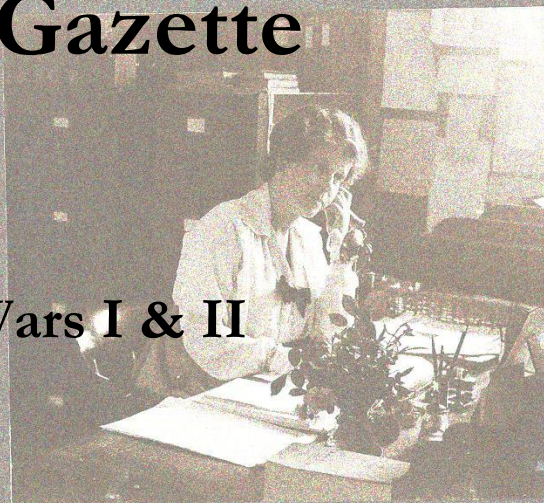

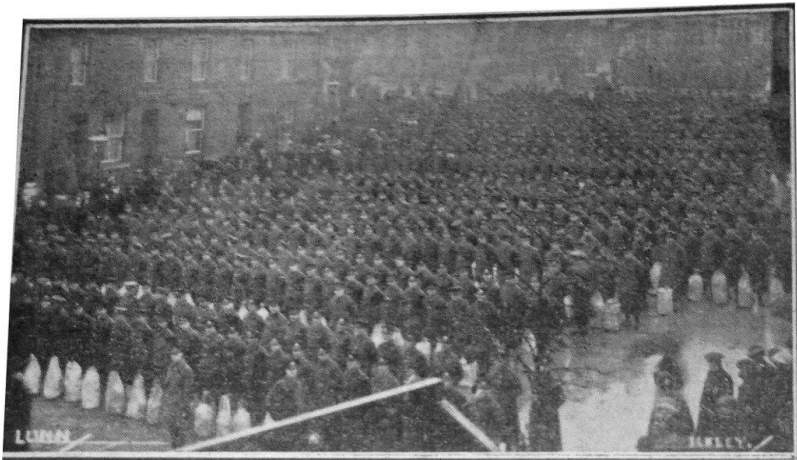

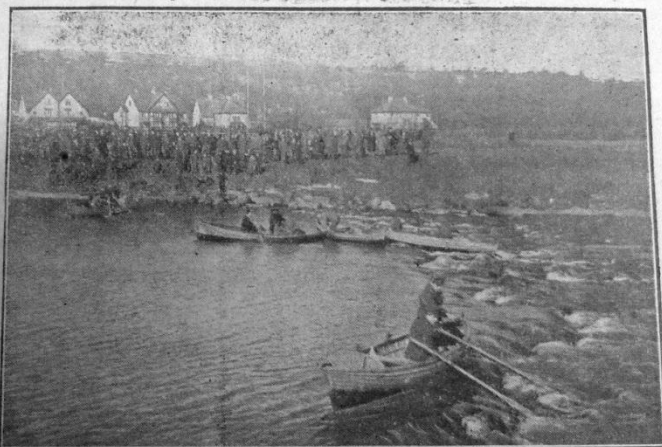

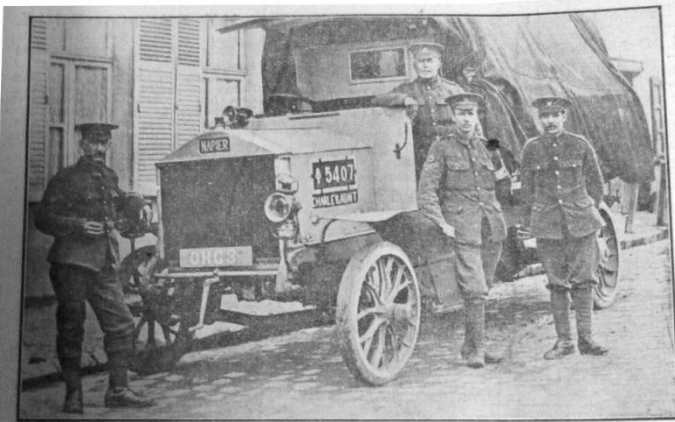

The above interesting photograph from the front depicts the Napier War Office Transport Lorry, which has been in active service from the commencement of the war, and took part in the famous retreat from Mons. It will be observed that it has been christened Charley’s Aunt, and the name is painted on the side of the bonnet. When British vehicles first went abroad for war service it was customary for drivers so to christen them, but an order was issued that the practice was to be discontinued. Owing to the fact, however, that this van has run so consistently all through, and is still running well, the driver informs us that the War Office