopping lamps playing with a ball, an image that was incorporated as part of Pixar's now world famous logo. Amongst the other shorts Pixar have produced, Oscar winner Geri's Game is the most celebrated. It featured an old man playing chess against himself and transformed the way skin and cloth were animated forever, incorporating by far the most realistic rendering ever seen in a computer animation.

The script is humorous and makes a number of sharp, self-knowing observations about superheroes and action films in general. A montage showing the dangers of wearing a cape stands out, as does the character of Edna Mode, a superhero costume designer cum scientist voiced by Brad Bird himself. The jokes are refreshingly subtle and never feel tacked on, and are propelled by flawless, high-octane action makes The Incredibles one of the cleverest, with tiest and prettiest animations ever made as well as being one of the most human. he good, honest sta-ples of variety, talent and game shows have been entertaining the masses from the dawn of the television era and these ghosts of Saturday night TV past perpetually haunt the schedules. Recognisable formats are reworked to ever glossier extremes and return to our screens year upon year, all singing, all danc-ing and all with as much substance as Kate Thornton's stage presence.

On BBC1 such ghosts are exercised rather than exorcised as Strictly Come Dancing resurrects the concept of the televised dance-off, pepping it up with famous gardeners and moonlighting news presenters. A cryogenically preserved Bruce Forsyth solemnly oversees proceedings as mute midtable celebrities wearing Kat Slater cosmetics and see through skirts throw themselves into synchronised swimming on dry land. Gracefully executed athletics hasn't been afforded such primetime

reverence since Paris Hilton brought bedroom gymnastics to the mass market. Yet this is so wholesome that it supposes there is nothing slightly un-settling watching Carol Vorderman in nude-effect peach taffeta flinging her legs around a man half her age. The irony of contestant Julian Clary playing it straight in the campest show you could create is definitive of this hollow, humourless affair. Here, the imminent doom of being sent home by the judges is treated with the same degree of gravity as a vote to send more troops to Iraq. Its more than a little worrying that 7.8 million viewers are probably more interested in the outcome of the for-Going head to head

with Strictly Come Dancing yet setting an entirely polarised pace is Ant and Dec's Saturday Night Takeaway, which is so over-energised it results in a nasty case of televisual indigestion. In Takeaway, we witness the

scattering of the ashes of Noel's House Party, performed by two hammy old luvvies masquerading as cheeky Geordies in dinner jackets. These veterans of the business shamelessly flog formulaic lame autocue humour like professionals and shamelessly repeat revised versions of Edmonds' staples 'Gotcha Oscars' and 'Wait 'til I Get

You Home' The baffling paradox being that the show is unimaginative, unfunny and yet incredibly popular Every pause for breath invites such fervoured whooping and bingo-wing flapping from the studio audience it's as if they've been hosed down with liquid ecstasy on the way in. The unfathomable draw for them presumably being their innate affinity with nutritionally dubious take aways, the snack of choice for a truly British Saturday night. After all, what better to whet your appetite for the thrilling dénouement to the evening's X-Factor action? This week we witnessed housewife Verity's dreams of funding a course of HRT through a pop career cruelly dashed as her blatant lack of the Xfactor was spelled out via phone poll. However, that the fat, the ugly and the old are teased with the possibility that they are anything but is not the main draw of the program.

Mercifully this show has located a more entertaining hook than the sorry tales of imminently forgettable losers by placing the dynamic of the three judges at the heart of the operation. It's evolved the genre to the next level and this is what gives the X-Factor formula longevity in both the music industry and in the schedules. Like all Saturday night TV the key to its success is the operation of a 'one in, one out' revolving door policy, continually re-inventing the same wheel forever

Over at the all-you-caneat Saturday night take-away, our nation shows no sign of losing its appetite for more and in the corner Ant 'n' Dec wipe the grease from their chins with a wad of cash.

