

STOP PRESS The degree ceremony yesterday went off without inci-dent, except at the end when some engineers held up a banner saying "Congratula-tions Mr. Oppenheimer" and "We are no Reds, we are the majority... Ian Morrison, Roger White, Val Bradford and Mervyn Saunders attended the ceremony, although not as Union representatives. Among those awarded honorary degrees with Mr. Oppenheimer were F. R. Lewis, Michael Tippet, the composer, and the Rt. Hon. Edward Boyle, M.P.



day. Bodington and Sadler are going up by f15 to f186 p.a. as are Oxley, Tetley and Weetwood Halls (they do not provide lunches in the week). Mr. Williamson said that the reason fees were being raised was two-fold; (a) the cost of living had gone up, and (b) Hall fees were always reviewed every three years, to coincide with the triennial University Grants Commission.

Grant increase

He told Union News that he expected that grants would be increased to cover the rise in fees.

The Bursar added that Henry Price is to cost more next term. A further charge of one pound is to be made on occupants of flats to cover the cost of the tele-phones recently installed. hones recently installed. However, he told Union News that it was "a bit too early to think about raising the rents."

RUMOURS that Hall fees would be raised next term were confirmed by Mr. Williamson, the Bursar, this week. Hall fees will be going up with effect from next term; most expensive will be Devonshire, Lyddon and Ellerslie at £206 p.a. for

He said that he could not He said that he could not confirm or deny rumours that lodgings fees would be increased, but repeated that the cost of living had gone up tremendously and said that he hoped that grants would be raised to cover the various increases. Although there has been no official denial that lodg-ings fees are to be raise, one union member said.



"With the proposed in-crease in University student population next session, the resulting demand for 'digs' is almost certain to mean that landladies will be able to ask more or less what they like." Student Treasurer Mer-vyn Saunders admitted that next year's students would be giving more to the Union in dues. The Union subscription will be in-creased from £7 to 10 guin-eas. In fact this should not affect many students be-cause the Local Education Authorities pay the sub-scription for all those who receive a grant. Foreign students and those who have no grant may have to find the extra £3 10s. how-ever.