has granted special permission to him to retain the name. “Charley’s Aunt” is being performed at the King’s Hall, Tikley, this week.

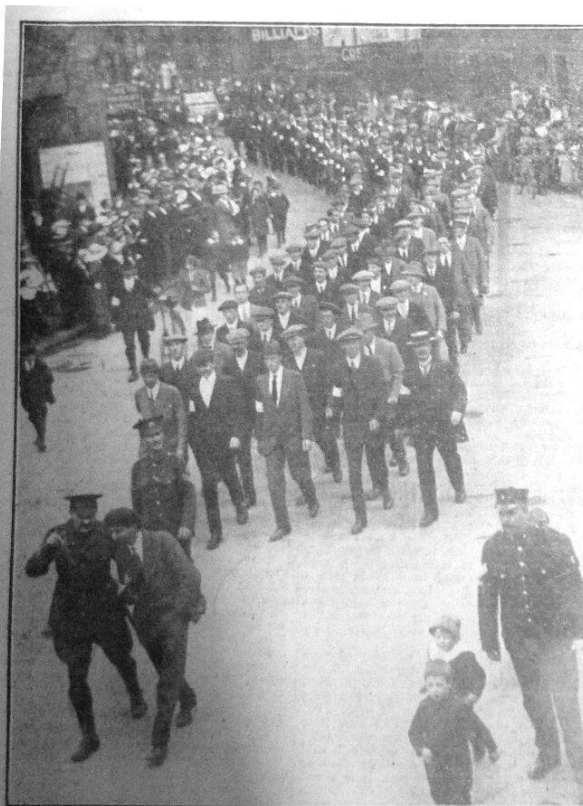

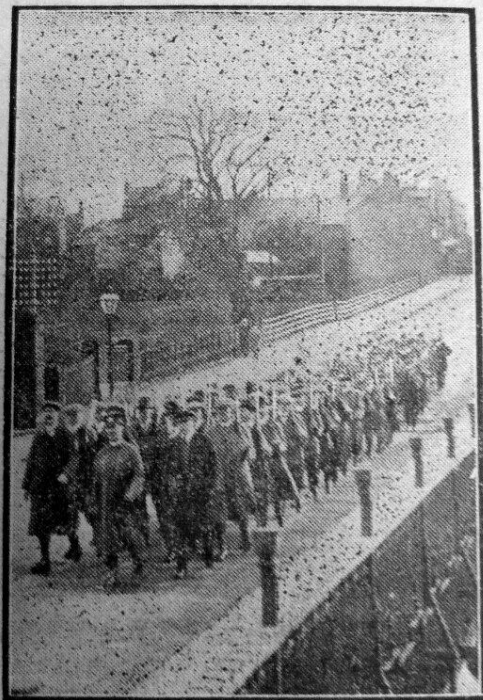
Sister Katie Scott, the eldest daughter of Mr. W. Scott, photographer, Ilkley, who performed such excellent work with the Greek Army during the Balkan War, has once more left for service on the Continent. She left England this week to take up hospital work in France. She is a nursing sister of the 2nd Western Military Hospital, Manchester, a hospital which holds the record for having treated more sick and wounded soldiers of the Expeditionary Force than any other hospital in the country. When the last report was issued, the total number to have passed through the hospital was 10,507 cases.