# **DO YOU REMEMBER**

#### No.7 -**Gladiators**

**Genre:** No single genre can contain the arena-sized insanity that was *Gladiators*. Best described as an action sports event game show, Gladiators first appeared on our screen in 1992. Back in the days before "reality television", it was quite popular to have programmes where the public competed against the show itself, not just against each other. See also Treasure Hunt, Knightmare, Crystal Maze...an idea that sadly only remains with us in the underwhelming form of

**Premise:** Ultra-fit members of the public pitted themselves against rock-hard professionals in a series of gruelling, if not downright bizarre, physical events. Hosted by a pre-credibility Ulrika Johnson and early-90s footballing legend John Fashanu.

**Events:** Some were really good, like Duel, in which contestant and gladiator stood on raised platforms and hit each other with inflatable "pugil sticks", and Atlaspheres, which had contestants racing around in huge wire-mesh hamster balls to score points. Others, like Hang Tough, which involved navigating a massive grid of suspended metal rings, or Swingshot, in which contestants had to bungee their way to depositing foam balls into a big bas-

The Gladiators: Had names like Wolf, Hunter, Nightshade, Shadow or Cobra. Very few managed to pro-ject either sex appeal or character through their spandex gear, and those that did were minor celebrities and instant pantomime fodder. Indeed, I once saw Lightning playing the fairy godmother in Cinderella. And I saw schoolboy pin-up Jet switching on the Christmas lights in Shrewsbury one year, but by then her career was on the slide faster than a knackered contestant falling down the Travelator in the show's assault course final round.

Contestants: PE teachers, fitness fanatics, firemen, exforces types, national judo champions...mostly fools then, but how much more noble to win this outlandish contest of physical prowess than to win *Big Brother?* Kelly Holmes was a contestant in series one. Keeping the Olympic flame alive, Sharron Davies was gladiator Amazon in series five.

Theme tune: "Can you feel the power of the Glaaaadiaaators? Do you have the strength, the speed, the heart to be a winner / It's not for beginners / Deep down in your soul". There was also a *Gladiators* rap—"Titan, Saracen, Hercules / They got nothin on the Gladiators' expertise"—that was released as a single, but fared about as well as "Slam Jam" by the WWF

Notes: Gladiators was held in Birmingham's National Indoor Arena; tickets to filming were a special birthday treat for 9-year-old boys everywhere. Possibly introduced the big foam hand to British shores in the shape of the Glad-Hand". Queen's We Will Rock You was abused continuously, of course.

If it was a cake: A Christmas cake. A really fancily decorated one, which poses a number of challenges to hungry participants

— Will I break a tooth on the icing? Can I chew through the marzipan? Do I have a nut aller-gy? – to impressive effect in a family-friendly package.

e salute you, ITV, for three consecutive weeks of fun, frivolous Wednesday night films: Die Another Day, American Pie 2 and this week About A Boy. However that is about all we salute. Advert breaks are slightly annoying, but at least they leave an opportuni ty to grab refreshments and discuss the plot. Interruptions for thirty minute news bulletins are simply ridiculous especially when there is only half an hour of film left, but they do provide a dose of current affairs. Unforgivably infuriating is the 'hello moto' movie premiere sponsorship. Once lodged inside the brain, 'hello moto' repeats incessantly like a broken record.

About A Boy is, funnily enough, about a boy. Unique among romantic comedies, both sexes can relate to this film version of Nick Hornby's best selling novel. The story charts the lives of idle playboy Will (Hugh Grant) and adolescent loner Marcus (Nicholas Hoult). Will is rich and handsome but desperately lonely. Marcus is the somewhat wayward child of a suicidal single mother. Their surprising friendship changes their views on life, love and happi-ness. It's a revealing tale of self understanding and role reversal

Grant clips his hair as well as his vowels for a believable and engaging performance. Hoult is convince ingly self-dependent and resists the trap of making Marcus overly likable. The film's wit and amusement comes courtesy of deft and understated directing from the Weitz brothers, who also brought us American Pie. A delicate balance of funny and moving, this is both an endearing examination of masculinity and a challenge to male isolation-







The next four years of Bush will be similar to the last. The result will be of particular interest to you in Britain as we have flicked our nose at the rest of the world. Bush has advocated a 'consequences-be-damned' foreign policy and domestically, there has been a widening of the gap between corporate America and the working class poor.

