# Tragic rail <br> death 

* Met girl killed by train
* Parents moved by friends' and lecturers' memories

A devastaling train acoident killed a Leeds Met studeni this week.

Second year BSO Aschitectural Technology student Vietoria O'Brien Lynch died on November 3
A Leeds Mel spokesperson said: "Our sympathies are with the family and in respect to them we don'। wish to comment further."
A statement released by Victoria's family focused on her passion for Leeds.
It said: "Victoria was delighted about being in Leeds.
"Since the tragedy the family has been comforted by the warm and
wonderful memaries of everyone they met
Known as Tori' to her friends and fomily, the 22 year old student was known to have a wide circle of friends

She originally hailed from Drogheda in County Louth
The wake was held yesterday, and the funeral will take place today (Friday, November IIth) at noon in Julianstown.

## Boost to parttime funding

The next two years will see the goverament danate $£ 40 \mathrm{~m}$ to improve provision for parttime courses.
The scheme will involve half being donated by each the Department for Education and the Higher Education Funding Couxcil for England. It is hoped the scheme will encurrage poople from disadvantaged backgrounds to go to university.

Currently 500,000 part-lime suidents study in Brinish higher oducation and are more likely to be from poores backgrounds, combinugg study with wexk, a family ot manure studemts. The intuoduction of top-up fees had been seen as a problem because unlike full-time tuaderns, those studying perr-time have to pary oppiont.

This has concerned universibies with a high turaher of part-imers that they wornt be able to raise fees without losing applicaсікаs.

However, the numey now donated will ensure that universities have the faclinies to ultract and retain part-time sudents. Additionally, just over two weeks ago, the goverument increasod grants for part-lime students by $25 \%$ with 850000 people being expocted to qualify.
The higher education minister, Bill Ramnel said: "Undor this governmenL, part-time undergraduate pmisision has enjoyed vibrani growth. Today's announcement means that from 2006 the part-ime sector will enjoy significart increases in fee support for low-income students and a major change in innituricrnal funding:"
Sir Howard Newby, chief executive of HEFCE added: "It is vital to actively support higher education instimuinss in recruiring par-time students from non-traditional backgrounds when there are concems in the sector following the introduction of the new fee and student support Tegime."

However Professur Miriam Zukas. Director of Lifelong Learning Institute at Leeds University had a mixed reaction.

She said: "Whilst it is very posilive that part-lime studeuts' needs are recognised both in terms of fer surpport and on-course suppori.. the systems for supporting smdent fees will need to be highly flexible to take sccoum of the varied pattemx of parttime participation and the exira suppart will be relatively small. given that the pot is to be distributed by formula.

The formula that Ms Zukas refers to is $B$ formola intended to distribute the funding to universities by eaking into account the number of part-ime studenis they aturact.

levelled at Simon Lee. wise-chancellor at Leeds Metropolitan University, by a teadiog lecturers' union. spokesperson for the university said that lee and the instifution are challicnglag the remarka,
of the Natthe made hy Andy Pike of the Natthe
union and reported in the Times union and reported in the
Higher Education Supplement.
The row centres around a memo Lee circulated in mid-
September
aboat the uni's staff development festival held over the summer, In it the VC said the future of employees who did not attend the two week event were heing considered.
He warned: "It is difficult to see why we should continue to emplay those feut who do not wish to play an achive role in the festival."
In the document dated September 14, Lee thants the slaff who did go, bul says: "We are now looking at those members of staff who booked but then did not attend, who have whisted festival places and university resources."
The remarks were condemned by Pike, who is Nathe's National Official for Higher Edueation.
"The vice-chancellor seems very keen to turn what should be a positive event into a festival of staf bullying." Pike said in an interview win THES.
"Encouraging smif development is laudable, but you can't compel academic staff to take
part in an
event of this sort. Making threats to terminate the employment of those who don't attend is outright bullying.
A spokesperson for the Mer said: We refute the allegations made in the THES article and are now taking advice on what staps may be taken against NATFHE and the THES."

Lee's supporters have continued the row in the pages of this week's THES. Leners championing the festival by pro-viec-chaneellor Saliy Brown and Gavin Fairburn, who rectures in Ethics and Language. have been printed.

Fairburn says: "My experience of the vice-chamcellor. Simon Lee, is of a colleague who is unurually concerned with the welfare of others at all levels within the instifution
"The staff development festival was an astonishing affair, full of opportunities for networking as well as for the development of skills and knowledge."

Looking forward to next summer's ficstival. Lee said he was cancelling all periods of leave, stating in the meme that only "wholly cxceptional requests for leave" would be considered after having been reviewed by Lee himself.

A year after a group oi Loods Uni Hockey players were nearly expolled for dressiag up as rape victims, if scerns that a small gang of unknown Otey rumpers decided to follow their lead
and take tuste and decency off the Halloween mensu. The four men, who wimesses claim were students, decided to colchrate the spooky day by dressing as Arabs suicide bombers, complene with paimed faces, beards, mwels on their heads and ruclssacks on their backs with wires hariging oul.

The contruversidi choige of costume ermer atl a diffricult time for race relarions in Leeds. Last Wednesday saw
anti-fascist campaigners exchange slogans and moults with BNP supponters outside Loeds Crown Count as Nick Grifin stood inside facing charges of Incitement to Racial Hatured.

Anti-racists fear that the BNP are likely to be active in Leads over the coming months as they look to explait tensions cursed by three of the four $7 / 7$ suicide bombers coming from Leads.

A number of pumers were so appalled at the choice of fancy dhess that they asked to have them ejected fiom the pub.

John Bowden of the Leods University Revolution Sociely was enjoying a drink in the Pacldrarge pub following a meeting about stipping the BNP when the men in question a arived.

