• Four intruders caught in women's flat • Urgent investigation demanded

Security scare at St Mark's

Students at St Mark's University flats have demanded an urgent investigation into site security after four teenage intruders were caught in a women's flat last week.

Two women in the third floor Block 'B' flat held two of the youths until the police arrived. Two others escaped through a toilet window and are still on the run.

The intruders had been sleeping in a disused top-floor common room after breaking into the flat the previous day to steal the keys.

Trashed

Police found the common-room had been completely trashed.

ed. Godkin covered the walls, some of the chairs had been partially burnt and they had defecated in a cupboard. A cigarette was also found.

The two women, Corrine Simons, a second year medical student, and Rachael Moon, first year law student, are demanding an immediate investigation

into the dangerous security lapse. They want University Security to patrol the site.

"Anyone can walk around here. It's pathetic. Everyone has to keep their eyes open," said Corrine Simons.

Scared

"We were really scared. The consequences could have been much worse," Rachael Moon added.

Corrine discovered the youths in the corridor of her flat just before midnight on Thursday night.

"At first they didn't do a lot, they just looked at me", she said.

"I called for Rachael, who said to them 'what the hell are you doing here?' They said they wanted a piss. We completely freaked out".

The women pushed them into the bathroom and Corrine went to call the police.

"One ran back into the attic," said Rachael, "I grabbed another who went to hit me by the collar. Two others locked themselves in the toilet".

Escaped

When the police arrived, they found the two had escaped from

the toilet by breaking the window and climbing down the drainpipe. The two others were taken away.

This week, Judith Saunders, LDU Welfare Secretary joined in the call for an investigation into the security lapse.

"I am very concerned about what happened. Obviously, there is going to have to be an investigation into the incident and the general problem of security", she told Leeds Student on Wednesday.

Ian Mallinson, Site

agent for St Mark's, refused to comment on the incident, but said there was a general need for a greater police presence.

Regrettable

"We want more police around. We have had loads of incidents this term and we still don't see any more officers".

Harry Davies, Student Accommodation Officer, said the matter had been left in the hands of the police and University security. Whilst refusing to

speculate on the need for more security patrols, he said students had to be more safety conscious.

"It's regrettable but there is little that we can do about it. The people living there need to be more cautious, and not leave the doors open".

West Yorkshire Police confirmed they have arrested two people for entering a building without permission.

Leeds University Security could not be contacted for comment.

A Tory MP in Loughborough has accused the liberal university union newspaper of breaching Section 28, the controversial clause that bans local authorities from promoting lesbian and gay images.

Tony Meyer MP said Loughborough University Union's *Forward* magazine had broken the law by running several articles in connection with the Union's Gay and Lesbian Awareness Week in October. He decides to take the matter to court, it will be one of the first test cases of the clause.

For *Forward* said it was not worried by Meyer's threats and would continue to support Lesbian and Gay rights. "There were lots of life references, articles and cartoons, scattered about the pages of the paper. For instance we ran the life of the paper in pink and put the Lesbian and Gay logo on the

front page," Butler said. But the main problem was an article entitled "What is it like to be a lesbian and what comes of it?"

"This article provoked the most reaction," said Butler. "Forty-five people in one hall sent in a petition, with a claim of homosexuality was 'abhorred' and 'repugnant' although other students wrote in and supported it. 'Forward' could take the Union to court because it is affiliated to a college of Further Education and therefore partly funded by the local authority."

But Butler feels the MP's

claims do not hold water. "Finally, he can only sue the local authority and not us, and secondly he will have to prove it."

One of the local journalists I spoke to from the local paper, the *Kico*, said Meyer was a complete idiot, intent on stirring up trouble. He never got in touch with me directly.

"We have had Gay and Lesbian lectures in both years since the one that caused the fuss."

This University has a policy to support Lesbian and Gay rights and that is what we will continue to do."

SA loans Protest

Students from Leeds University joined forces with teachers, unions, local bodies and MPs on Thursday to sign a letter of protest to national banks involved in South Africa's debt scandal. The letter, signed by the Southern African Committee, urged the banks not to provide South Africa with any more loans.

Police, under direct orders from the Home Office, mounted a massive operation in York on Remembrance Sunday and stopped the British National Party from marching. One person was arrested for allegedly carrying an offensive weapon.