"Kerry, in short promised the opposite. He would have re-established our links with our allies abroad and at least made an attempt to level the playing field at home and reverse the downward spiral of unemployment.

#### Jean Robert Lafortune **Haitian-American Grassroots Association**

Nonpartisan organization concerned with getting Haitian Americans to take part in the democratic process.

'After the election fiasco in 2000, many Haitian voters were victims of voter intimidation. Many of them were firsttime voters. The election department did not provide adequate assistance. Haitian Americans have limited English proficiency. The Justice Department ende up suing the ocal government of Miami County after the 2000 election because of its failure to guarantee fair elections

"During early voting in Florida last week, a Republican operative issued a challenge to a Haitian voter, which result-ed in a precinct being closed for ninety minues: many people were upset: they had already been queuing for two hours, and just went home without casrting their vote. This tactic constitutes an infringement of people's right to vote. We at the Haitian-American Grassroots Coalition mobilize community leaders to go to voting precincts in order to show that Haitian Americans have support. Many Haitian voters went to the polls for the first time on Tuesday. This is partly because there are more Haitians arriving in the US and partly because more are becoming US citizens: in 1996, a change in federal law about eligibility for certain benefits made it more desirable to become a US citizen so there has been an increase in applications for citizenship.

#### **Ron Robinson Young America's Foundation**

"What do we have to look forward to? Certainly we will see continued vigorous pursuit of the war on terror and most likely, continued tax reductions. For young people Bush will provide an excellent chance to control people's own retirement: currently funds are controlled by the social security system, a system which has comprehensively failed

"Kerry's case was always confusing. There is a tenden-cy in American politics for Democrats to promise tax reductions (as with Clinton and yet he increased taxes). He promised to prosecute the War on Terror, but he would probably have not kept his word.

"What has damaged the US economy is not the war on terror per se but Bill Clinton's policies, which culminated in 9/11. Apart from the \$50bn and the numerous lives that have been lost since 9/11, the US economy has slowed down by not keeping security systems up to speed. An example of this is in the recruitment of extra staff in airports. Because of the previous 8 years (under Clinton), perhaps 12 years (under Bush Snr), we have ended up fighting a defensive war against terror because we allowed our intelligence

"Kerry would have not addresssed this problem. We would have had more government, less defence and less

"Kerry's case was always confusing. He would have given us more government and less defence, less security"

I think the British Foreign Office Diplomat said best when he said that: "Bush is the best al-Qaida recruitment officer they've ever had"

The difference between the two Presidential candidates was more marked than it had been for a long time but they would both have worked to protect American interests in whatever form they found appropriate. If Kerry had won, it would have sent a massive message to the rest of the world that the American people were aware of the impact and damage that Bush has done. Although there is no domestic difference, the perceived difference is significant.

## The people decide

At least this time Bush won the popular vote. Investigating the system that put him in power, Gareth Huntley plots some pitfalls in the world's 'greatest democracy'

2000, controversy arose when a deliberate purge of innocent voters was revealed. Felons are not allowed to vote and many people were incorrectly and deliberately included on the convicted felon lists drawn up by Republican party officials. Mostly African American, they were likely to vote Democrat. Combined with faulty machines, up to 48,000 votes, enough to reverse the outcome, were discounted.

People for the American Way, a nonpartisan civil liberties organization, alleges similar attempts occured in Florida this time. They accuse Jeb Bush, brother of George and governor of Florida, of again deliberately pushing the use of flawed purge lists. The attempt was exposed and subsequently blocked. Calls for investigations have so far been

ignored by the White House. Commenting in the Washington Post, Jimmy Carter remarked that 'basic international requirements for a fair election are still missing in Florida'

Up to four million voters were effectively disenfranchised in the 2000 election according to top US university, M.I.T. Poorly designed ballots and faulty equipment along with shenanigans like those that took place in Florida were blamed. The passing of the 'Help America Vote Act' in 2002 represents the

official attempt to resolve these issues.