He said: "We were all very shocked when four white lads entered the pulb
wearing those costumes. We immediately stood up with them and argued that their costumes were racise and coruplettely insensitive to the Asian community in Leods which has hod to ded with racisi aftacks, \& fascist campriggr against them by the BNP and police opmestion in areas such se Berton"

Fellow Revolution Society member Luke Cooper wres equally disgusted.
He seide "Ifs out of onler from two perspectives it is fiturliting to smyone who has last loved ones through terrorist atmeless that tanget civilians and secondly, four white mien colouring tbeir faces in and weurng beards and trw els on cher headis inevitahly makes a suruement atong the lines of. "rall Muslims who dress tike I do prubably want to blow themselves up and kill innocent people.t.

The fact that all of the cormplaints mede to Leeds Sudent came from white peopie probahly reinforces this point and shows unity berweea the races rather than division.

Rag member Katherinc Blacklaws met the men as she was collecting for Children in Crisis on Halloween and she also thinks that it may have been blown out of proportion.

She said: "They seemod hke nice guys, infact every one of them domated to children in crisis. One of them even helped with the challenges we got set for the Otley num. Whe had to get a Otey rum. We had to get a

kissing a bloke with a beard and he was very obliging! As for their costume, I think it Was maybe a lime insensitive and inpproperiate, bul thry didn't do any real harm."

A spokesperson for West Yorkshire Police said that no compluints were made in Leeds on Halloween regarding offonsive costumes. However, ahe added wat if the suicide bomber costumes had been reported as causing unrest at this difficult time then police would have inventiguted
Dians Brown claimed that these costumes tre another illustration of stu. demts' lack of consideration for the wider commmity. Banty Payne of the HEAI Headingloy pressure group echoed Mrs. Brown's sentiments.

# Brotherton library scoops top gongs for literature

Treasure troves of literary material cam be found on campus in the form of the Edward Boyle and the Brothertion.

Two of Leeds Univeraity's library collections have received international accolades for offering extensive contributios to their fields. The Russian and Liddle collection and the English Literature colfections have bath been deemed by the Museums, Libraries and Archives Authority (MLA) to be of purssanding world-class status.
The English collection ratges from first edition Shakespeare plays to handwritten manuscripts by Oscer Wilde, Charles Dickens and TS Eliol- Arter many years of chasing after these much coveted collections, the Brotherton library is proud of
thieir achuevement.
Head of special collections Chris Sheppard said:"It gives us high-profile objective evidence to help demonstrate what we already know ourselves -that we have one of the very few university library collections in the couniry that ix genuinely world class."

The Russian and Liddle collection is amongsi only 38 collections worldwide that are considered outstanding.

Leeds University is the first libmry in Yorkshire to receive the accolade, and one of only a few select miversities nationwide. It is hoped that more people will now use the collections. The value of both collections 18 also now on the up

Kristoff Zabuchi. a first year Art stadent. suid: "I'm really proud of the awneds The University purs so much effort into
maintaining its collections, it catera for all specialist needs and it means that we have more al hand for relfable, extensive resesrch. It's amazing to look th the old English Literamre coilections. They really are pages of history."
The Russian collection includes the personal manuscript of Ivan Bunin, the firsi Russian winner of the Nobel prize for Literature. Over 6,000 munuscripts relating to those involved in the First World War can be found in the Liddle collection.
To help with the costs of maintsining the collections, Leeds Uni have launched an adopt-a-book scheme where sponsors pay from $£ 25$ to have a plate with their name on it inserted into one of the works.
The ML.A said: "All the collections are worthy of designation by virtue of their value to scholarship and research."

A lack of respect awaited George Galloway when he arrived at Leeds University this week

The MP for Bethnal Green and Bow was subjected to violent werbul abuse by members of the assembly. being lambasted as "despricable" amongst other things.

In lown un his Respect lour, Mr Galloway spoke to the largest audiance ever rocorded at a Respect student mecting, a whopping 600 people urning up to see the one man show. The man proved such a great attraction that he packed out the university's conference auditorium, leading security staff to refuse access to hundreds of pecple.
Raving spolken to 400 students earlies that day at Sheffield University, Mr Galloway told the Leeds contingent his party's controversial yiews on the British involvement in Palestine and to criticise the Prime Minister's "umbilical" attachment to George Bukh.
He defended previous comments made over the war in $\mathbf{\text { raph, even }}$ receiving applause when remarking "US soldierts have paid with their lives for a pack of lies."
Proceedings came to a halt afier bout 45 minutes when a man from

## Electronic forms cause application chaos

A whole generation of poremilal Loods students could be missing from graduat tion picturey in years to come due to compter gliches.

As problems with UCAS electronic university appliantions perriist many students' academic records have not reached their target univeraities, threatening their chances of gaining a place of the country"s higher edication institutes,

Universities, schools and students have all reporied problems using the new elechtonic system, and there are further reportis of issues with paper applicztions.
The new electronic system, introduced this year, enables universities to access applicants" detaits through a secure link on the UCAS website, and students to track the progress of their applicalion using an individual $\log \mathrm{in}$.
Hewever, some universitios have nor been able to view the necessary details. with many reporting that athough they have received students" personal sutulementr, they don't have any information ubout students' cualifications.

Both schools and students have beon connacted by universities asking for details apparentry missing on the efectronic form, whicb bave in fact bean submirted.