It will be remembered that in recognition of the value of the services she rendered in similar work during the Balkan War, Sister Scott received the Greek War Medal presented by the King of Greece to his troops, and also the Red Cross medal presented by the Queen of Greece for hospital work. Since returning to England, Sister Scott has been attached to the Territorial Army, and she, and two other nurses from Manchester, who went through the Balkan War, are amongst those selected for service abroad. They had to report themselves to the authorities in London on Tuesday, and crossed over to Boulogne on Wednesday.

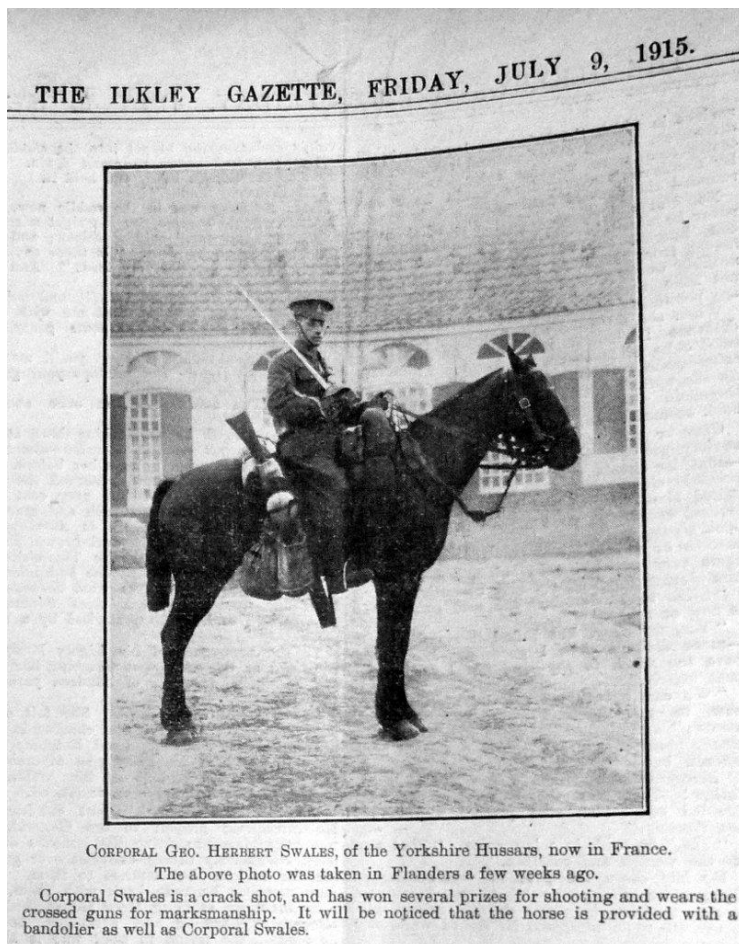

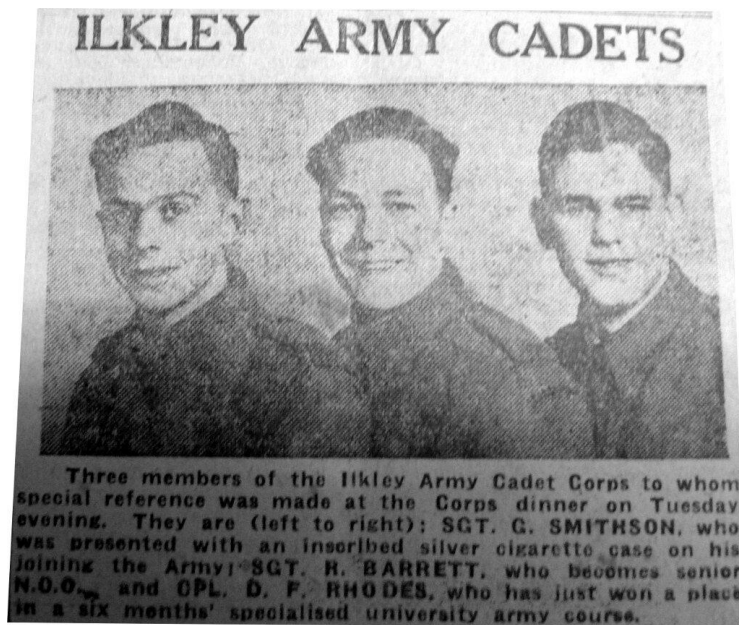

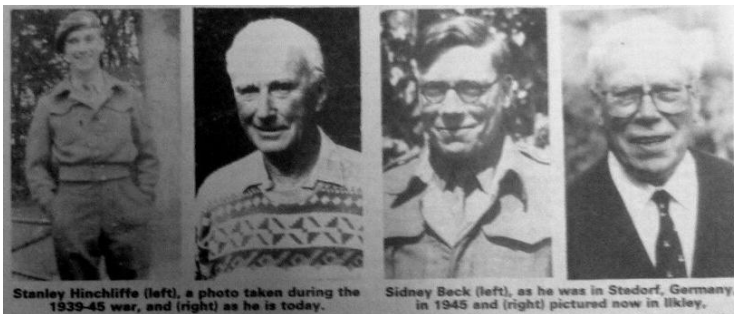

Captain Jack Green

Captain Jack Green (35) elder son of Mr. John Green Wood Royd, The Drive, Ber Rhydding, arrived home on Tuesday evening. He has been a prisoner in Germany since November, 1943 when he was captured at Leros in the Dodecanese. Capt. Green was liberated from Oflag 79 near Brunswick by the American 9th Army.

He joined up three months before the outbreak of war, and served in France from November, 1939, to June, 1940, being evacuated from St. Nazaire. After returning to England he was sent to Malta, where he served for three years. He had been serving in the Middle East for six weeks when he was captured. Captain Green spent four months in a prison base near Munich, before being sent to Oflag 79.

Born at Silsden, he was educated at Hailebury, where he was heavy-weight boxing champion, and whom he represented in Public School boxing tournaments. After leaving school, he played forward with the Ilkley Rugby Club, and was a member of the team which reached the Yorkshire Cup final in 1930.