Carter believes that election officials, due to their partisan nature, have deliberately hindered meaningful reforms towards standardization and fairness. He criticized the Federal system that gives political parties an important say in designing election procedures. The US stands alone as the only established democracy where non-neutrals organize

parties to register people have led to allegations of fraud from both sides. To counter this, Republican party officials used voter challengers inside poling stations to weed out potential fraud.

Laurie Bader, Spokesperson for People for the American Way, told Leeds

'In the past, such challenges have been proven in the court to be racially motivated, which is against Federal law. The problem is that after the election is over, the damage is done'

Signs already point to this, with challengers being placed in majority democrat areas. Critics believe their purpose was voter intimidation, causing long delays and effectively deterring voters.


Through fear of large scale foul play, civil liberties organizations mobilized armies of volunteers. People for the American way placed 25,000 monitors in polling stations whilst Michael Moore organized over 1,200 people to film the proceedings in the hope of averting irreg-

The list of voting irregularities is long. Polling stations were moved at the last minute and disinformation campaigns were waged around the country. Posters were displayed giving deliberately mis leading statements. Full details are available at www.pfaw.org.

New electronic voting machines have also brought concern. During advanced voting, pressing the enter key at the wrong moment resulted in several machines switching votes from Kerry to Bush. The system, designed by a company with strong Republican links, has been criticized for vulnerability to hacking and

This time the victory was clear. The will repeat in the future.



## 'Kerry's beat but we'll fight on'

Issam Ahmed talks to Imad Ahmed of Berkeley about political activism, the ideological divisions of the nation and his experiences on the funding trail



One of the key features of this election has been the record voter turnout and the rise of the so-called grassroots movement that involves citizens at their local level. reversing a trend of anathy and decline that has gone on 40 years.

Americans have been stung into action over a range of issues: from homeland security and Iraq, to issues closer to home like the economy and moral questions such as the right to gay marriage

Thousands have volunteered across the country to assist in campaign efforts people from different backgrounds and walks of life coming together with shared ideals and goals. Their tireless efforts behind the scenes, going door-to-door, fundraising, and increasing awareness became the backbone of the election and point to a new social movement that is taking hold.

Leeds Student caught up with Imad Ahmed, Assistant Director of Fundraising at Berkeley, CA shortly after his mission to the potential swing state of Missouri.

What have the past few months been like? Talk me through a typical day in the life of a grassroots

Well, my experience [here] in Missouri has been very different from my experience in California. In California you're preaching to the choir, you're looking for your supporters - that's who we're fund raising from. Our office as a whole had a high morale, we tried to put the 'Bush winning' scenario at the back of our mind. We concentrated on what we were there to do - raise money for the Democrats and that's done when you have a good attitude. So a lot of friendships, strong friendships were made in the process...we were often up till, 2, 3, 5 am [at the office] at the night time then roll back in the morning.

The reason why our office was as power fully successful as it was, having raised \$1m in 5 months from the community just from face to face interactions was because people wanted to come in every day and work their guts out.

There were a diversity of backgrounds. People had different life experiences, people had given up their jobs-journalists, people who had graduated from grad school and not taken up opportunities. During the summer a lot of college students worked for us; after the summer, a lot of college graduates wereworking for us just based upon their prinHow have people been respond-

The response has been supportive -Berkeley has been one of the most supportive communities. People in Berkeley knew their vote was not going to sway this election - California was set for Kerry a long time ago, it's not been a swing state since Ronald Reagan. So they knew that [...] in order to accomplish what they wanted, they had to do more than vote, they had to contribute money to the Democrats so that we could do the groundwork of the campaign in the swing

#### And the worst experience?

Well, getting bitten by a dog when canvassing! But I think maybe my worst experience was yesterday [...] I was at the polls and I was asking people for their addresses so that we could we cross them off our lists so that we didn't have to knock at their door or phone them up to remind them to vote or offer to drive them to the polls to make sure that they voted.