Furthermore, a number of students have reppatted problems with the elecfronic tracking system that allows prospecive students to check whether their applications have been received
and gives details of offers and rejections.
The system has declared that forms haven't been received by UCAS; muny pupils who deferred their application received leter"s saying that they had apphed for September 2006 and many pupils have been unable to use the efectronic system al all
Both students and universities have reporned that on the electronic forms, the formarting of personal statemenss has been distoned or some text had been missed out aliogether; one school toid us that the rystem does not alert students if they have gone crver the word limit for their personal statements, but simply culs off any exira words.

UCAS has not sent ont any officirit statements to schools or aniversities.

However, a netice on the website this week admits that their have been a number of initial glitches with the system and concedes thal aot all institutions are able to access the new electronic system.
The staternent clains that no-one will be disadvartaged by the difficulties thas they are currenly experiencing and promising to sor not the problen as soon is possible.
However, all the schools that spoke to Leeds Student reported a number of issues, from beling contacted by universitios for information that they bad included on the electronic form, software problems, false reporting by the system and problems for both staff and students atuempting to $\log$ in to the UCAS nerwark.

## Students with part-time jobs get worse degrees <br> Outsider art brought in

Gexing a job doring term time could be the worsi thing you do al university Sudents who work during tern-time will groduate with a poorer degree than those who don't, acoording to a report

According lua study carried out by the Department of Exucation and Skills, 38 per cent of students who prorked to suppurt themelves ashieved a lower second class degree or below, compared to only 28 per cent of thase who did not work.
55 per cent of thase who worked ended up in non-graduate, low status jobs for up to four years ather graduation, comparsed to 24 per tent of those who dind wot work diring tom-time.
The stady elso fournd that twice as
many firstclass degrees were awarded to those ihal diutr ' work tham those who did Around 32 per cent of Loeds University studemts maintain jobs throughout overy year of their sturdy and only 19 per cent of those uchieved a lower second or above.
Khush Bakht, a First year Microutiology student al Leeds Uni, said: "It's obvious that pecaple who work have less time to study, but in's poorer people who lurve to watt, who end up with poorer degrees and lower paid jobs. If widens the divide between the meome hands."

Among the women who were memitored for the sturdy, the uversge salary four years afler graduating wes $£ 22,500$, while the men eamed $£ 26.500$.
Kevin Chandler of Employment Office UK said: "The gradurtes from

2000 ars carning ten per cent less than graduates from 1995 at any same point in the carty carser.

Those with arts degeess were up to nine times more bikely than cother graduates to end up in nom-graduate jobs, while graduates from new universities were a third more likely to be in low-stanus employment than those from establishod universities.

Mark Batron, a History and Politics sturdent, as Leeds Mekropolifan University said the sumver is smrelighle. Black addede "It was a shame that this agende had to be brought onno the AGM agendh. Bringing motions like this is unhelpful and not represeatative of the campuse as a whole."

PSG President Sumayya Almari responded; Hit was a shame than the trotion on Pulestimian education was not pasged. If should have been and will next year. It is an importunt motion and it is representative of the campus and the whote of frumanity"

## Why the Left should dis REsPGCT Galloway

t is often assumed thas the ideological spetrum folong a unear line. Slick a pin on the far-len one on the far extremes becoming and its fascism, with bot cowards the vifal center. Thet is probably how most of us understand idsology and, consequed lly, the formur hation we use to pick and choose (var political comb rades and foes. But is it in touch with neality?

When George Galloway came to town on Monday. I began to sericusly question this simplominded designt I like ta think ary left-wing credentials are pretty umassailable: I was vehement in my opposition to the war in Lraq; I am extremely passionate about the ethnic clennsing of the Palestinians in 1948, and the criminatity of the tast 38 years of thot brupat occunation; I am appalled by Blainte privariza tion und rim-oway inequality. So, shouldn't this sot me in ahout the same geographic region on our ideological map is Ma Gallowny, the self-avowed antiwar sociatise?

Techuically, of course, it should, but when reading about his grotesquely inmoral betavior (more to fol low) and, then this weck winessing his cheap temagogvery in person. I felt eons away from anything I remotaly recognized as "left-wing"

My confution, and the many who share it, hns its roots in the imperrinence of the linear model. While not an overly common phencmeroin, the far-left, ruther than being its polar chposite, does occasional ty anstate intep the far right. Political scieatiests call this the "hossestioce mudel" and it supposes that as you ap aloag to the leftist extremes, like with a harseshoe, rather thon moving away from, you bend back towardis the firr right.

Grloway is a man who is slipping and sliding erratically in thar narnow gap between the far-left and far righl Culling him a part-lime reactionary may sound toitially ridiculous but there Is no shortage of evidence that can be added to plead and cluse the chse.

Lat me start with a quote fram his tub-chumping vertamance in the Couference Auditorium on Monday. Fle told tice laptive crowd that, "l am agains all the dictutiors, all the time, not just some of the dietatucs somp of the time and that is the difference between roe and Bush and Blair.n

Now, I completely sgree with the seand asserfon: Bush and Blair aree cumently chumny with the barbanc rulers of Uahekistan and Saudi Arabiva to name jur two - they have no regand for democracy or human rights. Bun is Gallowny hiknself reatly aguinst all the dictators all the time"?

What about in 1994 when he fawned on the fascis dictator of Iraq, Sackdam Hussein, burbling "I salute your courage, your strength, your indefatignbility" So did he mean this as an ironic excoriation of dictaSo did he mean this as an inunic excoriat or didn'i he count Saddam - Tike he doas cor Sadidarn, or didn'the coust Saddam - tike he doos-
$n^{\prime} 1$ Castro - as a dictator? A stadent in the Auditorium $n^{\prime} 1$ Castro-as a dictator? A student in the Auditonnum
asked him about this priful bum licking and Galloway replied then he was in fret addressing those comptiments to the Itaqi people. But I looked ut the full aprech and the line previcus to the one quoted was "Three years after the [Gulf War], I still meet families who ate calling their newborn sons Sadiam." He disla't say that thase fannilies were maning their newbom sons "Tru" so it is plain that his syrup was being powred over the head of Saddum anc not the Irqi people he was crushing uriter his boovt.

