I studied my undergraduate degree here in my late 30s, completed my PGCE in the School of Education and then I became a secondary school teacher and an A-level examiner. During my career I became interested in the language used by teachers in relation to behaviour in the classroom and decided I wanted to do a PhD. I returned to Leeds on a PhD scholarship and have taught here ever since.

My specialism is sociolinguistics but one of my key interests focuses on developing students' academic and study skills to help them understand what to expect from academic life. I enjoy teaching because I like the idea that I've managed to take a concept and convey it to somebody else in a way that makes it exciting for them, makes them want to understand it and retain it because it interests them. The smaller teaching groups at postgraduate level mean there's the potential for a much deeper discussion which is very rewarding. In particular, I like that I can make sure that academic thought doesn't end up being seen as something that happens separately from real life, and that's really where my work with the M&S Company Archive comes in.

Using Archive resources, including newspaper cuttings, staff magazines and advertising material, I developed teaching material for A-level English language teachers, to help with the linguistic components of the curriculum. The resources demonstrate how language has changed over time and the material I've put together has been well received by teachers. As part of my University Student Education Fellowship, I've been awarded project funding and have used this to develop the scheme further. We are employing a previous postgraduate student to help deliver the project and introduce an undergraduate module that will allow students to produce their own packs and lesson plans to deliver in schools.

RESEARCH EXCELLENCE

We are one of the largest research-intensive institutions in the UK. Our size and breadth means we can bring together multidisciplinary teams of researchers to help tackle some of the major global challenges of today.

From searching for a cure for Ebola and building the next generation of robotics systems to developing global climate change solutions and understanding the risks to international food security, our research community is in demand across the globe.

Our extensive research and the funding it brings means we can invest in the best facilities and attract staff engaged in pioneering research. You may even find that your course has modules taught by academics from other disciplines, giving you a greater understanding of your subject area from different academic perspectives.

Our original, innovative and creative research leads the way in many fields, including medical and biological engineering, electronic and electrical engineering, political communication, climate science, design, data analytics, medicine, structural biology, sports science, law, business and textile technologies. Here are just a few examples:

- We undertake more world-leading climate change research than any other UK institution.
 Based at the University of Leeds, the Priestley International Centre for Climate is a world-leading interdisciplinary centre, providing robust and timely climate research that influences international policy and underpins global climate solutions.
- Our Institute of Medical and Biological Engineering (iMBE) is one of the world's top 10 bioengineering research institutes. Its pioneering research in developing world-leading technologies is making a real difference to people's lives, including joint replacements and tissue repair to support longer and more active lifestyles for an ageing population.

- The Leeds Institute for Data Analytics (LIDA) offers secure, state-of-the-art facilities to analyse large volumes of highly complex data which needs innovative processing and interpretation before it can offer valuable information and insights. This purpose-built facility brings together researchers and data scientists from different fields to analyse data spanning a wide range of topics, from mapping consumer trends to understanding the relationships between shopping habits and health outcomes such as obesity or diabetes.
- Whether it's designing systems to help patients recover after stroke or building robots to explore previously unseen chambers in the Egyptian pyramids, we are recognised as being at the forefront of robot design and construction. The £4.3m national robotics facility based at Leeds gives our researchers and industrial partners access to an advanced suite of technologies, including one of the world's largest 3D printers.
- The new Cultural Institute, launching in autumn 2016, will provide a gateway to our unrivalled cultural treasures at the University and help boost our engagement with the cultural and creative industries. The Institute's research will address some of the most difficult issues facing humanity, while its partnerships will open up opportunities for our students to connect with some of the finest creative minds. As well as widening community involvement through cultural events and activities, the Institute will play a key part in Leeds' bid for European Capital of Culture 2023.

Research partnerships

We have strong partnerships with industry and work collaboratively to make the most of our vast knowledge and research – creating a rich, stimulating and exciting environment in which to learn. Some of our long-term collaborations with organisations across a range of industries include Jaguar Land Rover, Opera North, M&S, Procter & Gamble, AstraZeneca, Unilever, Volvo and Yorkshire Water. We also have partnerships with universities, companies and NGOs around the world and our alumni community of more than 240,000 Leeds graduates in over 180 countries are always keen to extend their influential policy, business and professional networks to us. We maximise the impact of our research and innovation through international strategic collaborations. We're a member of the Worldwide Universities Network, a partnership of 18 research-intensive universities collaborating on global issues and we've also developed significant international links through our academic schools – these greatly benefit our students. This means you'll graduate with a truly global perspective, something highly valued by employers.