At the same time over three hundred anti-fascist demonstrators gathered at C88 Leeds Town to mark the BNP and message to demonstrate.

The police were enforcing a Home Office directive banning any political marches in the city last Sunday. Police stopped cars and minibuses at the entrance of the city and turned back almost all the BNP supporters.

About ten made it through the cordon and went to hold a march. The police immediately moved to disperse the group.

Banned

Tory Poll Tax figure 'inaccurate'

Leeds City Council has this week accused the government of deliberately understating the likely levels of poll tax.

In figures released last week, the government stated the change in Leeds should be £254, but council leader John Smeeth has said that the figure is likely to be around £320 if existing services are to be maintained.

Dismissing the government estimates as "fantasy", a council spokesperson said £48 million would be lost from the council budget if the government figure were accepted.

The official estimate, he added, is simply designed to be used as a weapon in the propaganda battle which will be waged against allegedly high spending councils.

Nationally, the figures have attracted further criticism for being too low. The armistice body CIPFA has estimated the average charge will be as much as 31% higher than the government's national average of £215.

And the Taxpayers' Association of District Councils has said it expects an average charge of £238.

Critics claim the government has based its figures on council budgets rather than actual spending, an inflation rate of 4.78%, and a 100% payment rate. Even a 5% non-payment rate could put the average charge up another £15.

Leeds council claims only 6000 people have said to register for the poll tax. Sources indicate the high registration rate means it highly unlikely there will be a non-payment. The register will be published on 20 December.

Sherban looks to Dash for victory

Two in-form Leeds University athletes will be challenging for the top places in the Leeds Dash 10k Road Race on Sunday 2nd December.

Angie Thon, Research Assistant in the Anatomy Dept., just better known as the new Women's National 10 mile Road Race Champion, will be less than 10 to win the Women's race over the shorter 10K distance. In the Men's race, John Shaver will be looking to repeat last year's win and continue his present streak of success.

Shorthorn walked away from the rest of the field in the Grey Foxen 30-mile event, winning by over 2 minutes in the Loch Daub. Though he will face much still opposition with another graduate of the University A.C., Greg Hall, last year's Yorkshire Cross Country Champ, coming in long his old adversary. The field will be altogether more testing in the race incorporates the Northern Counties A.A.'s Men's 10k Road Race Championships, and has a possible 1000 runners.

ANIMAL KINGDOM

Stephen King's 'Pet Sematary' is showing at the Queens Film week. Adam Higginbotham begs your attention.

Come closer, and I'll tell you a True Thing. If you think you've been frightened before, think again. If you were chilled by 'The Exorcist', bewitched by 'The Omen' and disturbed by 'Jaws', then watch 'Pet Sematary' with Derek Griffiths, reprints your worldview and your laundry situation. Stephen King has taken us film sorcery.

'Pet Sematary' marks the first occasion on which King has adapted one of his own books for the screen, and the result is one of the most numbingly horrifying films to be made since Freud's 1973 outing.

Dealing with a young college doctor and his family, who move to rural Maine, the film represents the logical conclusion of King's traditional exploration of the ill American. Apple Pie family unit for horror purposes. Once after their arrival, the doctor — Louis Creed — and his family are introduced by their neighbour, Jud Crandall, to a pet cemetery nearby, where local children bury pets killed on the busy road running through the village. As he vividly describes, however, the land beyond the cemetery is far more significant, and it is from here that King's dismemberment of the family ideal begins.

Like 'The Exorcist' the film creates much of its terror through its use of a child, supernaturally induced with a bestial ferocity and evil intentions which both revile and shock the audience. This conjunction of innocence is central to much of King's work, and

in 'Pet Sematary', is allied with notions of primal repression of both human and animal. It is this use of everyday fears, situations and characters — the family pet, the small boy — that makes this film so menacing.

However, ultimately it is the sense of grinding inevitability beaming upon this film that renders it remarkable. Within the first three minutes, an atmosphere

of dread, and the inescapable fate of the family is presented upon the screen. After the first four the wish to simply get up and leave the film, and not be forced to witness its unavoidable conclusion, is overwhelming.