But this is just an aberration, you might hape, or jus maybe, Culloway was trying to sttempate the suf fring of the Irait people by donning a nose peg and
engaging with thair leaders. Wrang. Fils puppy love for venal dictatom goen further a field, this time to Syria, which is the only coumtry in the Middle Eant still under a Ba'aubist dictamoship, and, untll rocently, the milliary occupier of Lebanon. So what praise could Galloway effise for this specific dictator? Well. he was "very irmpressed with his knowledge, by his sharpuess, by his חlexible mind."

> Galloway claims he says "the same thing to everyone", but he just doesn't.

And he went on to tell the Syrian people how "lucky" they are to have Bashar al-Assad as their President, even though they had po say in the matter. Bear in mind that only last Friday Amnesty Intemational reiemsed this staternent: "At least several hundred pollitical prisoners continue to be held by the Syrian runharities, including prisoners of coniscience, untried political detainees and prisaners who are serving sentences inpoosed after grossly urfair triats ... and many hustrieds of Sysians and forrign mationals have "disappeared" in the custody of Syrian security services." How do yous think the trade unionistic, student Hetivists and human rights workers who shared the stage with Galloway on Monday would fere in "lucky" Syria?

A fair copunter-point made by a friend of mine. who is a member of Respect Pary, ram thm Donntd Rumsfold and ocher pants of the Reagan udministraiont, along with Thatcher, were themselves big friends with Saddum back in the 1980s. True, but should rapacious Western leaders act is our moral compass? Should we welcome Galloway just beccuuse compass Thoola we weccome Galloway jur boczums he has the relatively unblemished recond of only
praising an tyrant rauher than supplying one wihh praising y

But even the American and European leaders ouly humoured these prychopaichs for the express purpose that in exchange for diplomatic and military support they would open up their countries economies to


Westem capital, export a stready sream of oil, and keep their people suljujuated - a framework Wessem paliticians puxatively call "smability". It was an expediem quid pmoqua.
Gallowry, on the other hand, seems to do is out of some sott of soulfur maggetism that just pulls tyin towards molulitarian maniace. He has even said thar the duy the Soviet Union foll-a regime that extinguished the lives of over 15 million people and didn't passess a solitary demacratic atom - was the "work day of my life". And the Soviet Untorn actually hak a lot of similarities with Ba'mphist dietacership, so we are starting to see a patkm here.
With Saddam and Assad already buoyed by his gratrude and kind words, Cablioway is now pushing for the relesse of Thrig Aziz, who was Sanddam's right-hand mian, and Irag's face to the wordd becuuse his visage had (slightly) less genocidal associations.

Galloway spem his Christmas holiday wihh Aziz in 1999 and since his capture by the Ansericass, Aziz - who lias the biood of 1.5 million Iraqi's on his hands hus been the object of further gushing from the Scotish MP. He called this particuler war oriminal on "eminent diplomat and inteetiectual person". So just how can Calloway elaim to care about the Iraqi people when he struck up a friendship and hotidayed with the same man who was nyerseceing their botture, rape and murder?
Then we come to lraq today, a country that has been destroyed by a combination of Galloway's entemies, the United Stales and British governments, and his friends, Husseill and Aziz. Recently, Galloway has poured acom on the ieftist trade unionists in Irag who ane trying to rebuld their shatered counsty withount. blowing up imocem lraqits, dencouncing thern as "quiaingss"
His praise is reserved for the "145 operations every day" hat indiliscriminately kill - not US or UK soldiers - but hundreds of imnocent Imgi men women and children, And this is the sarte man who contendod on Monday, "It is a crime and a sin in any language to kill innocent people for the crimes of the guilty"
Gatloway's perilous tiperxing along the narvow fruntier berween the far-lef und fur-night should be clear to, and taken notioe of, by everyone on the neal left Soliciting and praising genocidst 5 yrants and redigious fundamentalist suricide bombers in Iraq should instardly catapalt you miles from left-wing ground.
And on top of all this, Galloway tas gaping lactrnas m his progressive CV . When asked on Munchy whecher be would vole for an anti-abontion partiamenthay moxion, he said peremprorily, II think the mentary moxion, he said perempioriy, is canulle of being born alive is ann abomination." for which be received a charus of applause thas. Inade me seriously question what kind of penple the Respect Pary luad got themselves involved with.
And sociarding to the lindependent columniad Johmm Hari. whom I interviewed recentl and lives in Galloway's constituency, Galioway's votaries ran an extremely reactionary cartpnign in Becthnal Green und Bow in the 2004 eiecotion that included warning people on the doonmep that Othn King, his opponent, Whas, amongss other things, in favor of downgrating cannubis to a Crade $C$ drug.

So, how mach does Galloway oare about his new constimenis? Last week one of the moot ilitikeral and dracenian luws of the last 60 years was passed in the House of Commens by one vote. It allowed the detention of suspected terrarisis for up $\mathbf{t s} 90$ days without charge. The Peoples Chany was at a commencial event in Cork called "An Evening With George Gelloway." His explanstion on Mondsy whas that be would "psefer to be with 400 students in Sheffield and 600 in Leeds than siring in the bar in the House of Comumons.

Aside from the facz then itere are oher scivivities, aside from drinking, avaituble to an MP al the House of Commons (like voring), I would love to ser Galloway inform the lagge number uf puor Muslims In his community whon they are arrested under the new legisialion that he couldn't bin it becuuse he had to mend a cosy fow hours with a bunch of nixdilleclass university students. And he even had the gall on Mnosiay to cry crucodile tears over "the milliuns who have bean berayyed by the civill liberries agenda"!