after nearly five years in German hands. Warrant Officer Holmes was captured after a raid on Munster when his plane was hit by flak, and he crashed and landed in Holland. He was free for four days before he was taken prisoner. Warrant Officer Holmes was one of the first Ilkley men to be captured, and he was then only 18 years of age.

He has been in about 10 different prison camps, some of which he describes as "fairly decent" and others as "bad." Most of his time was spent in Stalag Luft 3, an Air Force camp.

Shortly after joining, he was transferred to Liaison Command, and served with them when enemy air attacks against Britain were at their height. After the Battle of Britain he was transferred to the R.A.F. Regiment.

Lt.-Col. George E. Rhodes, R.E., son of Mr. William Rhodes, a former member of the Ilkley Urban District Council. Lt.-Col. Rhodes, who is a Civil Engineer and a Barrister at Law, is one of H.M. Instructors on the staff of the Chief Engineer

at the Ministry of Health, and was for many years Executive Engineer in the Public Works Department of the Indian Civil Service. He is now on the Headquarters staff of the Allied Control Commission, Allied Armies in Italy. Telling of the eruption of Vesuvius, which was the most violent for 75 years, he writes:—

“It was a great experience, the flames, the molten rocks and lava, the thunder of the explosions under one's feet, and the blast of steam, smoke and rocks hurled hundreds of feet into the air. And below, 4,000 feet, the vineyards, orange groves and lemons, and the fruit orchards on

BEN RHYDDING OFFICER KILLED

Sub-Lieut. John Abbott King, Fleet Air Arm, elder son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur King, Wharfedale Grange Farm, Heb. Rhydding, has been killed on active service. Aged 22, he was an old boy of Ilkley Grammar School. He joined the Fleet Air Arm six months ago and was commissioned six months ago.