And obviously that's not a scientific way to know whom we were talking to. So we were asking everyone to give us their addresses. I asked a Republican, he claimed I was following him, he got very verbally abusive and threatened to "Rip my f\*\*king head off'. I called the police and the policeman was actually not very professional - he told me incorrect infor mation - he shouted at me and told me I could get arrested if I asked someone for their address twice. Which was blatantly untrue. So I mean, it was a very contentious race, people's emotions were running high, and people do get mean.

Obviously the Republicans have to galvanise the managed Evangelical Right into action, more successfully than Democrats have been able to get out their supporters - minorities and young people. Do you think this points to an underlying trend? Has America moved so far to the Right that it's impossible for the Left to produce a successful, populist candidate?

This is a time for us to reflect on that. If you look at the coasts, and you look at Middle America, there is a deep cultural divide. It's almost like there's two different nations in existence. We DO have progressives even in those middle states and that's been a good experience for me to find out first hand that we do have people who listen to reliable sources of news and are educated and intellectually inquisitive. And they don't let their motives for voting be driven by some single issue based upon

I think that was something very clever of the republicans to put on the ballot - to put that proposition about whether there



should be gay marriage- that did bring a lot of evangelical Christians to the polls. That was very clever and that's what cost us a lot of votes- potentially the election.

Had that not been on the ballot, things would have looked very different. But I am very disappointed we didn't get more young people out. The Hispanic vote got split evenly, which is very surprising - we do try to reach out to Latino Americans.

And again there's a lot of voter intimidation - I spoke to an African American yesterday who was telling me he was told if he put his children in daycare and he went voting, he would be arrested. I have another friend in a swing state who was sent a letter that if it wasn't sunny on election day, she could vote on the next weekend. Which would obviously disenfranchise her. Our opponents have been using all kinds of scare tactics - they used them on Tuesday night.

#### Finally your thoughts on the future of the grassroots movement? Has it all been worth it?

It's definitely has been worth it. It has been a long time since the Left in America has come together in an alliance. We had people who are there for the environment, we had people there for women's right to choose, for the right of gay men and women to marry, for their brothers and sisters to be brought home from Iraq [...] I was there for the way that Muslims were treated in this country and the way that foreign policy was conducted. There were people there for Supreme Court nominations, or because they wanted America's respect in the world to be restored. People came for different reasons, different causes, it has definitely has been an alliance building past five months. Non-profit and progressive organisations are working together to have their voices heard and educate America. Obviously we didn't educate enough of America this time around. I think 53 per cent of the popular vote has gone to Bush, but 47 per cent of the population is at least educated.

When people abroad think of Americans being ignorant they should bear in mind that not everyone voted for GB, 47 per cent of people didn't.

## The politics of fear

Chris Gourlay and Tom Wilson analyse the ideology of the men who pull the strings in the Whitehouse

eorge Bush stands accused of cheating the electorate. His margin of victory this time was, of course, clear and indisputable But the key tenet of his campaign was a distriction of radiity campaign was a distortion of reality.

Like most of us in the West, Americans have come to believe in the insidious notion of a terrorist threat. Nurtured and promoted by ideologues, it is a fiction which has per-meated our subconscious and engendered the climate of fear without which Bush's re-election would have been impossible. It has anaesthetized our rationale, discarding the need for proof of existence in favour of elaborate, fictitious nightmares which make everyone, even the politicians who sustain them, believe in the urgent

need for our protection.