My problem with Galloway is not then he is tow
lef whage, but that he is far moo right wing. Some former members of the Socialist Alliance even objectod to forming a coalition with him when Respect wns being boxth elting his politizal recond, and his refusal to accept an tyernge worker's wage, with Galloway actually claining "I couldn't live in throe warders" nages.
The truth is he a shady Stalimist whe uses real crimeas - the lraq war. the occupation of Gaza and the West Rank evc. - to further his own ayenda The Respect Party is and was a great idea. With the cen-er-right New Labour goverument there is a gargantluan hole on the Left that needs to bo plugged. But this optimistic and dernoryatic allemative is slowly dcgencruting into a persconal bamdwagon and PR organ, for Galloway. LI muses be rone tham a parsoinaliny cut but his deification by the members of the Respect party is almost gquasi-religions and sccoptsino criticism.

Intrigued somewhat by this praponderance I went ro thkley Monr and I lefl my hat at home, "Whecsar "as ta bin sint ah saw thee. on Ilkla Moor batut az
Sn goos the opening line of Yorkshine"s very own national anthem. Translated ince English this means something 1ike. Where have you beta since I ssw you, on Ilkey Moor without as hat? Intrigued somewhat by this preporderance I went to itrley Moot and I lef my hat at home. caling the hills above the quaint spa-town of llkley might not. sound like the biggers challenge that humanity faced this weck but it shoutdn't be underestimated. A couple of hows trudging across bleak moorland und through peat bogs and 1 soon realised the true nature of the tank. Needless to say my ears were burning as the wind coastandy baskered them with its piercing icy chill and the driving rain hammering at my fice wask a bit of a bastand 100 . So presumably, the answer to the question "whecar "as ta bin?' goes something like, 'I've been in the local hospital receiving treutment for hypochemtisia and frosibitic of the ears. The actual line of the song is. "Tha 's bahn t'carch thi deeath o'cowd' wheh means much the same thing. I noliced that the few other mad fellows storaping ahout the moors that day had beeded this waming and had their hats fimly clamped to their bealps.

However, there is more to the moor than pest hogs und possible death from exposure. The Cow and Calf rocks are the eenarepiecs
attruction; two jugged lumps of geology brutally juthing up through the rolling cuqvet of grass and brecken. The Caff (the small one) is suid to have been dislodged from the Cow when the giant 'Rombald' caught his fout on it as he ran across Northern England supposedly trying to escape hís wife. It mighy seem careless but the did sreate a pretty spectacular landscape feature. I was thinking more slong the lines of a bubbling hot buth hack at the horel myself.
Ilkley towa offers a welcome respite from the weather systems of the moor and whilst there is mere than a hint of Royston Vakey about it nesting between the loming hilts, it's a pleasarn ennugh place. Fences and cantle grids proteot the town from the sheep and whatever else roangs the moors although last weekend al did seem to be jus me. A hast of high atreet names are availabie to the shopper as well вs a number of smaller bouriques, The town bousss a thriving theatre, its own Victorian arcade and a museum and art gallery based in the Manor House on the sire of a Roman fort. Eating in Ilkley is a tuxury and choice is abound. There is a full range of respatrants serving all kinds of food. On a damp and miserable day in November 1 found the Yorksbire Pudding with sausage and chips at the Rose and Crown to be particulanly satisfying. The bar is also one of the keener venues for the town 8 youth, playing host to a yariefy of ribute bands. However, the barmaid says she moved out of Leeds a few years ago and finds life in llikley a bit boring. The gente as the har are discussing the "appalling' rioting in France and the solutions offered to solve this cilomma are less than sympathetic. The Americun couple huddled in the comer look on bemused.

Kenya, London, Alba, Haly, Germany, Swhzerland and Canada provide tha international backdrop to le Caire's nonetheless claustrophabic thriller, The Constamt Gandener. Don't expect an average unchallenging spy-chose: there soly one spy in lisis novel and hes is neither the main protagouist nar in a role thal is in any way decistive to the plot

The Constane Gardener is not of spies, but certainly of esplonage: of the tainted glamour of the Foreign Office and the cold-hearted capheslism of internatlonal pharmaceukicals; of diplomats, doctors, aid workers scientists and brutal murderers
It is not a brilliantly written mantative, but it is thrillingly paced. The plot is subile anrough to intrigue without heing so complex as to uttrerly perpler. Pessa Quayle, lawyer and wife to a British diplomat in Kenya, is murdered on an overland trip, the purpose of which is unluown. Her companion on the tria an African-Belgian doctor and aid worker who was suspected to be hep lover, has disappeared and their ctriver has been left decaplated in their rehicie.

We learn from the start that there is a scandal to be covered up and interesis to be preserved in the wake of their murder, but the scandal we originaily suspect turns out to be misleading and it is unclear at first what these interests might be and to whom they apply. The novel is essentially the gradual reveation of these implications as Tesse's husband, Justin, fights to expose the conspiracy behind her death. To say more would be onin the novel's structure.
The revulsion we feel for characters such as the nauseatingly self-satisfied dipplomat Woodrow demonstrates the whichness of le Carre's namration: there are chatacters to despise and xore in this novel There are none left alive who are blameless and fiw who are entirely culpable. It is this realistic aspect to the crime which makes the novel so gratifying: It is not black and white, there are few clear demarcations and the complexities of diplomacy, medical eethice, loyalties, lust and ambition are futly represented.
sy no means perfect and uneven at times, the Constant Sandener is an impressive, wamly necommended thriller nonetheless and the film version out in chemas this week will need to be extremely loyal so the novel to do it justice. (7150)

The Bindifg Chair is indeed distubbing and beautifully panoramic; as it is absorbing, pitiless, exotic and morbidy fascinating

It is a starting and of tentimes shacking novel which explores the secret lives of women, but one in particular, May-1. Li. May is a chinese woman who, as a child at the wane of the rifnetrenth century, belonged the last.generation to he sublected to the torture that was the anctent Chinesse ritual of foot binding. She is breathtakingly and exptically beautifut, but her beauty and identity are inesticable from beauriful, but her beauty and identity are ines micable from
her bound feet. She both despises and celebrates her dell cate, alluring deformaty. She is the ragile relatlonship between beauty and suffiering made manfiest in human form and she labours under her cross with a kind of teselifful pride.