The overriding insubstantiality of 'Pet Sematary' is underlined and consummated by the recurring visual

motif of the innumerable, bordering tracks that travel the road through the village, and by Brad Dourson's performance as Jud — the quintessential Mysterious Old Man. Without a doubt, this is the finest horror film made since Stephen King's books, and is almost certainly the film to revive a genre now hamstringed by publicity and a profusion of sequels.

NAKED SYMBOLISM

Peter Greenaway's 'The Cook, The Thief, His Wife and Her Lover' has been widely acclaimed as his best film to date and comes to the Bedford Playhouse on Monday. First Seán put out all his Gaudier suits and went to the preview.

Seen in a large and sumptuous restaurant called 'Le Hollandais', Peter Greenaway's impressively titled 'The Cook, The Thief, His Wife and Her Lover' has far more in common with a Jacobean tragedy than with anything else that is currently doing the rounds at your local cinema.

The film takes place over a period of ten nights and the action, preserving the unity of place, occurs solely within the confines of the restaurant.

The Cook of the title, is a taciturn Frenchman, who owns 'Le Hollandais' and as a consequence must suffer from the attentions of the obnoxious Michael Lombard, who plays The Thief, and his troupe of henchmen, who, in an effort to gain social respectability, dine there every night.

His wife, who has been raped into

submission by her bullying husband, as the title suggests, has an affair with a fellow diner which is conducted in the bathroom and the bedrooms of the restaurant, when they come to rest.

'The Cook, The Thief, etc.' combines some intense and savage images such as the opening sequence of The Thief and his henchmen intimidating a number of the kitchen staff by stripping him and their daubing him in excrement while first dogs roam the area gnawing on the waste from the kitchen's bins. These scenes, powerful enough in their own, gain in quality when compared with the dream-like quality of the building's interior. To emphasise the purity of the wife's relationship with her Lover, her bedroom takes place in the pristine white bathroom as opposed to the plush and demonic red and black decor of the dining room. To run the point home, the wife's Gaudier creates change colour as she moves from room to room reflecting the essence of the occupants' interiors.

The combination of the symbolism of the set and the moving performance of the actors makes 'The Cook, The Thief, His Wife and Her Lover' an emotional drawing and very satisfying film to watch.

Who Framed Roger Rabbit? as one might expect, was great entertainment, although we felt that the hype surrounding the film was largely unjustified. On a 24" screen, it was somewhat lacking in spectacular moments, the film's humour, which seemed incongruously adult for what is essentially a cartoon, made for 'Fun and joy for all and boy', as the saying goes, and of course the animated sequences are quite breathtaking. However, a plot of some kind would have been a good idea. Not really in

Matt Disney's class, but then Mary Poppins was pretty crap, wasn't it? There's not much to say to what's already been said about Rainman. Dustin Hoffman's performance as the autistic savant is seamless, and Tom Cruise is a pleasant surprise as the aggressive grasping entrepreneur. Perhaps he is an actor after all — we always thought he was a higher up. Rainman, was by far the best of the lot, with the rather glibly Bronson concoction coming an emphatic last.

INDEPENDENT WOMAN

Self-produced Queen of Rap, Roseanne Spence released her first EP, "Bad Sister," this month. Adam Naglethorn recognizes the use of the provocative "Bad meaning good."

Like a "Twilight Zone" character, Roseanne Spence has just emerged from her sequestered bunker into the post-apocalyptic world of contemporary rap music to discover an inhospitable world. When the sweet underground to make this first album, her singles "Go On Girl" and "Have A Nice Day" had established her as a major voice in rap. Unfortunately, things have changed since then, and now MMA have got all the big sticks and guns. Public fronts are holed up in the sociology library, and Toni Len is sitting on the limited heard of vinylee black leas. There it is, it seems, nothing less.

Similarly, Marley Marl, her producer and DJ, is in deep trouble if he thinks that his limited arsenal of beats/loops and rhythms is going to do any damage in an environment which has been seized by the multi-tracked gung ho barbarians of PR and castrated by the deceptively rowdy Delta Soul.

