

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FOREWORD

By 1914 the Ilkley Gazette had been in print for over 60 years – commencing in May 1861, although archival records only date from January 1868. The paper in peacetime not only covered local news but aspects of national and international news.

During the First World War a few more photographs began to appear and there were accounts of the achievements of the living and dead on the battlefields of Europe, and the Middle East; at sea globally; and increasingly the activities of Ilkley personnel in the Royal Flying Corps (later the RAF).

Adverts were rather sparse, but there were regular messages from government sources. Sport and items of interest to women and children were included along with increasing acknowledgement of women's role in the War. The stories of refugees from war-torn Belgium in Ilkley were covered regularly.

Ilkley even in Wartime was seen as a place to holiday, convalesce, walk the Moors, to take the waters and breathe in unpolluted air. People in the pre-radio era relied on the local papers for a great deal of varied information; and the picture houses also played their part.

I wish to thank Newsquest (Yorkshire and North East) Ltd., various editors and all the staff at the offices of the Ilkley Gazette for their support over the three years of my archival research from the original papers. To Craven Stationery very many thanks for all their hard work on my behalf and Jonathan White, Addingham for proof reading the draft copies. With medical party, 230 including 200 other ranks to camps on Bangkok to Moulmein railway. 15 died and later at Kanchanabari joined by medical party. From August 1944 to March 1945 built camps and made tunnels in the hills for fuel and ammunition. Moved 1,500 miles and camp 18 miles North East of Bangkok, lost weight but fairly fit. He was in Bangkok at the time Japanese surrender. First Ilkley man back as a POW from Japan.

Captured in Eindhoven 21/09/1944 where in company of AA regt while driving jeep to one of his batteries. Jeep ambushed and fired on - luckily he and his driver OK.

60 mile march to Amersfoort then to Limburg transit camp near Frankfurt, walked 200 miles in 7 days and in cattle truck with 42 officers, tried to escape, but discovered and nearly shot.

At Limburg with 12,000 other ranks. There were 350 officers in 1 hut. Then to Hadamar camp and met General Forture 51st Highland Division. Captured at Saint-Valery-en-Caux in June 1940 and finally Oflag 79 Brunswick.

Cigaretes £35 for 100. No heating - no washing as no hot water. His weight dropped from 12st 7lbs to 9st 12lbs. Germans stopped Red Cross parcels Xmas 1944. After liberation sacks of undelivered letters found plus nearly 1 million Red Cross Parcels.

Later captured at Singapore - engaged by Japanese in break up of motor cars - then on railway construction laying sleepers & building embankments. Quite well treated. Had met Ilkley men Douthwaite and West in prison who both subsequently died, the former in Singapore and the latter in Thailand. Cawood in French Indo China when the Japanese surrendered but not surprised as he received the news by listening to a secret wireless set!

Worked in a Sudetenland petrol factory 12 hours a day 7 days a week - been bombed 18 times by the RAF in the last 12 months. Raids allowed POWs to get food while guards took over. Red Cross parcels stopped post Xmas 1944. He escaped in March 1945 with a friend - donned civilian outfit and left factory with rest of workers. Marched 100 km to outskirts of Prague where they met with Czech patriots and were given food, clothes and a bath. They visited Rostock Village Hospital where there were 49 English speaking Frenchmen from Buchenwald Concentration Camp. They decided against staying in hospital and moved on

to the next village. This was just as well as the next day the SS shot up Rostock in a raid including the hospital where they cut off the noses and ears of the French people there. They reached Prague before the Russians and picked up by Czech Partisans of whom the women members believed they were SS but luckily they were in touch with an English speaking man who was convinced of their identity.

They were in Prague on VE day and the Russians arrived 3 days later. The Czechs took revenge on the Germans, hanging and shooting many of them. They were given transport by the Czechs and passed through Russian lines to reach the Americans.

In Germany in Stalag XVIII A. Acknowledged receipt of parcels and was most grateful in particular for the cigarettes.

Lt. Ford then prisoner again. He took part in fighting ar Bir Bulafar where he was wounded and taken as a POW to a Greek Hospital. Then by train as a POW to Germany where he was in two camps, Stalag 8B and Oflag 7B. In one of these camps was another Ilkley man Lt Philip K Wicksteed who was taken as a prisoner in Greece.

Then every man robbed of their possessions. By July 1945 6000 in Changi which had accommodation for only 700 and further 6000 were put in jail if Mountbatten attacked through Malaya.

Machine guns installed all round the prison walls for this possible action. Large stocks medicine from Red X found after surrender but witheld from POWs. Used by Japanese - led to many POW deaths. When 2nd near Japanese let the Red X parcels through, but food parcels opened by the Japanese and eaten by them.

In hospital on VJ Day and taken aboard a hospital ship on a stretcher. Weighed only 7 stone - down from 12 stones 7 lbs. In last weeks said Harper most of the hospital cases were losing weight and if war had lasted would have died. In Singapore all the time he was a prisoner. When not in hospital engaged in cultivating gardens in which prisoners grew food but they still

suffered from lack of food. Means of secreting wireless sets and kept in touch with the news. Good Allied news rationed as it was feared jubilant faces would give them away and lead to injuries and searches. Japanese told them news if good for Japan such as the death of President Roosevelt in USA.