She is married, young and optimistic, to a silk merchant who subsequently emerges as a cruel sadist. Aged 14; she escapes him and flees to Shanghai, where she supports
herself as a prostiute while she leams Engllsh. May sees the english language as her hope and salvation from the restrictions of Chinese culture.

As a member of the Foot Emancipation Society Arthur Collen comes to the brothel in which she works with the intention of relieving the women therein from the torture the intention of retieving the women therein from the torture
of their bindings. He develops instead a fetishistle fascination of their bindings. He deyelops instead a fetishistle fascination
with the fragility and delfeacy of May's tiny, broken feet. Mee with the fragility and dellicacy of May's tiny, broken feet. Ree
ambition ts rearised and they mamys but, importantly, her feet remain bound.

Arthur's nilece, Alice, develops a close, intense and brutally affectionate relationship with her opium-smoking aunt May. As she grows older, she seeks a means to heal May's crippled feet, while May tries to guard Alice against the dangers of yomantic infatuaticns.

May's disfigurements are both physicel and psychological; her ruthlessness is fommed not fust through her experiences of foot binding, but of sotomite rape, abortion, seavual brutality, prostitution and opium addiction. The novel is littered with women nurturing thelr mental and physical scars. some which can never furly heal

Evocative and tragic, The Binding Chair is a moving narrative which avoids any tamish of semimentality. It is imelligently and poignantly written and despit being a novel about women, it is not just a novel for women. its narrative resonates and informs, almost exonerating the very cruelty it condemns, enquirlng into emotional paradoxes which can never be understood.

Bom and raised in London, Steppa moved to Leads in 1997. It wasn' long before his enthusiasm for the music was spotted and he began warking for $L$ Double's Flex Recordings. investigates the challenges facing the UN today and how student supporters in Leeds are responding


0n the 24th of October the United Nations Secretary General gave a speech in honour of the 60 th Anmiverssry of the United Nations. Byery amniversary of the United Netions brings a whole new realm of yesspectives in international awareness, and Kafi Annan maid, 'we must recognise that the world today is very different from that of our formders. " In light of this understanding, the United Nations Association of the University of Leeds (UNA-UL) works hard sowards the effective and continuous sarengthening of the UN in all contexts and specifically with regard to the Millenaivm Development Goals for 2015. These goals ate not only relevant in the scheme for improving the status of developing commies, but in the dally conscience of anyune aware that the world doesn"t just change with asqeech or twa.
Esaily Charters is UNA-UL Campaigns Officer who works hard to ensure priorities are right where they should be. One of the association's major efforts this year is joining the campaign for free treatment for all AIDS sufferers. The HIV/AIDS pandemic is the greatest challenge of our time. There are cumearly 40 million people living with HIV and AIDS. AIDS kills sbout 8,000 people a day. 4 out of 5 of these deaths are in Africa. lmagine waking up and finding that one in thrue of your friends has un incurable disease that will kill them within 10 years. Imagine a situation where every child lost its parents in Britain. Imagine that there is a medicine that will keep you alive and healthy for longer but you canmot get it
because you are too poor to pay for the drugs.

Globally, 95\% of people living with HTV/ADDS have no access to the lifeprolonging treatmens that have cut the death rates so dramatically in the West. In Africa, where 26 million people suffer from HIV/AIDS, only $1 \%$ has - Becess to anti-AIDS drugs. Treatment 15 a basic right and essential part of the strategy to consat AIDS. Trealment allows people living with HIV/AIDS to protect their bealth, raise their chlldren and continue to live a productive tife. Patents on medicines give big pharmsceutical companies power over pricing of AIDS drugs. Generic firms who make safe and effective eopies of branded drugs at far lower prices, have betn helping to break this monopoly. However, the manufacture of these cheap drugs misst be scaled up and subsidized to meet the demand.

Combating AIDS, along with malaria and other diseases, is the sixth millemnium goal. By 2015, the UN wains to halt and begin to reverse the enpread of AIDS. The Joins United Nations programme on HIV/ALDS (UNAIDS) is working with coumtries and other agencies to achieve this gral. Along with Leeds Stop AIDS society, range of speakers from Uganda, Betswans, Tanzanis and the US were hosted on November 9th. The speakens were either directly or indiredly affected by HIV/AIDS. A visual demonstration was held to show supdemonstration was hesd to show supALDS Day on December lge will see more demonstrations of support for this massive movement, so relevant to everyone even those physically maf-
fected by the hotror of disease.
Anolher movement which cannos have beed missed is Make Poverty History. On the 24th of Octaber Leeds City Square wilnessed a Make Poverty History Vigil - a mass gathering of people in white to show there is huge support for intemational development in Yorkshire Speakers included Richard Bemnert, the chair of Muke Poverty History and Hilary Benn, UK Secrelary of State for International Development. The vigil was organised in lighs of meetings held on the 24th and 25 th October in Leeds by the European Union development ministers for major discuassions that will influence the EU development agends for the next seven years and have huge significance in whether or not the Milleanium Developmert Goals will be met The UNA-UL Committee and many members attended among hundreds of others.