Developing your research skills

You'll gain a range of specialist knowledge and advanced research skills throughout your course which you can apply in your final project, theoretical dissertation, or both.

Depending on the course you choose, your final project will either be an in-depth research project under the guidance of a supervisor or a practical project. Whichever you undertake, you'll develop a range of transferable skills, such as presentation, project management, critical thinking and analysis, skills highly sought after by employers.

If you're thinking of an academic career, the advanced skills you acquire as a postgraduate will help prepare you for your next step as a researcher working towards a PhD or MPhil. Comprehensive research training may also be available, including workshops on writing research proposals and applications for grant funding.

Research facilities

We have impressive facilities to support our research and teaching, which you'll be able to access and use as part of your course – from specialist laboratories and equipment used to undertake innovative scientific research, to other unique resources. Here at Leeds we have one of the most high-resolution electron-beam lithography systems in Europe, which will help break new ground in nanotechnology, as well as one of the world's most advanced driving simulators to inform driver behaviour research.

We've invested £17m in a state-of-the-art laboratory to keep Leeds at the forefront of structural biology research. Led by the University's internationally renowned Astbury Centre, the facility will provide instruments for Electron Microscopy and Nuclear Magnetic Resonance that are competitive with the best worldwide. It will give researchers new insights into the structure of biological molecules and how they behave inside cells, and inform the future development of treatments for health challenges such as Alzheimer's, cancer and antibiotic resistance.

The new £1.9m Treasures of the Brotherton Gallery displays some of the UK's outstanding collections of rare books and manuscripts from the University's Special Collections. You'll be able to explore artefacts including letters from the Brontës, a copy of William Shakespeare's 1623 First Folio, a Tudor cookery book printed in the time of Elizabeth I, and a map and compass used by Bertie Ratcliffe, the first prisoner to escape back to Britain from Germany in the First World War.

The University also has a publicly-licensed theatre complex, stage@leeds, featuring a 180-seat main auditorium, dance studio and rehearsal rooms.

The Astbury Centre is an interdisciplinary research centre which was founded to create greater interaction between disciplines such as physics, biology, chemistry and medicine. Working collaboratively with academics across campus generates really interesting discussion and new research ideas – by addressing the same problem from different perspectives, the research enables bigger outcomes.

There are lots of people at Leeds who want to do new things and regularly get of out of their office and talk to colleagues from across campus, so whilst the Astbury Centre facilitates interdisciplinary work, it isn't unique – Leeds is a really dynamic and exciting campus with lots of great research happening.

An example of this is a recent £3.5m, five-year research collaboration between the School of Chemistry and the School of Molecular and Cellular Biology at Leeds, as well as the University of Bristol. Almost all biological processes are driven by the interaction between proteins, but classic pharmaceutical drugs don't inhibit these proteins, they deal with things like enzymes. This project is trying to develop methods to inhibit how proteins interact with each other as a new drug target – if we can inhibit these interactions, scientists might be able to prevent virus entry into cells, cancer and other diseases in a more effective way to how it is currently done.

Being involved in this kind of cutting-edge research means we can communicate the discoveries as they are happening, so students get the most up-to-date learning – when I was a student, the lectures I enjoyed the most were the ones that focused on the newest techniques and innovations – that's the most exciting way to learn.

At postgraduate level it's about the understanding and design of experiments and having that knowledge of what's currently happening in the field – so it's great to be able share my own research experiences.

The School of Mechanical Engineering ranks highly in the league tables and has good connections with the medical devices industry too, which offers good exposure and development opportunities.

I study different fields within medical engineering, from tissue engineering to designing orthopaedic implants for hips and knees. The School works collaboratively with different companies so the research and teaching on my course is heavily influenced by the needs of industry.

My dissertation focuses on a tool called a grasper, which is used in minimally invasive surgery. I'm researching how changes to the design of the grasper may minimise the amount of damage it could potentially cause to tissue if too much pressure is applied by the surgeon. The research facilities are fantastic at Leeds and there is a lot of equipment that you can use with experienced technicians like 3D printers and laser cutters. I get to work independently in the labs to test my work – I can actually apply a range of pressures to different tissues and put the theory into practice.

I have weekly meetings with my supervisor who advises on me on my work, but he's also a great support. There are normally PhD students in the labs as well who work on related topics and will offer advice and support when I need it.

