RUMOURS that Hall fees would be raised next term were confirmed by Mr. Williamson, the Bursar, this week. Hall fees will be going up with effect from next term; most expensive will be Devonshire, Lyddon and Ellerslie at £206 p.a. for single rooms, a rise of £15. These halls provide a midday meal every day.
