elections for Union Committee was delayed four hours because Returning Officer Pete Hall overslept.

Many students who had travelled down from Bodington Hall on Monday morning had to return without voting because the polling stations were not open. Candidates who complained to members of Executive were met with indifference. Hall had

once again failed to appoint a deputy, and had left no instructions to Exec. members as to what to do.

Conservative Association chairman Dave Cooper who was elected, is said to have demanded that the election be re-held, but he later withdrew his request. The election was extended to Wednesday to make up for the lost time.

When interviewed, Hall complained of the "pathetic" turn-out of Union Committee members to man the polling stations. No more than six of

The election itself resulted in a victory for no particular group or faction. Nine members of the old committee, an unusually high number, successfully stood for re-election.

The only possible grouping is the four 'diehard' Conservatives who were elected: Tim Olsen, Dave Cooper, Vera Beljakova, and B. B. Taylor. This caused many people to describe the new committee as "if anything, a bit reactionary." actionary.

Due to the fact that the election was held in the week

before exams, there was an unusually low poll — 20 per cent as opposed to 37 per cent last year. Next year, all elections will be held during the second term to avoid this. The top candidate, Mike Gonzales, was the choice of 58% of the electors. Last year's top candidate (Nigel Rodley) only gained 42.6 per cent. Full results are shown on the left.

Second in the poll was former NUS Secretary Dave Merriman, who has alredy completed two years on the committee. After two previous attempts, leading Union Communist and debater Alan Hunt was finally elected.

One surprise re-election was that of Hilary Forrest, who has only spoken three times in the committee duringing the whole of the present session. Her brother, Martin was House Secretary last year, and she herself is the fifth member of her family to sit on Union Comthe fifth member of her family to sit on Union Committee.

Only about 50 out of a possible 900 technologists and

simply grinned, "Nothing to do with me," and a hostile Paula O'Neill snapped, "Those ballot boxes are not going out today."

The delay has inconvenienced both Union News and, more important, the electorate. The attitude of the outgoing comittee, who could not even be bothered to man the polling stations properly, has been one of "I'm all right, Jack."

Next year's U.C. must do better than this. It will be enough simply to be capable of organising an election.

They seem very lucky to have been elected at all. Maybe they will give next year's bunch of candidates a better starting-price.

Among unsuccessful candidates were a group from Labour Society, and CND leaders Gerald Kennedy and John Byrde. Union News editor Dave Motlow missed a seat by only 11 votes. President-elect Tony Lavender was hesitant about describing the committee he will have to work with next year. "I think I shall be able to work with them" he said. Next year's JVP, Ian Morrison was more outspoken however: "There's enough talent to lead the rest, but some of the rest have never done anything.