The research part of my degree, and the opportunities to connect with industry to see how it can be applied to the real world, have really enhanced my course and the whole experience at Leeds. My Masters has definitely allowed me to develop and explore my potential. I'm thinking of coming back to do a PhD once I've worked in the industry and got some experience.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES

We have all the facilities you'll need to support and enhance your academic studies and we're investing millions of pounds each year to ensure we maintain a first-class learning environment.

From brand new laboratories and lecture theatres to one of the largest and most impressive libraries in the UK, you'll find everything you need for your studies right here on campus.

University Library

The University Library is one of the major academic research libraries in the UK and attracts students and academics from around the world. Its rich and growing print and online collections, gathered over 100 years, include some of the UK's most outstanding rare books and manuscripts.

As well as access to 2.8 million books, you'll have a host of electronic resources at your fingertips, including over 500,000 online books, accessible from wherever you are, and more than 37,000 print and online journals.

Four libraries on campus each house a different subject-based collection and provide a range of study environments, including flexible group study areas and silent individual study spaces. All our libraries have extensive computer facilities and wi-fi throughout for mobile devices – they're open seven days a week and have a variety of opening times to suit your needs.

The £23m refurbishment of the Edward Boyle Library, due to be completed in spring 2017, will offer over 2,000 study spaces, bookable rooms for group work and a research hub with facilities dedicated to postgraduate students.

Our library staff are always on hand to help and offer a range of support to help you sharpen your skills. From academic reading and writing to referencing, computing, time management and presentation skills, you will benefit from extensive online resources, as well as workshops on areas such as researching and writing your dissertation. www.leeds.ac.uk/library

Computers and IT

We have some of the best computing resources in the country according to the Guardian University Guide, 2016.

Our IT facilities are centred on you – a single login will give you access to all the University's IT services, including our two mobile apps. You'll find over 1,800 centrally provided networked PCs available for you to use across campus in computer clusters and most of our cafés, as well as numerous specialist computer facilities that may be provided by your academic school. These clusters have a range of opening hours, with some available 24/7, ensuring you can study when it suits you. If you would rather use your own laptop, most areas have free high-speed wi-fi, and with our Desktop Anywhere service, you'll always have secure access to your resources, files and a wide range of software from anywhere in the world.

You'll be provided with an email account on the Microsoft Office 365 service, offering secure access, wherever you are, to your email, calendar, contacts and tasks. As part of the Microsoft Office 365 suite of services, you can install up to five copies of Office Pro Plus for free.

Our experienced IT Service Desk staff are available seven days a week to give you IT support by phone, email or in person. www.leeds.ac.uk/it

Language learning

At Leeds, we offer excellent language learning opportunities for all our students. Whether you want to learn a new language or improve your English language skills, having knowledge of other languages and cultures will certainly enhance your employability prospects.

You'll be able to access free, flexible online language learning through Rosetta Stone, where you can choose from up to 24 languages, from beginner to intermediate level, or brush up on your existing language skills.

Our Language Centre also offers resources for independent language study and English language courses. If you're an international student, these pre-sessional courses will help you prepare for postgraduate study in the UK. English language development and academic study skills support are also available through part-time in-sessional classes and workshops, which you can do alongside your course.

Open to all students, facilities include the newly redesigned Language Zone. The Zone has learning materials in over 45 languages, including computer-assisted language learning, a dedicated space where you can study independently, an extensive collection of foreign language films and documentaries, and access to over 50 TV channels in 20 languages. The University has connections with a range of institutions around Leeds, not just traditional museums and galleries, but there's contemporary art galleries and arts organisations as well. You're spoilt for choice in Leeds as there are lots of great places to go around the city.

For one of the group projects on my course, we developed a public art trail around campus to encourage the public to explore the art we have on campus, including the Spire outside Laidlaw Library and Mitzi Cunliffe's Man-Made Fibres sculpture. The Treasures of the Brotherton Gallery is great too because it opens up the University's Special Collections for everyone to enjoy.

On campus I usually study in the Brotherton Library. The reading room is really grand and historic – it's circular with big pillars and a dome roof. The areas for group work are handy too. I'd recommend the library induction as staff explain how to use the library and access all the online journal subscriptions, which I use a lot for my course. There's also a scheme where you can access other university libraries across the country, which is great for when I visit back home.