> Despite some criticism of the efficctiveness of the UN , their policies are still very much at the heart of the development debate
arranging a number of speakers to come from a variety of organisations including Oxfam, the Refugee Council and Compassion UK. They hope to get some speakers directly from the UN and the World Bank and of course, Hilary Bemn. Tupics covered will tinclude AIDS and Citizenship to name just a few and will ideally include the sharing of practical 'on the field' experience. The committee is hand at work arranging a personal uemtimany from an individual fieeing the persecution of the Burmese dietstonship. It is all about theory put inte action and speaking about issues from orthodox and nonorthodax perspectives; by listening and speaking with experts and experienced individuals they aid a gemeral social educational process by which more and more poople can gain insight into the monumental work of the UN and related organisations.

Two weeks ago Talks Officer Sarain Haynes was attended a tulk held berween different action groups on the effectiveness of the G 8 summit and of Western countries aiding the development process. What was clear amidst the excitement of the debate that ensued was Hilary Bean's intentions to promore the UN Millenxium Goals to help reduce poverty by 2015. It goes to show that despite some criticism of the effectiveness of the UN, their policies are still very much at the heart of the developruart debate.

The Model United Nations (MUN) at Leeds University is important, essential and mecessary. It replicates the interesting aspects of the UN including the Security Council, UNHCR or even the ECOSOC, Last
year the Darfur crisis in Sudan was discussed and the year before it was Israe/Palestine and North Korea. This year's topic has yet to be decided. The MUN is a yearly event held in the Councit Chambers, upstairs in the Parkinson Building, discussing current issues in a diplomatic atmosphere similar to that of the UN. MUN doesn't just תun at Leeds but throughour the country and there is also an national MUN as well as a world MUN.

In this day and age it is absolutely imperative that organisations like this one exist in order to bullanoe and support movements like the United Nations, which itself is evidently always in tho publice line of fire due to its shatus of non-state actor in foternational society, The United Nations Association of the University of Leeds is part of an intremational effort to suppoit and strengthen the UN itself and with respect to foreign policy. It alse aims to provide esducation for global citizenship ${ }^{1}$ Uhrough activities like Model United Nations cvents and use of our vast rescurces. It acte as an open and democratic structure which enables everyone to play an sclive part in responding to and analysing UN issues. In the lifght of the GOth amiversary, it is imperative that individual insight inzo international uffairs is appreciated; how else can we call this world democratic?

# 'Last night he got me with a knife. How can you go to a police officer and say, 'l've been raped by a punter'?' A prostitute in Leeds talks to Kevlin Whadop and Dan Johnson about life on a street corner 

Hulbeck, where down-bwn Loeds meets down-rodiden wastsiand, is a bewildering blend of images. Just behind the four-silim cily centre hotels and trendy, high-rise apartment blocks where a train scutlles along to Ledrs Central there exibts it different picture where the Milan of the North monileer seeras a wortd awdy. In's grim and cold, thmp and dark; a p yckensian vignexs boutied and jumeth it resonance boh pownerfil amd stant. Jupt nerows the river is restanram sells Gillet stenk at fil3.95 designer jumpers go for ESO itpwands at the sthops in Cranary Wharf,

Ye just down fram the riverside flacs on Marshall Street in LSI, the firs prostinute Leeds Student cames wemass is brukhing her hair back praptiring for而other vight on the sircece Tl's Spm. This is the wrorking envirumment for many of the city's prostitules, where businees men wearing suits wall the same troct in wurtry wearing Addidas tracly foltums. This belies the stereotypical impapy attached to their profexsion, all okimpy skdrts and high heots, o Training Advtier for a local business tells Leeds Shaiedr The firm regularly makes police reports thood the prostitues that nim the sopretty (ednuide. "tis mere the pinups they vinis sort oun," he 8ays, "Orie of them is youms as 16 usually has a pimp wha ses iff tre bus stop. When the cops come, he jist hops on the bus."

Wirtine for at lift home after fixishing warts. Danielle Conk. Sales Account Marnger ai the AV commany just up the groct, explains "They stand at the bottom of the road, "the says, where thmstim Carpets ironically lies "They're always here. I walk to work at seven o'cloois and they're still out at sken thirty."

Do you know what thme the prossies cume out ${ }^{n}$ " she asks a male colleague when preased, her colloquialism diearthind by her dilly exposure to the profes skell "I've no idea" he surys. "They're bere all Lly, arn'rther?'

A liapharthisiking prostiture approsictiod by $L S$ is one such case Lockin' for thoutios? she asks, an ipwaing preamble as old as the trade itself "I ke got a client in a rainute amd I lke'r want to miss him." she says, all black boots and dark lipatict.

This response was typically followed by "I would, bui I want to do some business first" the desperate search for monley more pressing than releasing informaniont. One 29 -year-old womsan who says she lives in Hyde Park, holding a bugg of coundoms in one hand. a cigarette in the wher, witures this struggle: "I'm just here to male: E20 ame then I'mof out turight."
$A=$ other says, "Oh, sak somebody else."
Throughout the myriad dimaly-it streets where infectivity is the nom and
ativity the exception, there is a string of uninhabited pubs. Thare's the Lard Nelson, The King's Arrs, The Bull's Flead, The Commereinl, all croding the air of a traditional wurting man's pubs, a strikung contrast from those bass north of the rver

begin to peupy dart alleywas And cars pull up to matike their pick:

One prostitute mprosiches $L S^{\prime \prime}$ car. lesning on the window. "You fellas lookin' for business? $L S$ explans that it Warts to hear the stony of a laty worting the sireets. Hopping into the passenger seat of the cas, taicing shelter frum the biting wind, she tells us her hampowing atory; a mivaure of bad luck and batd chorices.
"People think we malke money, she says. "It wed to be 520 for oral and sek, Now girls do it fur a pithanse. You used to suake 2200 to $£ 300$ a night. Now you barely make $£ 100$. A lox of us ane home lens." She had uffered earlier to take us back to her apartment, presuming we Whra pimters. "That's juat the spiel, my deas."