Mr. Arthur King is well known to Forthwaite Rugby followers. Prior to the war he played with distinction for Haslingley and Yorkham and took part in England trials. Since the war he has not taken an active interest in the Ilkley Rugby Club.

Sub-Lieut. King was named after his uncle, Mr. John Abbott King, the Haslingley Yorkshire and England forward, who lost his life in 1916 whilst serving with the Liverpool Scottish.

This is a photograph of the Ilkley Spitfire. It will be recalled that last September within little over a fortnight a sum of over £6,000 was raised in Ilkley as the contribution towards the purchase of a Spitfire. It came as a spontaneous gift from the whole town. In that remarkable fortnight of giving, children contributed their "Saturday Pennies," a woman gave her ring, an Old Age Pensioner gave her full pension for the week, the whole town came together to give. The money "walked in on its own feet."¹³

In response came an acknowledgment from Lord Beaverbrook, who, in his reply, said, "Their 'plane shall be called 'Ilkley' and it will bear witness in the skies to their generosity and patriotism."

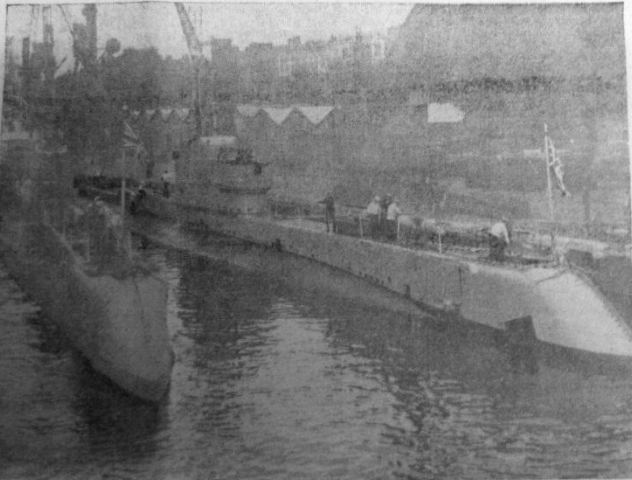
This week Mr. Herbert Green received from the Public Relations Branch of the Ministry of Aircraft Production, two photographs, one of which is reproduced above, and a letter saying, "I have pleasure in enclosing herewith two photographs of the Spitfire aircraft presented to the nation by the people of Ilkley. This aircraft has the name 'Ilkley' inscribed on the fuselage, and, if at all possible, I will endeavour to advise you of the machine's exploits against the enemy."¹⁴

To this Mr. Green has replied, "On behalf of the committee of the Ilkley Spitfire Fund I beg to thank you kindly for sending the two photographs of the Spitfire (Ilkley) named after our town. I feel certain that the people of Ilkley, who are so proud and honoured at being able to give this machine to the country, will eagerly look forward to the reports of its exploits against the common enemy."

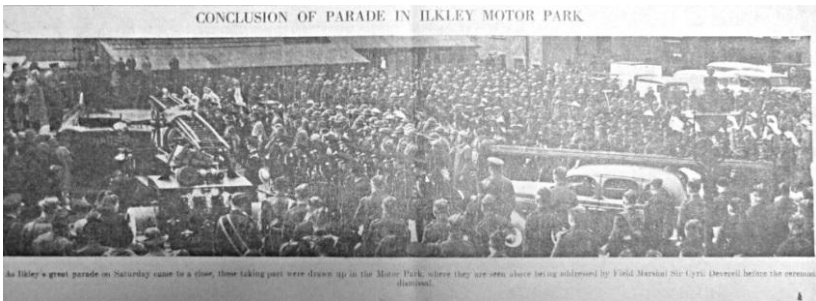