There's a lot of support for postgraduate students – Skills@Library run lots of workshops including the 'Shut Up and Write' session where you all work without any distractions. My School organised a professional development day which was really useful – it included talks from Leeds alumni and workshops on networking, CV writing and interview techniques.

There are plenty of computer clusters around campus, but I tend to use my laptop as there is free wi-fi, plus I can access the library and all my files when I'm not on campus with the Desktop Anywhere service.

I was working at a film distribution company when I decided to do a Masters degree. I wanted to increase my knowledge, learn new skills and experience something new.

During the induction week I found out about the University's Careers Centre. They provide all kinds of career-related services like checking your CV, or if you want to start your own business they have experts who can help you.

I had the idea of providing media consultancy, translation services and Chinese subtitling for filmmakers and distributors who are looking to license their programmes in China. The Careers Centre put me in touch with a business advisor from Spark, the University's business start-up service. All the support I've been given has been free - I've attended lots of workshops and received guidance on all aspects of starting up my own business, including legal advice, financial support and learning how to market and promote my business. They helped me to shape and develop my business and encouraged me to enter the University's business plan competition - I won first place in the 'pretrading' category and received £2,000 to put towards my business.

It's sometimes difficult to balance my studies with starting a business, but it's brilliant to think I can go from having an idea one day to actually owning my own company. I wouldn't have achieved this without the help and support of Spark. Starting my own business has been a great way to meet other young entrepreneurs from across the University too. We've formed a network where we meet up to exchange information and ideas and socialise together.

Leeds offers lots of opportunities for you to get involved and to help you find out what you're interested in – not just in your future career but in all aspects of life. I've even tried rugby and fencing through the clubs in the students' union.

Career planning

It taught me how to explore ideas, connect with people and quickly analyse situations. These skills are really important when engaging with the organisations we work with, as our value comes from understanding the world from their perspective and helping them to imagine how their organisation can be changed and transformed through working with us.

In Denmark there aren't any student unions so I was very aware when I came to Leeds, with one of the most active unions in the UK, that it offered a unique opportunity to make the most of it. I completed my Masters degree in Political Communication here at Leeds, which has really helped me in my role as Union Affairs Officer – especially when I was campaigning to be elected. The other five Exec Officers are all elected students too and it was this concept of students working to represent students' views that interested me.

The Union is there to respond to the needs of all students and offers independent advice and support, as well as all kinds of different clubs and societies for you to experience and enjoy. The Postgraduate Society is a great way to meet up with other postgraduate students and get involved in research and careers events, day trips or you can just take a break from your studies and have a catch up at the Hidden Café.

We also work to have a student representative on every course and in every school – these are fellow students who will support you and represent your views, to ensure you have the best possible academic experience. Before I was elected I was a student rep for the School of Media and Communication and with the support of the Union, I helped bring about changes to the dissertation module so all postgraduate students benefited.

The postgraduate community at Leeds is incredibly diverse. There are students from all over the world here and because they might only be at Leeds for a year, it's important that postgraduate students are aware of the academic support, opportunities and activities that are available right from the beginning. Support services

The Student Education Service brings together support and information services with lifestyle help and opportunities for students. Once you've started at Leeds, the Student Services Centre counter service, located in the Marjorie and Arnold Ziff Building, can help and advise you on a range of areas such as accommodation, student administration, fees and funding, registration, student ID cards and many other student enquiries.

Student mental health and wellbeing

We recognise that there may be times when you might experience stress, emotional problems or upsetting life events that make it hard to cope academically and/or personally. To help you deal with those difficult times, we provide free professional and confidential counselling and mental health support. We also promote emotional wellbeing through groups, workshops, drop-in sessions and web-based self-help. Other activities are run throughout the year to help you during potentially stressful times such as revision and exam periods.

If you have an existing moderate to severe and enduring mental health diagnosis, we have professionals who will help you by providing one-to-one support and developing appropriate support plans. They'll also act as advocates between you and the University and liaise with external referral agencies.

When I was looking for a University I wanted a school with expertise in renewable energy systems and was really impressed with Leeds. After applying I received so much support from the University – I got lots of help with sorting out my accommodation and really useful information on flights and working out what my living costs would be. The pre-departure briefing in my home country was really useful too.

The best recommendation was to book the Meet and Greet service for when I arrived in Leeds. I travelled from Nigeria and it was a relief to arrive in a new city and have someone from the University there to meet me and help me get a taxi to my accommodation. I was given a welcome pack with a sim card in it so I could call home and tell them I had arrived.