Spence has been making records since 1984 — two years, more, before Run-DMC hit with "Walk This Way" — and it is clear that she has simply left it too long before releasing a debut album. Although the material, at its best, is probably clever, at its worst it is insubstantially facile, and the use of samples sparse and utterly unimaginative: hearing Funky Drummer's dusted down for the umpteenth time is hardly going to improve James J. Collins' mix. The greatest strength of the album lies in the lyrics — the women who memorably maintained. Just like Diana Ross/Tina Turner/The Bess' will manages to show Marsh Cherry up as the assassin, posturing leader she is. "Independent Woman" makes Buffalo Spence look paralyzed, and "Fatal Attraction" asserts women's rights in extreme, as the male protagonist is forced to deal with an O'Jays/Ron Hubbard/Table Rockers. Unfortunately, the musical weakness of the record, despite the undeniably hard hits to the tin track, and the MARRS remix of "Live On Stage", renders much of it a squandering set that sounds like Minnie Mouse in a leather bala.

a lot. When this energy is channelled along melodic lines, however, the effort is needless... it's just plain energetic slinky toting. The big problem is consistency, for this valiantly winged bird launch and rapidly to London and Barcelona, displaying quite blatantly the good and bad of musical penetration. Even so this was all splendidly naive. The sound is hardly stretched in such terms as ingenuity, but it did sparkle, occasionally, through the sheer absence of that sticking beads and artificial rhythms. Out to watch.

LISTEN WITH MOTHER

Jason Brown tumbled down to the Riverside last week and watched Leeds fanatics (The Hollow Men). The Hollow Men are poised to clean up. Since 1988, rock's shift toward the margins has left many cold, the verbiage misanthropic churling of bands like Spacemusic 3, Loop, AP Kane et al has alienated those who'd rather listen to music than read miserable essays about it. Tonight, The Hollow Men related that they are capable of transcending the two, exhibiting the same exuberant that propelled RDM to immortality, namely a most marriage of self-out and sensibility. "Your strength is that they have played what they and immediate melody on one endless monolith. "Reveries" begins from a waxy intro to a solid guitar solo to

SUNSHINE AND RAIN

Last week, those dismal propensities the Primitives proved at the Abbey Smith road. Phil Smith listened in.

The Primitives have changed leaving aside the obvious cosmetic changes to their local point (i.e. Tracy's infamous red hair, it is plain to see that they have moved on from the delinquent bubblegum pop of their first album "Cassidy").

It's not so much a change in attitude — the Primitives have and always will look to produce the perfect

"drowsiness" three minute pop song, but more in terms of execution. As the first side of their current album "Pure" will testify, the stakes are still a major influence but now it is the psychedelic and hallucinogenic and of the decade.

Their debut LP surfaced at a time when the music press were lauding the return of "Pure pop", and we saw the

serious, "sensitive" and "naive" Tracy Tracy who stayed glued to the wheel at all right. Now, in 1989, the year of the Stone Roses it's the bohemian Tracy who gyrates, vibrates and ripples and just can't stay still.

When the Primitives really do succeed live is met with the incongruous drizzle of "Shine" and "All the way down", but rather with the petty spiritualism of "Can't bring me down". — "Some people should be in the zoo now", continuing faithfully in the tradition of the Laid Classic "Really Stupid". Other highs are the much maligned "Secrets" and inevitably "Cassidy" during which Tracy winks knowingly, causing a dozen spotty pre-pubescent to groan: "Did you see that, she was winking at me!" The emotional manipulation becomes clearer as they leave — "I'll treasure this night forever", punts Tracy and heart strings twine.

Once a month a couple of hundred "drug-busy under-aged young people" (according to you know what source) get into the nearest club in town in search of a night of outside in London as a vocal, and in many, southern type contrasted in front, in Manchester, the girl behind holding her ridiculously baggy jeans above her knees and out of the public's.

The excruciating slow moving crowd moved enough to allow us to get in to see the P.A. to Digital Underground. Personal Appearances usually mean you get to see a couple of pretty people moving over their record with huge smiles and not a lot else — Big Fun at The World for

example. This P.A., however, turned into a fully fledged gig about only half an hour long.