Bush is a war-time president charged with the protection of his people. In return for the votes, he guaranteed, he would protect America from hearn and lead the sentential hearn hearn and hearn he harm and lead the country on a brave conquest against evil, wherever it may lurk, fighting the terrorists in defence of the very freedom they seek to

But, as Bin Laden explained in his 'election broadcast' last week, if the terrorists sought to destroy freedom they would be attacking places like Sweden. But the Islamist fundamentalist's agenda is different. Like the neo-conservatives around Bush, they seek the moral regeneration of their people. For the Islamists, the notion of a menacing, Islam-hating enemy from the west has helped to rally Muslims behind their cause. In the US, the White House hawks engender a similar effect in their people by simply inverting this threat and pointing it at America. Those who buy the myth now hold the strong conviction that they have a unique role, a God-given duty, to fight a virtuous war against

But this is not a real war because the enemy is phantom; so much of it has been exaggerated or simply invented to serve the interests of two powerful groups of people not usually noted for their similarities. The attrocities of 9/11 and Madrid are not imag-ined of course but the notion of an organised network is.

The technique of public deception was born in the 1950s in response to what the neo-conservatives, led by Leo Strauss, saw as a morally decrepit and directionless American society. The white lies, they thought, would focus society and engender a renewed sense of moral purpose and aspiration. The international communist threat


was the first such lie. Portrayed as a vast and omnipotent network which sought to conquer the globe, the reality was that the USSR was decaying from within. But when it finally collapsed, both the neo-conservatives and the Islamists claimed that it was they who had defeated the 'evil empire'. In its wake, the search then began for a

n September 11, 2001 that new enemy was found. With a spectacular and terrifying debut, Al Qaeda was born.

Ironically, both groups of ideologues - motivated by the same concerns for the purity of their own societies - have been led to wage war against distorted conceptions of each other. Together, they created today's nightmare vision of an organised terror network, a fantasy that has restored their power and authority in a dicillusioned condisillusioned age.

Today's politics is the politics of fear. It is guided not by reason but by dark imaginations and in this climate, those with the darkest imaginations prevail to shape reality.

As the government in Washington settles back down for its next chapter of power, we can be sure of one thing. The neo-conservatives cherish their sinister enemies. As long as they help to provide the American people with a identity, defined in negatives against the terrorist evil, they will be staying.

#### In defence of Bush

Although he's demonised on this side of the pond, Bush isn't actually all that bad, argues Danny Edwards

ince President Bush took office in 2000, he has been the target of a smear campaign, whose exponents have often strayed far from the

The war in Iraq has been a contentious issue all over the world. Many people have argued that it was neither legal nor essential. These same people have joined in the smear campaign against Bush. However, according to the terms agreed at the end of the Gulf War, the peace between the United States and Iraq was nothing more than a cease-fire. The United States was within in its rights at any time to reengage militarily with him.

The war against Iraq was a pre-emp-tive war and it was the first of its kind. Intelligence is an uncertain business. The intelligence community's best guess was that Saddam could obtain a nuclear weapon around 2006. The war fits precisely with the doctrine of pre-emption that President Bush laid out in a speech at West Point in 2002. Senator Kerry also thought that the evidence against Saddam Hussein was compelling. He had access to the same intelligence as President Bush and he came to the same conclusion. Bush cannot be blamed for the fact that the intelligence he was provided with was

The smear campaign does not just target foreign policy. Many people believe

Bush has mishandled domestic policy as well. Yet soon after he came to power, President Bush submitted the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB). Since this passed into law, minority children have shown improved test scores and the achievement gap has narrowed. Despite this, people still believe that he does not

care about educating Americans.

Some people find it hard to believe that tax cuts can achieve anything other than an increase in the gap between rich and poor. Bush inherited a depressed economy. Smear campaigners choose to ignore this. They claim that by cutting taxes and increasing government spending, Bush is following Reaganis program of the 1980s. What they fail to mention is that the deficit caused by Reaganis tax cuts were followed by 92 consecutive months of economic growth and the doubling of the size of the US economy.