I arrived in time for International Welcome Week and Freshers' Week so it was nice to walk over to campus each morning and see what was going on. I went to the Global Café quite a lot and just started chatting to some people over drinks and biscuits – I met my best friend there. The clubs and societies offer lots of opportunities to try different things. I signed up for orienteering, mountain climbing and rugby – things we don't really do in my country.

University accommodation has been a great experience – I'm living with people from the Bahamas, Japan, South Korea and Australia. We just hang out and talk, but I've learnt so much like different styles of cooking and different cultures. Some of us went on a road trip to the Netherlands at Christmas!

I'm a Link to Leeds ambassador so I get to talk to prospective students and answer their questions through live chat. It's really improved my communications skills and it's good to be able to share my experiences and help new students coming here.

ACCOMMODATION

Leeds is a great place to live, with a varied mix of accommodation on offer. Whether you are looking for family accommodation, a shared house, flat or studio, you will find something to suit your budget.

Our guarantee

We guarantee* to provide University accommodation to all new, single postgraduate students paying international fees who apply before the deadline. Unfortunately, we are unable to extend this guarantee to UK or EU students; however, there is an extensive selection of good-quality private accommodation available to students in Leeds.

*Restrictions apply relating to deadlines, residence and academic fee status.

University accommodation

Our University-owned accommodation for postgraduate students is mainly self-catered. We provide kitchen facilities that you share with a small number of other residents. All rooms have a bed, wardrobe, desk and chair. Around two-thirds of the rooms are en suite, and where there is a shared bathroom, rooms may also have a washbasin. All residences have launderettes or provide washing machines.

It's our aim to ensure you enjoy your time in our accommodation and feel safe and supported while you're there. Our two main residences exclusively for postgraduates are St Mark's Residences and Grayson Heights. Each have experienced wardens and resident sub-wardens to provide advice and support, plus our security service is on call 24/7.

St Mark's Residences is a new development conveniently located less than a five-minute walk to campus, with the city centre only a short 10-minute walk away. St Mark's offers 529 en suite rooms, a fitness zone, a communal lounge area and 51-week contract lengths. Grayson Heights comprises 110 rooms in smart, modern apartments on a direct bus route or 30-minute walk to campus. Each apartment has five bedrooms which share two bathrooms, a kitchen and a comfortable living room. Close to the popular areas of Headingley and Kirkstall, both with excellent local amenities, Grayson Heights offers 51-week contract lengths.

Accommodation costs for 2017 were not available at the time of printing, but the cost of University accommodation for 2016 entry ranged from £92 to £132 a week – your rent includes all utility bills, wi-fi, basic contents insurance and off-peak gym and sports membership at The Edge.

Private sector accommodation

Leeds has a wide range of good-quality private accommodation to suit all lifestyles and budgets, ranging from family and shared houses to studios and en suite accommodation in private, large developments. Whether you're looking to live in the city centre or in the popular student suburbs of Headingley or Hyde Park, you'll still just be a short walk or bus ride from campus.

Depending on the type of property you choose and the location, the average cost in 2015 for student properties rented from private landlords, as advertised by Unipol, a student homes charity, was around £74 for a shared house and £94 for a self-contained property (both figures are per week per person and exclude bills).

Situated in the middle of the UK, Leeds is also the regional capital of Yorkshire. Our campus sits on the edge of the city centre and a short 10-minute walk will take you to the heart of Leeds. Renowned as a hub for arts, sport, leisure and entertainment, Leeds is a lively, multicultural city. It has everything you would expect from the UK's third largest and fastest-growing city, and is surrounded by beautiful, accessible countryside. With over 60,000 students living within the city boundaries, there's a real student focus, making it an exciting place to live and learn.

Arts and culture


Transport links

Leeds is well connected to the rest of the UK by affordable, frequent and extensive coach and rail services. You can reach London in around two hours and Edinburgh is just three hours away by train. Leeds Bradford Airport is only 30 minutes from campus and provides regular flights to major international destinations.

Exploring Yorkshire

Sitting in the heart of Yorkshire, Leeds is one of the greenest cities in Britain and within easy reach of traditional cities, towns and villages such as Beverley, York, Malton, Ilkley, Harrogate, Ripon and Saltaire. It also has many areas of natural beauty and historic interest, such as Roundhay Park, Temple Newsam, Harewood House and Kirkstall Abbey.