Prostitution is dangerous trade. Deined by fear, the streets here bear witness to rapes and amackes regulariy, she says. There's maney to be had, stoien from the prastitures who vie for cach ather's punters. Hume Office figures show that 60 prostinutes have been murdered in the past decade in Britain. Butno meawure conald capture the prychollygical damage endured by these women,

Thure were seven giris raped up hase 1 couple of weeks aga I've been luxk [sic] to Wakefield and left myself. Thent was 2 diays gego." She concludes multieroffactly. The majurity of girls have been raped hewe.'
"Therc's a known pacdophile in the Ilass jus over there," she says, pointing to the multi-storcy cotucell flats. "tsest nigh he got me wrth a knife. How calt you go to a police officer and say, "T've been raped by a puinter'? All they sity 18 , "You've pul youmalf there"

Explaining thet she sews a wich crosssection of society from solicilors and lawyers to druaks snd kurs, she regales LS wih an anectove: "Thore was a wellknown solicitor what came tound bere and when le dropped his trousens, he hith stockings and tights. He got out of the car and I thought he had gone for a piss, but be went to the toilet. Whatever fluats your boat I thoaght."

She often reverts bock to the frequens rsftain that "there's.mo help for us, there"s no whate to airn to." assuraing no culpahility of her own. "There's one copppa Who puts his hand up inside you lookin' for drugs, what he calls 'a decrutching you'. Coppers say. 'Give me your drug dealer's mumber or Fill have your head

Why did she turn to prostithuin? "Ilve only done it for six months. That was only "cos I lost my mom and liute girl. Five years old, merningilis" she says uware of the sccusation then these could be scare stories designad to evoles of pathy, "If I hand the bollocits I'd do myself in. I would. Bur I don'y have the bollocks.
"I was on 40 ml of Methodone but because I miseod one appointment they Just stapped it They jwst doa't cart. There are druge workers aboul, but they're juge not bothered." A van. firm the Gienesis Truks an onganisation which aims is hejp the most vulnerable in society, used to deliper food and hoot drinks in the prostinucs, bul she says even that hus gons
"They think we"retough. I'm far from tough Hungry, cold, homelcis." she geys. Where does she slecp? "Anywhere I cas."

The police are well aware that Hulbeck is a prostiuxion hotspot. They are kiring the workers with Anti Social Behavior Ohiers (ASBO's) trying ts wash awry the cycle of sex and drugs. If March, the first ASBO was handed ant to a 3 1-yess-old woman in the Clupeltowa area. She was found guilty of soliciting and causing distress to local redideres.
"There's moncy mound here," she continues. "Why can't
they thelp? They"ve deaided to stop everybady with an ASBO." 405 ASBO's have been handed sout in the West Yortostire area since April 1999. But that won't deter the wamen from usmg the sincest and their bodies to fund their habits. "An ASBO's nat going on stop us because you can'i stop, you'we got a hribit to support.

Believe me. I am addicted to both trexoin and crack,"

Heroin and crack have dreachued the strues bere like the Inffux of sex warthers aturacted by quict: thoncy, hereasing the chances of contructing it Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI).
"It's such a furckin' shit life, you know, it really is. It's pain too. All we do is our thing and we go and give is to sorre black man." She sids chat there ane no pimys in the urea, bur is talking ahour the faceless scounges or the profession who profir ar the end of the line in the multi-miliors promad sex industry.

Quick to mulke busintask, she stops out of the car insisting that the vicious circle of sex and drugs will continue tonight. one the product of the other. But not before LS asks what she will do with the mantry eamod thougin her quest thy you didn"t have your horohn you coulde't go back on the street."

## Recipe:

1 fish fillet (preferably with the skin but skinless is fine) 100 ml white wine
1 tspn dried or ground coriander
1 tspn fennel seeds (crushed if possible)
A little butter
50 ml cream/crème fraiche

1 tbsp spring onions, finely chopped
$1 / 2$ tbsp capers in vinegar. drained

## Instructions

Lightly brush the skin of the fish fillet with oil to prevent from sticking, then place in a baking tray. Pour the white wine into the tray then sprinkle the coriander and fennel over the fish. Bake in a preheared oven at $190^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ for $10-12$ minutes. or accerding to peck instructions. A couple of minules before the fish is ready to come out, melt 2 tsp butter in a small saucepan. Add the chopped spring onions and capers.
then cook on a medium heat for 2-3 minutes. When the fish is ready, serve it onto the plate, reserving any juices left in the tray. Pour the reserved juice into the saucepan with the spring onions (add a little extra wine at this stage if you like). Bring to the boil, and then torn the heul right down before adding the cream. Stir well and allow to hent through, but not boil. Pour the sauce over the fish, served with sautéed new potintoes and salad.

Tip of the week
Salmon is one of the maxt widely available fish, and has become a lot cheaper in recent years. When you'tre buying ih, look for a good, deep pink colour with not too many white streaks of faxi Try and buy fillots with the akin on this way, you can cook it all the way through skin-side down, without suraing it. This prevents the fish irmon overecoking and drying out, und it flakes very easily off the rkin when cooked.