The comparison to the daily age hip happens is useful Digital Underground. This was Ho-Ho of a sort not usually seen in Britain where most gigs are virtually P.A.s. All the bass was live as opposed to the tapes you come to expect and was excellent to boot. D.J. Pure related and scratched as well as you're likely to see and hear — almost as good as Cheese and Camerony and certainly the best that Leeds has seen. The beats and rhymes were excellent.

Concluding with a lengthy version of their new hit Demosuchidale and their new single they made away for the real business of the night — Serious Dancing.

One of the best dance groups and dance nights of the moment, lose yourself in the beats.

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London Contemporary Dance Theatre have been hailed as "the greatest dancers in the world." Some critics were impressed.

When one of the Beatles started strolling into a "house", abstract improvisation in the first dance I started getting that "left out in the cold" feeling of partnership.

It was nothing less than a welcome distraction when the solo dancer started striding off his city path to become the dance of the dance, "Metamorphosis." The piece was based on the idea of

people acting differently in different settings; the naked individual not necessarily being the genuine article, "just a different person."

Nevertheless, it was with a stifled sigh of relief too many kindly commentators at these reviews that I discovered the subsequent dances to be a little more up-beat. "Orpheus" is a dance not totally exempt from the trances of Vietnam cliché and metaphors in a dramatic, and at times, wailing exploration of war's machine, its pain, and grueling games.

Not any past L.C.D.T.'s achievement of variation. Not only were the styles of music and dance vastly contrasting, but the dancers themselves did not belong

with the stereotypical ranks of Young, Lean, and Black that people often associate with Modern Dance.

Without a doubt the dance "Isadora" stole the show. To the meticulous accompaniment of a solo string, a mixed couple interacted with a flawless coordination that had the audience bound in these minutes of rapture.

London Contemporary Dance Theatre have got themselves sorted. Their performance left one with the feeling that any complaints must be due to a discrepancy in personal taste rather than a flaw on the part of the performers. I might even forgive the Beatles.

RHUBARB RHUBARB

The word *pretentious* is dead. It passed away after a preliminary seizure and gradually overwhelming seas of mis- and over-use. Like other gear *Stardomism* it didn't fade much of a change.

The truly pretentious are those who try to create the impression of being something that they emphatically are not. Through their behavior and words they condemn themselves in the eye of the discerning onlooker.

Unfortunately it is the discerning onlooker, who although not yet quite in the range of extinction, are certainly a sub-species that is far from healthy in this violent community of ours. Just a tiny piece of evidence that is immediately responsible for the first sickness of the great adjective beginning with P.

The word is larger indeed anything because it is a ready-to-use item of inflated vocabulary that is most often resorted out of the mouths of those who aren't bothered to think. Among a large group of people, *pretentious* is used to describe the overstatement and involved in vaguely creative activities or so-called "arts omnes." Such labeling is ridiculous.

Certainly there are a good number of pretentious in the true sense of the word striding wondrously about the campus, to admit fact like several I have come across was an inevitable brand of mine who went off for his first year in University and returned in a fairly complete violation of his father's will. He would continuously suggest that we "talk philosophy" as late hours off into a corner where we could use the word and adapt a pose of deep thought, or scribble a few verses of poetry and then make a great show of hiding it, being only to mention it off, so casually of every opportunity.

What makes such shamers as these pretentious is that their claims to be intellectual or important are unwarranted and their concern with such matters is based more on wanting an image, on being important, than genuine interest or enthusiasm for what they are doing. There are many others who are attacked as pretentious but do not deserve the tag. For example, many on Old Red conversation corners of "I'm not going to say that pretentious things belong." Certainly there are people in the Theatre Group with no talent who are hell-bent on looking carefully at what and talking over. But at the same time there are those who do have good ideas and talent, who believe in what they are doing.

The arts and those involved in them get the real stick for being "pretentious," but only should they. There are students in our school who are self-consciously trying to set themselves up as something they are not. Surely a guy who makes a great show of coming along in drama group but never plays, merits is equally qualified for the label "pretentious." But sports players are not condemned to a pretentious life unless going in the arts world has this tag in the student community. This is not, back.

Consequently, a real good measure of the arts is only taken a handful of effort to look at each book, play, film, or exhibition or individual in turn and then have an opinion about them. The kind of writing off whole groups as pretentious is narrow minded, means nothing and reflects the excess of those who abuse the P word.