From the Yorkshire Wildlife Park to the National Coal Mining Museum and the Royal Armouries museum, there is an abundance of things to see and do in Leeds and across the region. In the first week of my Engineering Geology course we had a three day field trip to the Yorkshire coastal towns of Whitby, Scarborough and Bridlington. My course covers the engineering of foundations and excavations so we created geological models to see how the geology of the area would affect the built environment. We also looked at how to mitigate landslides and coastal processes, so it's really handy that these places are within easy reach of Leeds.

Leeds is not far from the countryside, which is great for me because I do a lot of fell running up on the Moors. I also take part in a lot of races which explore the surrounding villages, like the Withins Skyline race which starts at Penistone Hill Country Park near Haworth. It covers the Brontë country and you run past the farmhouse from Wuthering Heights which is a really popular place to visit. It's brilliant, I love it.

There are so many places you can visit to take a break from studying. I've been able to explore a lot of the region through climbing too – there's some nationally significant climbing spots in Yorkshire and some of the best crags in the country. My favourite is Brimham Rocks in North Yorkshire which has been shaped by water, ice and wind into loads of random boulders. Malham Cove is a great place to visit too. It's a huge curved amphitheatre shaped cliff that features in one of the Harry Potter films.

Leeds is in a great location – it's so easy to get around Yorkshire and the added benefit is that the campus is really close to the city centre. I can just pop in to Leeds whenever I need something, especially to the Trinity shopping centre – it's got everything there.

FEES, FUNDING AND APPLYING

Choosing the right university is an important decision and an investment in your future. At Leeds we offer a number of scholarships and bursaries to help you fund the cost of postgraduate study.



COSTS TO CONSIDER

Postgraduate study is a major investment in your future, but there may be some support available to help ease the financial pressure.

Tuition fees

The cost of a taught postgraduate degree varies depending on the course and our fees are reviewed each year. Tuition fees for 2017 will be confirmed in September 2016 and will be available on our website at

www.leeds.ac.uk/coursefinder

If you are studying part time, the full-time fee is usually split so that payment is divided equally across each year of study, but this is not always the case so you should check with the relevant admissions team. Most part-time postgraduate Masters fees are fixed at the point of entry and will not rise in subsequent years of the course. This means you can more easily plan your finances at the outset.

Paying your fees

If you are a UK or EU student, you may be eligible for a postgraduate loan from the UK government to help with the cost of your tuition fees. If you have a confirmed postgraduate loan at registration, you can set up a payment plan based on when you receive your loan payments.

Alternatively, you can pay your fees in full or in two instalments. If paying in two instalments, 50% must be paid when registering and 50% is payable by direct debit from a UK bank account approximately five months after your start date.

If you are an international student and need a Tier 4 student visa to study in the UK, you will need to pay a tuition fee deposit of £1,500 unless you are sponsored by a University-recognised sponsor. You can find out more at

Living costs

In addition to your tuition fees, you must also budget for living costs such as accommodation, food, clothing, books, transport and social activities. While costs will vary depending on individual lifestyles, we recommend a living costs budget of £650 to £800 per month. For money advice and tips on budgeting visit **www.luu.org.uk**

If you need to top up your income during your studies, there is a service called Joblink, provided by Leeds University Union, where you can find part-time work with a trusted, student-friendly employer that fits around your studies. Working not only puts money in your pocket, it also helps you gain valuable experience.

If you're an international (non-EU) student, you should check whether your visa allows you to work part time. When you apply for your visa, you'll have to prove that you can support yourself financially while in the UK. For more information visit **www.leeds.ac.uk/immigration**

STUDENT FUNDING

Postgraduate study is a big investment, but you might be able to get financial support from the UK government, the University of Leeds or other funding bodies.

Funding from the UK government for UK and EU students

If you study a taught or research Masters course full time, part time or by distance learning, you may be able to apply for a postgraduate loan of up to £10,000 to contribute to the cost of your postgraduate study. This is a repayable loan, but it isn't means-tested, so it doesn't depend on your personal or family income.

Funding for international students

If you are an international student, you may be able to apply for funding from your own government, independent sponsors or other award-paying bodies to study in the UK. You may also be eligible to apply for one of our postgraduate scholarships.

Funding from us

If you have the talent, drive and potential to succeed, we want to make sure you can study with us, whatever your financial circumstances. We offer one of the most generous funding packages in the country and, best of all, any funding you may receive from us does not need to be repaid.