First interned - placed in 'Gloucester' and 'Hong Kong' hotels. Food through Red X parcels. Letters took a year to arrive on occasion and some food parcels not distributed. Held for 400 days but then return to Hong Kong eventually. He was a Chinese speaker and had been due to leave HK when Pearl Harbour intervened 7 December 1941.

SS deported 1700 prisoners by train to Germany including 160 GB/US airmen. 75 in a truck in a 4 day journey to Buchenwald. Eventually in Oct 44 to Stalagluft 3A near Berlin (30 miles). Russians broke through and then to US lines and up to Brunswick, from there to Rheims and UK.

On 09/02/1945 Secretary Menston POW Club Mrs L. Booth read letter from relative in Luft 3 POW camp dated 18/11/44. "Just received in camp a new prisoner by the name of Jackson from Ilkley. Everything strange to newcomer but took him in hand and showed him ropes. He is quite well".

Moved to Stalag 8B and shackled at the ankles after Dieppe raid. Wrists fastened with string for 6 weeks and then for 14 months shackled. Stayed behind when Russians near, but Germans found them and put them on train South. Escaped and picked

up in Czechoslovakia and handed to Gestapo. 2 weeks in prison and then on another train and escaped again. Found by Russians near Elbe. 3 weeks with the Russians and then to US lines by River Elbe.

First military man to be called up in Ilkley. Writes to Otley and Wharfedale POW Club - 'Welcomes cigarette parcels. Limited number of cards per month. Future success to POW Friendship committee in Ilkley. One gets used to life out here and how it is spent. Cigarettes, letters and parcels from home and British Red Cross parcels are greatest comfort to any POW'.

In Royal Signals captured St Valery with Sgt Dubison. As he was slightly wounded he spent 3 months in hospital in Rowen. Initially in good camp at Tittmonning (Oflag 70) - received American parcels and access to a prison library with 3,000 books.

Instrumental as four and a half years as POW in Germany in constructing a wireless receiver out of cocoa tins and other materials. Pre-war was an expert in wireless research and had a transmitting licence. 1939 won Wortley-Talbot cup for most meritorious contribution to T & R Bulletin magazine of Radio Society of GB. Call sign G6SN. At Leeds Uni 1921 - 1925 to study engineering.

At camp at Rotenburg-am-Fulda (Oflag 9 A/Z) near Kassel made a wireless set. Bought cinema gear from Germans but our intention to use talkie gear for radio receiver for BBC News. Officers left and took cinema gear, but left some gear in camp (Germans not interested).

Took valve and a few condensers to build up a receiver to take BBC news. Spindles from thermometer cases, plates from cocoa tins and celluloid tooth brush handles formed insulation for condensers. Valve holders - Bakelite ash tray - coil formers as cardboard tubes and toilet roll and impregnated candle wax.

Plug in coils used, so various frequencies operated by two knitting needles - main leads and aerials between cracks in boards. Apparatus closed down and made unseen should any German appear. Building was clear of Germans but if enemy did appear the look out would merely saunter away - knock on effect as back look out did the same, all in 10 to 12 seconds.

After intensive search set removed to dining room. Set into wall at false side of cupboard. Germans did find 1/2 a set and warnings issued, but 10 days nightly service improved. Swedish YMCA (on German transmission) was loaned to us installed in the guard room, but they turned it on when we asked (as it was their news). It came through 3 or 4 times a day. So to avoid detection only 1 GB transmission used 6pm or 9pm - continued right up to March, out from camp in late March 1945. Set left in camp. Later the War Office allowed Shackleton to fly out to Germany to remove the set and anything else left there. Rothenburg in U.S. zone and they were happy to help.

Early 1945 Gestapo visited the camp in force and spent a day thoroughly searching. Gestapo agents tried to open 'hide' with crowbars and spent 5 minutes trying and then gave up. Had plans for transmission 1944 to do 2 way transmission between Allies and POWs - hard to do as Germans in the building. A transmitter could have been ready 40 hours, but due to Arnhem failure British officers marched East, picked up 150 miles away before Allies could reach us. The USAF bombed the area and electricity regularly out. POWs stole a German ventilating fan and work commenced on alternate supply in Jan 1945 and practically complete by the time camp was abandoned.

At Fulda, Germans less inclined to impose and implement orders as it neared the end. Marched West 16 kilometeres a day

in 15 days. Bread 4lbs; meat 7oz; potatoes 5 1/2 lbs; coffee 1/2 oz; cereals 3 1/2 oz; peas 5 1/2 oz; vegetables 4 1/2 lbs; margarine 6oz; sugar 5 oz; jam 5oz; cheese 2 1/2 oz.

At the time POWs moved out, a transformer under construction, but officers ordered to leave the camp before completion. German cables under the camp and if fuse failed in box fibres made a false key, to replace a blown fuse was under a German sentry. If found by German's apparatus confiscated and operators probably shot. Apparatus at home in the UK and hopefully in the Imperial War Museum in London.