WOMEN OF SUBSTANCE

The City gallery has a season entitled "Images of Women" running until January. Kristie Skinner reviews the exhibition that runs until the New Year and Vanessa Marshall samples one of the performances, "Anyone Can Appear," but for some inexplicable reason has received substantial media attention.

This exhibition presents the various ways in which women have been portrayed by artists since the days of Ancient Greece. By addressing such an evocative subject I expected that the exhibition would be dominated by the obvious, even interpretations. Judging by many reviews, this was a general assumption as it was criticised for its lack of focus.

I was soon relieved however that I had not been deceived, but simply supplied with six categories (Woman as Artist and Muse, Woman and Child, Woman at Home and at Work, in the Garden of Eden, Woman and Man, Woman and Power) and some questions to ask myself (Images of women? By whom? For whom?).

Thus equipped, a flick of a collection begins to appear, third views of women as emperors, decorated prostitutes like Rembrandt in Home Bright — Heals Light are required to modern parodies of this image (Chapman's with Black & White). In the life-size metal sculpture of a confident Elizabeth I and an envious Philip, it of Louis playing her/herself. Andy-cide is placed next to the portrait of the Conservative Party Conference 1982. Both pieces were commissioned to promote the leadership qualities in both women. Inevitably, the artwork has been interpreted as portraying the other figures in each piece as disempowered and wronged, leaving immediately and contrasts the

this made the exhibition fun and challenging and the presence of some classics enhanced the experience. In the absence of repeat visits, the exhibition did leave me slightly confused. As the variety of women still remains unclear, however, leaving the gallery with questions is surely more healthy than supposed answers.

The most intriguing thing about this "performance" was the title itself. Remember this not the "handout" distributed prior to "curtain-up" gave much indication of the nature nor content of the piece. In a nutshell or rather twenty-eight and a half minutes (and I was counting) of sexual innuendo, Sylvia dictated from six or seven sheets of A4 her version of the stereotypes which define and caricature women's lives.

The media was an anti-climax after the extremely bizarre scenes. Eyes were drawn towards four flamboyant pink ornate sprayed pillars placed strategically in the centre of things amidst piles of smog pink paint, including a toy telephone, 12 skirts, six pink buckets, an outboard motor, a pile of super-soakers and a pile of apples (grapes?).

As for an entire rendition of "She" from Charles Aznavour (a pink Song recorded) Sylvia arrived on stage and settled down with her back to me over a third of the audience. The visual sexuality of her appearance and surroundings only emphasized her far, ridiculous and often inaudible delivery of the stereotyped female role. Peculiarly symbolic statements of "ouch" were interspersed with moments of embarrassing, impossible silence and much other meaning.

Full marks for the original idea of the "performance", although I found the delivery appalling and the content obvious. I'm not sure Sylvia Valente would have been impressed either.

Enchanted Evening

That great war-time love "South Pacific" is at the Alhambra, Bradford for the next two weeks. Deborah Cooper rang along with the gramme.

'South Pacific" is a lesson for all those girls who aren't sure whether they've found "Mr Right". Gentle, especially if you're a mysterious Frenchman with a beautiful island retreat. But when the naive American navy nurse Nellie Forbush falls for little de Bengue she has to face the "hidden extras" — his children by his first marriage. Parallel to this is the romance of Liat, a native girl and Lt Joe Cobb, who finds that society would frown on his liaison.

Is *South Pacific* the product of a musical set in the great genres and mainstream tradition has up to its high reputation? Genna Coven as Nellie sings clearly and unpretentiously and is well partnered by the more baritone of Richard Jordan, as little de Bengue and opposite. Words may be prized to perfection by Bertie Passey.

The production's standout element was the Cole Porter romance. This appears more of a time-filler than a moving romance. For general emphasis was needed for the musical to have overall balance.

The musical was excellent. Real emotion and passion helped to carry over a few weak moments. Full credit must also be given to the set designer, Steve Parsons, whose waterfall backdrop was stunning.

The real star of the show is the music. When you hear such familiar songs as "Some Enchanted Evening", "Happy Talk" and "You've Got That Thing About You" you can't help but sing along. The music is so catchy and so clearly defined the coach loads of gramme who were still humming as they went home.