According to the data of the Conference Board, the business group that determines whether the economy is in recession, there was but one quarter of recession during Bush's first term. Despite the crippling effects of 9/11, the quarter following the attacks actually saw the US economy grow. At 5.4%, the unemployment rate is well below the average of the three previous decades. Real after-tax income is up more than 10% since President Bush took office. The national home ownership rate is at an all-time high at 69.2% in the second quar-

The deficit remains a stumbling block, but tax receipts are set to increase due to an expanding economy, and government spending has been reined in. Bush has promised to halve the deficit by the end of


The media is mainly to blame for the smear campaign against Bush. In his book Bias', CBS journalist Bernie Goldberg details how his news organisation and many others in USA slant their coverage while insisting that they are just reporting the facts. The Internet has also been very successful at spreading false rumours.

Opponents of Bush often distort the

truth. Despite what the pacifists want you to believe, the war was legal as defined by the agreement between USA and Iraq at the end of the First Persian Gulf War and the war was justified as Saddam remained in material breach of 17 UN Security Council resolutions. The USA is also justified in not ratifying the Kyoto Protocol given its own emission reductions outside of the agreement under the Clear Skies Act adopted in the USA.

George Bush best summed up his presidential style himself when he said: "The President's job is not to pass a global test. The President's job is to protect the American people"

Son of Star Wars' - a missile defence system, has been initiated by the presidency. It includes work on RAF Menwith Hill being used as part of an early warning radar. The project is a crucial part of the Pentagon's aim of 'total spectral domination', whose self-stated aim is to maintain US global supremacy: the 'Son of Starwars' seeks to guarantee supremacy in sky and

The Bush administration was influential in persuading Colonel Gaddafi of Libya to abandon his nuclear weapons programmes.

Over 5 million of the poorest Americans have lost their health insurance cover since Bush reformed the Medicare insurance system.

A constitutional amendment was advocated by Bush which would forbid same-sex marriage.

Bush has pledged to increase U.S. aid to developing nations by 50 per cent over the next 3 years, lifting it from its current status as least generous donor of the industrialised

In the most expensive election ever, Amy Lea highlights the role money plays in the race for the Whitehouse

n a system where the candidate who has the largest war chest has won in 90 per cent of elections, money appears to buy the key to the

It is estimated that in total, by November 2, the campaign to become President had cost over \$1.2 billion, with \$125 million spent in the last frenzied week of campaigning alone. This is unprecedented and shows a 30 per cent increase from the 2000 election according to the Centre for Responsive Politics. When the presidency is up for grabs, bucket loads of cash are required to compete on the main battleground, prime time television advertising.

The McCain-Feingold bill of 2002 was ironically aimed at capping elec-tion expenses. The most expensive election campaign ever is testimony that attempts to clean up the system have failed. In theory, the bill placed limits on amounts that can be donated directly to parties

The reality is that restrictions are




easily bypassed. For example, tax exempt '527' organizations, excluded from spending limits, are free to run advertising campaigns as long as they do not advocate voting for one party. They have been used extensively by supporters of both sides, notably to challenge Senator Kerry's credentials as a decorated Vietnam War veteran.

Where does all this money come from? Big Business contributions count for a large section of donations. Money also comes from special interest groups; support is given to the candidate who will best serve their interests once in power. Candidates dependence on money means that effectively, special favours can be bought. Recently, Disney's valuable copyright of the Mickey Mouse image should have expired. It is a good job that, as a loyal donor to the Republican Party, special legislation was rushed through protecting Mickey for eternity. Democrats are equally beholden to their 'friends' in big business. Effectively, money buys access

In this system of one person, one vote, it appears that some Americans are more equal than others.



Sainsbury has been disappointed at the lukewarm reception given to his approach from the board at Elland Road and claims they keep changing the conditions of the deal.

The 41-year-old businessman, who stood for Parliament in 1997, claims he offered a "non-refundable £500,000 deposit" to show his good

And he added: "We have confirmed to the board that the money is sitting in a bank ready to do the deal."

But Leeds are insistent they receive proof that Sainsbury's consortium has the whole £25m it needs to buy the club.

Wednesday night's 2-1 home defeat by Burnley compounded problems for United manager Kevin Blackwell, and he feels the uncertainty over the takeover is harming his players. "I hope something positive happens for Leeds - be it the takeover or leaving the board in place," he said.