Alumni bursary

If you are a former student of the University of Leeds and you are studying for a full Masters degree, you may be eligible for a 10% alumni tuition fee bursary. To see if you are eligible and to check application deadlines visit **www.leeds.ac.uk/alumnibursary**

Postgraduate scholarships

Postgraduate students at Leeds benefit from around £10m of funding from the University and external sources. Additional scholarships may also be available from some individual academic schools.

We offer a wide range of scholarships for UK, EU and international students to help towards paying tuition fees or living costs, but eligibility depends on a number of factors, such as where you live in the UK or your home country, your academic achievement, your personal circumstances or your household income.

Scholarships can be very competitive, so it's important you make enquiries and apply to all possible sources of funding at an early stage, as soon as you have your University Student ID number.

Without a scholarship I wouldn't have been able to afford to study a Masters and I definitely wouldn't be at Leeds right now. I started researching environment courses at Leeds, as loads of people recommended it and the faculty is ranked highly, and I found out about the Leeds Masters Scholarship scheme.

It was an easy process to apply for the Scholarship – I had to show that I met the financial criteria, explain why I wanted to study the course and how the scholarship would benefit me. The Scholarship was paid in instalments and I used it to pay towards my tuition fees and accommodation costs as I am living away from home.

There's other funding that you can apply for once you're here. I'm presenting at a conference later in the year with some students from my course and I'm going to apply for a Conference Award from the Leeds for Life Foundation. It will help with the cost and anyone can apply.

The University advertises lots of little jobs you can apply for that will fit around your studies – I work part time as a student ambassador for extra spending money. I've worked on open days and I help to run workshops and give children a tour of campus when schools visit which is great fun. It's really good for professional development and it's helped to improve my confidence too. Joblink is incredible for short term and temporary jobs that you don't have to tie yourself down to every weekend.

I'm really good at managing money and keeping track of what's coming in and going out. To keep costs down I go to the discounted sports sessions organised by the University, such as yoga, spin, kayaking and climbing. There's a lot more funding out there for postgraduate students than people expect – just make sure you do your research get applying.

APPLYING TO STUDY HERE

Entry requirements

The normal entry requirement for a Masters course is the equivalent of a good bachelor degree in the British system. The University of Leeds welcomes a wide range of international qualifications for entry to postgraduate study. Entry requirements vary depending on the course you choose, so for the most up-to-date information visit **www.leeds.ac.uk/coursefinder**

English language requirements

If English is not your first language, you will need a recognised English language qualification to be able to do a Masters course at Leeds. English language requirements vary between courses, so you will need to check the requirements for your course at **www.leeds.ac.uk/coursefinder**

If you need to improve your English language skills before you start your course, you may want to consider one of the pre-sessional courses provided by our Language Centre (see page 21). Our pre-sessional courses are taught by staff from our Language Centre and academic schools, so you can improve your English language skills at the same time as learning more about your chosen subject. If you meet the English language conditions for the pre-sessional course, a combined offer can be made for the pre-sessional and the Masters course. If you require a Tier 4 student visa, this combined offer means we can issue one Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) for both courses and you can apply for one visa covering both courses. How to apply

Application deadlines vary so you should check this directly with the appropriate academic school before you submit an application. We would encourage you to apply as early as possible, so you can apply for funding, accommodation and visas, if appropriate.

TAUGHT COURSES

As a postgraduate student, you will combine lectures, seminars and tutorials, with additional time allocated to private study, independent projects, and laboratory practicals or fieldwork where relevant to your course.

Types of postgraduate qualifications

- A Master of Arts (MA) is usually awarded in subjects categorised as arts or social sciences such as education or history.
- A Master of Science (MSc) is usually awarded in subjects categorised as the sciences such as biology or engineering.
- A Masters of Research (MRes) is an advanced research-based degree to help prepare you for progression to a PhD or a career where research skills are required.
- A Postgraduate Diploma (PGDip) and a Postgraduate Certificate (PGCert) offer Masters-level knowledge without a dissertation. A Postgraduate Diploma is more extensive than a Postgraduate Certificate.

RESEARCH DEGREES

Our Masters degrees can provide excellent preparation for higher-level research degrees such as a PhD. A research degree will provide you with training in relevant, transferable and research skills, which will support you in gaining expertise in a specialist area. 