The loss made it three league defeats in a row for the beleaguered Yorkshire club. Blackwell moaned: "The squad has been paper-thin from the beginning of the season.

"I've nowhere to go with the players. The club is paying more out in wages to players not available to me and to managers not managing here and that is the frustration.

"At the moment the expectations of the fans have to be met by somebody and yet I know we're in such a perilous state financially

The debts are massive, the wages have been cut but we're still in a situation where we're paying out £18m a

AFTER last season's relegation from the top division of the BUSA Lacrosse Championship, Leeds appear a rejuvenated


On Wednesday the girls followed up last weeks 36-0 mauling of York University with yet another convincing result, to leave them competitively unbeaten this season.

drian Mutu has been ordered to serve a sevenmonth ban from football by the Football Association disciplinary committee as a result of failing a drug test. The Romanian is the latest in a string of sportsmen to be handed a ban for drugs-related offences

The debate that arises from incidents like this is how severely punished the guilty party should be. England defender Rio Ferdinand recently completed an eightmonth period on the sidelines for failing to take a drugs test. The question is, which offence is worse? We know that Mutu definitely took a banned substance, as he has publicly admitted it. On the other hand, Ferdinand may have been innocent. However, if he had taken an illegal substance, hiding that fact is worse than admitting it.

So clearly it was a difficult decision for the FA to make. I think the main thing that they felt they must avoid was handing Mutu a ban longer than Ferdinand's. Had he been given a worse sentence than the Manchester United star, this would have encouraged guilty players to miss tests in the future.

Mutu's suspension is 'subject to completing a pro gramme of education and rehabilitation'. The 25-year-old was at Soho Square for the four-and-a-half hour hearing and has decided not to launch an appeal. Mutu's behaviour since failing the test has been good and certainly counted in his favour when the ban was decided upon. He admitted he was guilty and has already booked into a rehabilitation programme.

The Romanian skipper cost Chelsea £15.8m from Parma last season, but the Blues chose to write off any possible transfer fee by sacking the striker. The London club have made it clear that they have a zero-tolerance policy towards drugs, both performance-enhancing and so-called 'recreational' drugs

pinion on Chelsea's actions has been mixed, but personally back their decision. Writing off such a transfer fee shows how serious they are about their policy. We aren't talking about a low-value reserve player here. The Blues are making it quite clear to the rest of their players that taking drugs is simply not allowed and will lead to them being forced out of the club. At the end of the day, the terms of his contract were broken, so the club were absolutely right to sack the

Interestingly, the England and Wales Cricket Board recently had a similar decision to make as the FA, when Warwickshire all-rounder Graham Wagg was found guilty of taking cocaine. The England A player was banned for 15 months, over double the ban that Mutu received.

Wagg admitted taking a line of cocaine after a night of heavy drinking following a split with his long-term girlfriend. He said it was the first time he had ever taken it, but that just shows that there is absolutely no way of get-

ting away from it. He admitted that there is no place for drugs in sport, and that he fully deserved his punishment. Clearly there is no place in sport for drugs, and the sooner that is drummed into everyone the bet-

LEEDS United claim there is still some way to go to conclude a £25m takeover deal with Sebastien Sainsbury.

The sticking point at the moment is the consortium's ability to prove to the United board that they have the necessary funds to complete the takeover.

"The board is continuing to review all possible options, including discussions with other interested parties," said Leeds chairman Gerald Krasner.

One of the other parties Krasner mentioned is rumoured to be a consortium headed by Yorkshire-based businessman Norman Stubbs.

Sainsbury has vowed to provide proof of the financial package by today. He was hoping to conclude the deal by today, but legal small print is likely to delay the completion of the takeover. He said: "The banks are communicating with the lawyers and we are trying to put something together."

A spokesman for Nova Financial Partnership added: "The monies are now in a US bank specifically identified for the Leeds United FC transaction."
